-FARMERS INSTITUTE.—A very successful and enjoyable open meeting was held on the Urbanville school house on Tuesday evening 6th under the auspices of the local branch of the Farmers' Institute. Despite the condition of the roads the attendance was good though several outside visitors who were to address the meeting were regrettably absent. Mr. Ferdinand Richard occupied the chair, and Mr. Benoit F. Arsenault was secretary. Several ladies were present and all seemed to be greatly interested in the speeches given. Mr. Joseph H. Arsenault was the first speaker. His theme was co-operation, and it received a very good hearing. He cited notable results of co-operative work, and predicted a much greater progress in the near future. He was followed by Mr. John F. Arsenault who spoke on the poultry industry. Mr. Arsenault, though unprepared, greatly interested his hearers on this important subject. He explained at some length the method in caring of hens, the food essential at this season, the precaution to be taken to keep them free from vermin etc., and he summed up by referring to the high prices the result of co-operative management namely our eggs circles. Inspector Gallant made some good remarks, referring to what had already been said and gradually explained how it was that the teaching of agriculture was being introduced in the schools. Home projects were a means of infusing in the hearts of pupils a love and a desire to find out the real facts in connection with whatever they had taken up. The faculty of observation was being trained and the success in teaching did not so much depend on the amount of instruction imparted to a pupil, as a desire created to satisfy his curiosity. The president, Mr. Richard, then gave a brief report of the meetings of the P. E. Island Egg Circle association held in Charlotte town, he being delegate from Egmond Bay. Mr. Joseph H. Arsenault again spoke on the local Exhibition and made some interesting remarks in this connection. Mr. Frank Doiron said a few words, encouraging parents in the educational welfare of their children. Mr. Joseph F. Forster made some good appropriate remarks re the duty of parents towards their children. A vote of thanks was tendered the speakers and the meeting adjourned.—M.

CAPTAIN TOM LOWRIE AND HIS EXPERIENCES

HALIFAX, February 8.—Captain Thomas Lowrie, a native of Charlottetown, and a resident of that city, who hangs up his hat, was in Halifax yesterday and left North street depot last evening at eight o'clock bound for Pensacola, via Boston. Captain Lowrie used to sail the stern schooner McClure and has a host of acquaintances among Nova Scotia mariners. His last command was the schooner Roma, which was shot out from under him in the Mediterranean not so many weeks ago and thereby hangs a tale. Before we tell the story it might be remarked that the owners of the Roma were Newfoundland parties. They want another schooner to replace the lost one. They sent Captain Lowrie to Boston to see what he could find and he has followed up the whole coast (including the Bay of Fundy) right to Halifax and has not yet been able to make a purchase. There are two possible chances in Pensacola and acting on telegraphic instructions from Newfoundland, Captain Lowrie is now speeding southward. In the capacity of a newspaper reporter no one could get a story out of Captain Lowrie regarding his submarine experience in the sunny Mediterranean, but when he was approached by an old shipmate it was a different matter. He talked freely and the language he used had the real twang of the sea and the compliments he paid the Huns were pungently picturesque. "We had three thousand quintal of fish aboard the Roma," said the captain. "I left Newfoundland with orders to call at Gibraltar for further orders and expected to be sent to Alicante, Spain, which is only a little ways up from the strait. Instead of that I got orders to proceed to Naples which I did. We discharged our cargo and took on some ballast for the run home. We had a good start. One morning just before daylight I was called by the watch who told me that somebody was shooting at us. I climbed out on deck and less than a mile away we could make out the flashes of a gun and the shells were coming close alongside. We didn't stop aboard for breakfast, but got into the boats quick as the Lord would send us and before we got clear one shell struck the schooner. We hauled off as fast as we could and saw several more shells strike and pretty soon saw her commencing to settle. As soon as the beggers (this is not correct quotation for more powerful language was used) saw that the vessel was going down they disappeared. "I shaped our course so as to make a fair wind and running to the north west landed on the north side of Sardina. A lot of soldiers, Italian, met us and tried to talk to us in French or Italian. There was nothing doing. Bye and bye they got a book with a lot of Italian sentences in one column, a lot of French sentences in another and the third column, English. I picked up enough to tell them that I was a Canadian and that we had been submarined. The Italian officer knew what Canadian meant and patted us on the back and then nothing was too good for us. We had to go around the island on a train to get to a steamer that landed us in Italy and we came through the Alps into France and reached Paris where we were kept five hours and then sent to Havre where we took the boat for

