CAN-OPENER BOON TO HOME-MAKERS

When a housewife reaches for a can of preserves from the grocer's shelf in the dead of winter, she little realizes what a vast amount of organization and research lies behind that one item on her grocery list.

That single can exemplifies a year of planning and contracting with the farmers for miles around, a full year before the actual canning, scientific care and protection of plants throughout the growing season, clockwork precision in harvesting and delivering crops according to set schedules, in addition to the scientific procedure in the canning itself.

Each step in the canning process, from the time the tomato seedling is supplied to the farmer by the nursery until it reaches the ultimate in flavoured, preserved goodness is traced in an article in C-1-L Oval.

A plant-starter provides the new plant with a completely balanced diet until it has taken solid root. Other plant foods ensure proper plant nourishment at later stages of growth, and chemicals in the insecticide and fungicide class protect the plant from a host of pests.

Round-the-clock operations are restored to at most canneries during the tomato and pea seasons. There are zero-hours and schedules at picking time as rigid as a railway time-table—all conspiring to have the crop canned, labelled, and ready for storage or shipment a few hours after the crop is harvested.

Changes in Honor Roll

The frequent changes in the Honor Roll for the cows milked twice a day classes indicates much improved production in the breed in 1947. Several cows have gone to the top of their respective class and many cows have gained a place in the Honor Roll in recent months.

In the R.O.P. records received here for October, we find that changes are made in the various classes with Don Alda Farms, Tomorden, Ontario, breeding three of the animals, Don Alda Langwater County, a daughter of Phil Cook, going to the top of Mature Class in the 365 Day Division, with 14,452 milk and 894 fat, establishing the highest record ever made in Canada in this class, the former high cow was Coroum Noblemans's Janilly with 15,881 milk, 832 fat; her record was made in 1937 by Pilot Butte Stock Farms, Regina, Saskatchewan.

Don Alda Langwater Dairy, another daughter of Phil Cook, now owned by Jas. M. Brown, Almonte, Ontario, goes into 7th place in the Mature Class, 353 Day Division, with 10,764 milk and 618 fat.

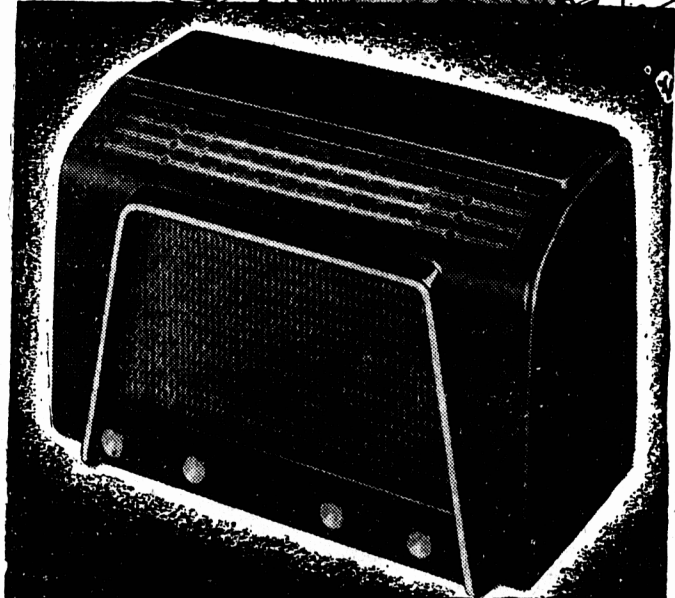
