PRIZE ANIMAL SHIPPED

—The Bunbury Farm herd bull—Pat—that weighs over 2400 lbs. and is a son of the fourtimes National grand champion cow, Nancy Maid 2nd, has been sold to head the excellent herd of A. V. Ross, Grove Farm, St. John's, Newfoundland, and was shipped on the "Sapper" yesterday. While this great bull is a loss to this province, it is claimed at Bunbury Farm that Pat's successor will sustain the reputation of the herd. The yearly records of his two nearest dams constitute a world's record.

HOSPITAL FUND BOOMING

—The rally supper for the collectors of the P. E. Island Hospital Campaign at Zion Church social hall was largely attended last night. The various collecting groups submitted the amounts collected and the aggregate amounted to \$38,000. This sum was deemed highly satisfactory and the splendid start which the campaign has received augurs well for its success. The objective is \$67,000 and the fact that already over half the amount has been subscribed is proof of the generous feeling of public responsibility towards the hospital as well as of the zeal and energy of the campaign committee and workers.

ROTARY LUNCHEON

—At the regular meeting of the Rotary Club yesterday Rotarian Frank Stewart presided, the principal speaker being Mr. J. L. Harrington, assistant director of the Prince Edward Island Hospital Campaign who delivered an interesting address on Community Pride. He congratulated the local members on the excellent schools, churches, bank and store buildings in Charlottetown and declared his belief that the natural beauties of the Island should be more widely advertised. He cited the success achieved as a summer resort by Ocean City, New Jersey, fifteen miles below Atlantic City, where his own summer home is situated and suggested, as a means of keeping more of the younger men at home in this Province, the growing of more fruit, especially apples, and the greater development of our canning and packing industries. Rotarian H. H. Shaw gave an interesting talk on the need of members being better educated as to certain phases of Rotary. The guests present were Mr. Lewis Clyde Auld, Captain Bridges of the S. S. Margaret Coughlan and Mr. C. C. Thompson. The musical program included an excellent solo by Mrs. Frances Trafor.

PHILATHEA CONCERT AT MARSHFIELD

—The concert and dramatic entertainment given by the Philathea class at the Baptist school room last week, was repeated before a crowded audience in Marshfield Hall last evening. Solos by Miss Tarbush, Mrs. W. E. Graew, and Mrs. Warren were beautifully rendered and enthusiastically received. Mrs. A. R. Jones gave two splendid violin numbers. The rich voices of Messrs. Quigley, Dingwall and Sterns were heard in splendid harmony in the trio sung by them. The comedy drama "Mrs. Willis' Will" elicited much laughter and enjoyment. The parts were cleverly taken by Miss McLeod, Miss Harris, Mrs. Hansud, Miss Grant, and Miss Ling. The evening program was under the general direction of Mrs. A. F. Hansud and Prof. Hiram Ball.

LARGE STEAMER HERE

—The S.S. Margaret Coughlan, Capt. J. W. Bridges, now loading steel rails at the railway wharf, is one of the largest steamers which has entered this port in recent years. She belongs to the Ocean Carrier Line and is used chiefly on the Vancouver-Montreal route, although early this year a transatlantic trip to Lisbon, Spain, was made. She reached here with a part cargo consisting of general cargo from Montreal and after loading the rail shipment for the firm of Coleman & Evans at Vancouver will call at Sydney, N. S. where 2,000 tons of hardware will be loaded. The trip from Sydney through the Panama Canal to Vancouver will occupy about thirty days, the passage through the Canal taking seventy-eight hours. The steamer, when fully loaded, has a draught of 21 feet. She carries a crew of thirty-six and makes an average speed of ten knots. The work of loading the rails, which started Wednesday afternoon, is going on briskly at three hundred men employed, the work continuing daily from 7 p.m. until 10 p.m., will take about ten days, and it is expected the steamer will sail next Thursday.

