Condemns War Savings Stamp Chain Letters

MONTREAL, July 25-Chain letters, banned by Dominion Government criminal law, a few years ago, have reappeared in Montreal. Those forbidden four years ago asked recipients to send currency to the names appearing at the top of the list on that letter. The new scheme is to buy and send war savings stamps and on the basis of this the chain letters all label themselves "A Patriotic Effort."

To Police Director Fernand Dufré the new form of chain letter did not appear particularly patriotic.

"It is not patriotism when somebody tries to make money out of patriotism," he said. "If I could get hold of the fellow who started this chain I'd arrest him."

The chain letter racket to "help win the war" is in full swing in Charlottetown and other parts of the province.

It is also sweeping other places in the Maritimes. This is what the editor of the Dartmouth, N. S. Patriot has to say regarding the matter after receiving a chain letter: "A close check up showed that the letter was nothing but the usual 'chain letter' racket, now camouflaged under a 'Help Win the War' effort."

"People who start chain letters make money. There are hundreds of suckers who will be ready to send stamps because of the novelty, the belief that they are helping to win the war, or believing that they will make money out of the letter business."

"If you want to 'Help Win the War,' buy stamps for yourself. Don't put them in the mail and send them to somebody who perhaps is 'taking you for a fair game.'"

"Here's a copy of the letter received at the Patriot office this week."

"This is a patriotic chain letter sent out to help the sale of war savings stamps. By this means, if everybody plays their part, a very large number of stamps will be sold and a large amount of money raised for war purposes."

"All you have to do is purchase a 25 cent war savings stamp, put it in an envelope and mail it to the first name on the list."

"Next, I will send you four times, leaving off this first name on the list, adding your own name to the bottom of the list. Send a copy each to four of your friends whom you know will carry on the chain. As your name reaches the top of the list you will receive two hundred and fifty-six savings stamps."

"This stunt will greatly stimulate the sale of war savings stamps as the chain spreads to all parts of Canada."

"This is serious effort and if for any reason you do not care to join, please return this letter to the last name on the list."

SUMMER SKIING IN THE ROCKIES

JASPER LODGE, Alta., July 25.—In Canada for a month of summer skiing and rock climbing Hal Burton noted ski expert for the New York Daily News and also prominent member of the American Ski Association, yesterday blazed a new descent from the summit of Pyramid Mountain as a fore runner to difficult climbs he will encounter at Columbia Ice Field, Maligne Lake and Mount Robson. With Swiss guide Ernie Neiderer and Miss Margaret Stock, Burton ascended Pyramid by the regular route and descended late in the day over the steeper north face. Burton's first summer skiing excursion will take him into the Columbia Icefield where he and Neiderer will establish high camp at 10,000 feet, more than 3,500 above their base. From his tent pitched near the edge of the 10 square mile snow field, he will make ski ascents of the lowering peaks of the area completing his program there in about two weeks.
