SAN DIEGO, Cal., October 27.—It is officially announced here that Lieutenants C. H. Connolly, of San Diego and F. B. Waterhouse, of Weiser, Idaho, army aviators, missing since August 21, were slain in lower California by two Mexican fishermen. The announcement was made upon the arrival here of the destroyer Aaron Ward, bringing the bodies of the two aviators from Bahía Lugo, Angeles, on the Gulf of Lower California to which point they had flown after losing their way in a border patrol flight from Yuma, Arizona, to San Diego.

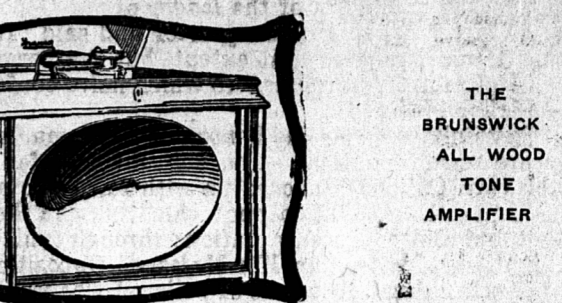
