SPORTING NEWS

VICTORIAS WIN DOUBLE HEADER

Good Crowd Witness a Somewhat Interesting Game

Last night a large crowd gathered at the Charlottetown Arena to witness the hockey game between the Abegweits and Victorias. The ice was somewhat heavy and sticky which prevented fast hockey. At 5:37 the Senior teams lined up as follows:—

At the start the spectators witnessed some very interesting hockey, the rubber being mostly at the 'Abbies' end, and not until after 7 minutes of exciting play did the Vics' Rover, from a pass in front of goal, score, the first tally. Only one minute later on a pass in front of the Abbies' goal, the Vics scored number 2. This stirred the Abbies to action and in less than two minutes later their fast centre man scored from a pass from the Left Wing, making the count 2-1. Here the Vics' Centre and the Abbies' Cover Point indulged in a little spat with the result that they each got a short rest. This was followed by repeated efforts on the part of the Abegweits to even the score but without avail. A few minutes later, from a mix-up in front of the goal, the Victorias scored another. About five minutes after this goal was scored an incident occurred which was nothing short of disgraceful. The Cover Point of the Abegweits team collided with the Victorias' Right Wing and a fierce battle ensued which drew in a number of other players of both teams. Angered perhaps by former happenings, the Abegweits struck the first blow which led to a melee in which a number of onlookers and the police were obliged to interfere. This incident was as much uncalled for as it was disgusting, and the spectators on all sides were earnest and severe in their remarks concerning such a low standard of sport. It was remarked by many that Charlottetown hockey and its own team particularly, would be much more respectable, and more attractive to decent people, if the offender in this—and it was not his first—were excused from any further participation in Charlottetown sports. Penalties far from commensurate with the offence were imposed on each player. Upon play being resumed, the Vics' Right Wing, after serving his time on the promenade, made a nice run, the whole length of the rink and scored the 4th goal. Two minutes later from a pass between Cover Point and Left Wing the Vics landed another, when the Left Wing, evidently enthused by his feat

indulged in tripping and received a short rest. At 9:07 half-time was called with the score standing: Vics, 5, Abbies, 1. After the usual half-time interval, the players seemed to put up a better and more aggressive game with less foul play. The Abbies now endeavored to make matters more even and they put forth a valiant struggle to catch up to their opponents, but without success. At 9:43 the Vics' Right Wing scored another by a good combination run. The Abbies' Rover and Vics' Point were penalized on account of a little mix-up. The Abbies now combined in a nice run and scored their 2nd and last goal, followed shortly by the Vics with another. The game ended at 9:57 with the score 8-2 in the Victorias' favor. In justice to the Abegweits it may here be stated that they played with two Intermediate men, Gordon, their star Rover, having to drop out on account of injuries received in the last game. The Victorias on the other hand, were strengthened by Burns who played his first game of the season, and who played so important a part in winning laurels for the Victorias team on previous occasions.

The Intermediate game resulted in a victory for the Vics by the narrow margin of one point, the score being 3-2 in their favor. The line-up was as follows:—

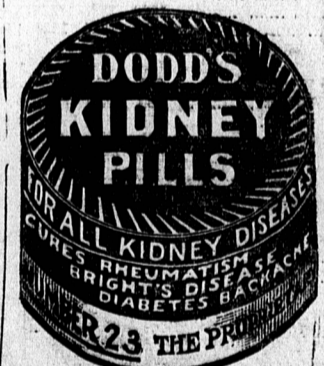
Miss May Stewart has resigned her position with Messrs. Stewart and Son, and has accepted a similar position with Messrs. Beer and Goff beginning work February 1st.