INTERESTING LECTURE

—A fairly large and thoroughly appreciative audience listened with much interest to the lecture by His Honor Judge Warburton last evening in St. James Hall. Rev. W. Orr Mullen occupied the chair. The lecturer, at the outset told of the difficulties encountered by all who had attempted to write a history of Prince Edward Island in procuring definite information concerning the early years of its settlement. Many documents of historic value had either been lost or destroyed in the different "house-cleaning" incidental in the changes from French to British occupation and from intercolonial to self government. In the course of his address, however, the lecturer clearly demonstrated that he had not only found access to very many most interesting documents, but had made a careful study of them. At the close very complimentary remarks were made by Judge Stewart and Mr. K. J. Martin, the former moving and the latter seconding a vote of thanks to the lecturer and both highly recommending a careful study of the history of Prince Edward Island recently written by the lecturer and which was the only authentic and complete history of the island ever written. The proceedings closed with the National Anthem.

PREPARING FOR ICE RACES

A recent letter to a friend in this city from Mr. Ernest McTague, who is in charge of Col. D. A. McKinnon's horses at Dufferin Track, Toronto, gives some interesting particulars regarding the horses now being trained over that track. Mr. McTague states that upwards of fifty horses are gathering, ready for the ice circuit which starts in Toronto Christmas Day and continues until the latter part of January, and probably later, taking in Windsor, Ont., Mt. Clemens, Mich., and Cranwood, Ohio, where a two weeks' meeting will be staged. Some of the most noted performers of the past season are getting ready to battle over the brittle surface. Kate Hall, 20 1/2 over a half mile track, with fourteen firsts dangling to her belt, is there. Billy Bishop, Vera Gratton, Daisy Pointer, Della Unko, Lucy Pointer, T. N. T. Peter Johnson, and dozens of others which have made good over the ice last winter are getting ready for the fray. The track, which is used for running races in summer, is very soft when the weather is at all mild and 220 is a good mile over it. What puzzles the trainers when they come there is the way their horses go back seeming to lose their "whizz". Of course this will all be changed when the cold weather arrives. Then the track will be flooded and the Russian "saw shoes" put on the horses for the ice and fast miles will commence to show up again. Upwards of \$12,000 will be distributed in prizes throughout the circuit this winter and thus an opportunity is given to win some money during an otherwise idle month. There are also parties always looking out for buy horses that make good on the ice as they almost invariably race well on the clay the next summer, being easier in condition than horses that have been let up on.

representatives considered that a careful selection should be made of immigrants to ensure that Canada did not get too many of the undesirable kind. The question arose as to where these immigrants should be examined in regard to their fitness for coming into this country. The transportation companies seemed to favor inspection on this side. The Minister himself, as well as the majority of delegates attending the conference, considered that the point of embarkation was the proper place to have inspection made. This would prevent people coming to Canada and then having to return for any reason after inspection here. At the conclusion of the conference the Minister entertained the delegates to a banquet at the Chateau Laurier.

Hon. Mr. Myers had the pleasure of visiting the Experimental Farm at Ottawa and the Ottawa Dairy Farm as well as several other important stock farms in the neighborhood. He was very much impressed with the splendid roads which have been built, especially the new "Prescott highway, which cost in the vicinity of \$47,000 a mile. He remained in Ottawa for a few days and arranged with Major Ashton and Major Barnett about having a survey made of the Province for immigration purposes through the Soldiers' Settlement. He also interviewed Mr. H. D. Daiglish, head of the Canadian Government Exhibition Com-

mission with reference to having Prince Edward Island put up an exhibit for the British Empire Exhibition to be held in London next year.

The Commissioner spent a few days in Toronto at the Royal Stock Show and was very much pleased with the splendid exhibits of live stock and poultry. He was also greatly interested in the exhibit of wool which showed the difference between sheep receiving proper attention in contrast to those more carelessly handled.

Returning again to Ottawa, Mr. Myers took part in the conference on Exhibitions, being joined by Mr. C. R. Smallwood, secretary of the Charlottetown Exhibition, who was well able to represent the interests of the local Association. Some minor changes were made in the prize list from last year, but in the main the idea of reducing the number of classes was generally adhered to.

Mr. Myers next attended the meetings of the Dairy Council, presided over by Dr. Grisdale and Mr. Riddick. Several important questions were discussed, such as the grading of butter, the grading of cheese, and also a question of particular interest to farmers in this Province, that of the grading of cream. It was pointed out very clearly that it is impossible to make first class cheese and butter unless we are able to supply the factories with first class cream.

After a great deal of discussion it was decided to ask for legislation having for its object the compulsory grading of cream at the different cheese and butter plants. The delegates were entertained on this occasion to a banquet at the Chateau Laurier given by the Federal Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Mr. Motherwell.
