## MONTRÉAL N. Y. Stock Exchange

**(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)**

**MONTRÉAL, Dec 11**—Re-opening of interest in Dominion Steel and Coal issues provided the highlight of an irregular day on the Montreal Stock Exchange today.

With the exception of isolated issues the remainder of the list was mixed. Reactions were suffered in the afternoon dealings as the result of selling in New York but gains and losses were nearly evenly divided. Sales volume decreased by approximately 14,200 shares and the average of 30 stocks dipped 5 1/2 at 57.8.

Attracted by the reorganization plans of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation involving the conversion of bonds of the corporation and changes in the common and preferred shares on its subsidiary, Dominion Coal Company, investors boosted shares of the two companies.

Dominion Steel and Coal "B" equalled its high of the year at 57-8 on sales of nearly 3,000 shares, the board, and closed unchanged at 57-2. Dominion Coal preferred was more volatile rising to a new peak for the year at 119 and finishing with a three point gain at 117. Steel of Canada moved up half a point in sympathy.

## NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE

**NEW YORK, Dec 11**—Stocks, unable to make any decisive progress in the past several sessions, turned around in conjunction today for losses of around 1 to 3 or more points.

Notwithstanding the fact that the general run of news did not depart from its optimistic trend, the inability of bullish forces to push their favorites through resistance levels tended to dampen enthusiasm appreciably. Many traders, therefore decided to cash in profits and take a chance of getting back in on a more probable basis.

There was no special happening to account for the day's decline. The Standard Statistics Co. average for 9) selected issues yielded 1.5 points to 72.8, the largest recession for a single session since Oct. 25, last. Volume also picked up on the downturn, transfers totalling 1,281,900 shares against 940,417 Monday.

The list was fairly steady in the morning hours, and some of the rails and specialties changed hands at advances of a point or more. The firmness of the carriers was particularly cheering to those who serve the public, while the belief that the list as a whole, cannot push forward and leave the transportation division behind.

Considerable timidity, however, was displayed throughout by many of the industrials, which have recently been marking up new highs for the year or longer. Realizing on a broad scale started in the industrial section in the fourth hour and the rails later, in the reaction. At the close the industrial average was off nearly 2 points while the rails and utilities held their recessions to less than half of this.

The refusal of the steel stocks to step up yesterday, following estimates of a substantial advance in mill operations, was interpreted in some quarters as a reactionary cue. Also, various analysts pointed out that some issues, undoubtedly, were selling out of the line when measured by the price-earnings standard. Today's drop, while disheartening to the more rabid bulls, was viewed as a "healthy correction" by several commentators.

Losses predominated in the Canadian section. Montreal Power, Noranda and Ford of Canada B, each lost a point or more. Fractional recessions occurred in such stocks as Dominion Stores, Dome Mines, International Nickel, Lake Shore, Nipissing, Wright-Harveys, and Canadian Pacific, Brazilian, Shaw-

Fresh no 1 butter remained unchanged at 20 1/2 to 21 cents a pound for cabbages or less. To retailers arrivals were 21 1/2 to 22 cents and prints 22 1/2 to 23 cents a pound. Receipts were 300 boxes.

Free shipments of eggs in cartons or less continued steady at 37 to 38 cents a dozen for A large, 23 to 24 cents for A medium, 23 to 25 cents for B and 23 to 24 cents for C. Arrivals - were 40 cents. New Brunswick at 40 to 45 cents and Prince Edward Islands was firm at 34 cents a pound. Offerings amounted to 27 boxes.