IRELAND PROSPEROUS IN EVERY DIRECTION.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Robert Colville, president, at the meeting of the Bank of Ireland in Dublin, said that trade in all departments of Ireland's industrial life was extraordinarily active. "It was difficult to realize in this favored island we were in the middle of the third year of the great war. The flax industry in the North was prosperous. Exports of Irish linen the past year was £2,000,000 more in value than the preceding year. Shipbuilding and agriculture were prosperous. The prices of cattle, horses and live stock were extraordinarily high. The prices of oats, barley and wheat were more than double those of normal years." (With all this prosperity there is danger of a potato famine, and the situation is being forced upon the attention of the authorities.)

SEVEN SURVIVORS OF SHACKLETON EXPEDITION RESCUED

WELLINGTON, Via London, Feb. 7.—Seven survivors of the Shackleton Antarctic expedition, who were stranded on Elephant Island, have been rescued by the relief steamer Aurora which arrived at Cape Evans on Jan. 10 with them on board. Captain Macintosh and two other men of the stranded party perished. Captain Macintosh and V. G. Hayward attempted to cross Hut Point to Cape Evans last May and were caught in a blizzard and lost their lives. Another member of the expedition, A. P. Spencer-Smith, died of scurvy.

TWO AUSTRIAN PLANES WERE BROUGHT DOWN

ROME, Feb. 12.—It is officially announced that two Austrian seaplanes which were scouting off the Albanian coast were shot down near Sanoce. Two of the occupants of the machines were made prisoners. One of the airplanes was captured and the other sunk.

GERMANY HOLDS AMERICANS AS HOSTAGES

BERLIN, via Sayville, Feb. 12.—Foreign Secretary Simmermann today informed the Associated Press that he had requested the Swiss Government to make inquiries in Washington regarding the status of the crews of interned German ships in American ports. Pending an answer 72 Americans taken by a German Raider and brought in by the Yarrowdale, whose release had been agreed to, are being held in Germany, the Foreign Secretary stated.

BRITISH TORPEDO BOAT IS SUNK

LONDON, Feb. 10.—A British torpedo boat destroyer of an older type, the British admiralty announces, struck a mine in the English Channel Thursday night and sank. All the officers and all of the crew, except five, were lost. The official statement follows: "A torpedo boat destroyer of an older type, employed in patrolling in the English Channel, struck a mine last night and sank. All the officers were lost. There were five survivors among the crew." The oldest type of destroyers in the British navy is known as class A, built between 1893 and 1895. There are twelve vessels of this type. The average displacement is 310 tons, and they average 200 feet in length, with a beam of nineteen feet. Two of the vessels have a complement of forty-five men each, while the other ten carry fifty men each. The next oldest type, class B, numbers twenty vessels, built between 1895 and 1900. Their average displacement is about 400 tons, and their average complement sixty men each.

A NAVAL ENGAGEMENT?

RIO JANERIO, Feb. 10.—A despatch received here from Pernambuco, Brazil, quotes the Diario of that city to the effect that cannon firing was heard between two and six a. m. today near the Island of Fernando De Noronha, a Brazilian island, 125 miles from the main land. The newspaper says flashes were observed from the island, as though large naval guns were being fired. The naval commandant at Fernando De Noronha is said to have made a report to the admiralty.

BISHOP OF PHILIPPINES APPLAUDS U.S. ACTION
