Loss Of Eye Is An Asset

BERLIN, April 20. (British United Press) — A remarkable verdict has just been given in Budapest, recognizing that it is an advantage for a beggar to be a cripple.

As a beggar woman came out of church one day she was knocked down by a motorist and lost one eye and received injuries to her foot which made her a cripple for life.

The motorist was sentenced to prison for reckless driving, but the beggar woman claimed damages for herself to the extent of \$1,875.

The defendant, however, pleaded that, far from doing his victim harm, he had helped her very materially in the pursuit of her profession. He pointed out that she could now beg unmolested for the rest of her life, and that the injuries she had sustained would so affect the sympathies of a kind-hearted public that her income would be sensibly increased.

The court allowed the plea and dismissed the case. The beggar woman did not appeal against the verdict, but cheerfully admitted that her income had indeed already shown a substantial increase.

Missing Rand Gold Reef?

CAPTOWN, April 20. (British United Press) — There is great excitement today at Krugersdorp following a report that the missing Rand Main Reef had been found. Already 420 claims have been pegged, including some of Sir Thomas Cullinan and other well-known persons.

The discovery is alleged to have been made in the district known as Middlelevel 6, adjoining Luipaarsdriev 10, about fifteen miles from Krugersdorp. Important developments are expected to result from the find.

It is conjectured that the gold deposits of the Rand were originally found by subterranean rivers, which carried the gold down to the bed of a lake. Some geological upheaval tilted this enormous basin, one of the curved ends of which reached the surface of the island.

This is the main reef of the Rand. It has hitherto been workable only for a length of sixty miles and a width of from two to three miles. The two ends of the main reef, which runs east and west, dip towards the south; and the outcrop has been traced to Klerksdorp on the west and Heidelberg on the east.

Many vain efforts have been made by borings in these districts to find the missing reef. Prospectors were encouraged by the knowledge that over the Central and West Rand the angle of the reef decreases from about 70 degrees at the surface to 30 degrees at about a depth of 6,000 feet. This fact would seem to indicate that the reef may again approach the surface at some locality.

Krugersdorp considerably farther north than this long-lost-for spot has hitherto been conjectured to lie.

Judge Condemns Credit System

SYDNEY, N. S. W., April 20.—(British United Press)—Strong condemnation of the instalment system of paying for purchases was made by Judge Curlewis, sitting in the Sydney District Court. The case was one in which a firm of music warehousemen sued for recovery of instalments alleged to be due on a piano.

It was stated that the piano had been sold under a hire-purchase agreement for \$1,575 of which \$615 had been paid. Defendant alleged that he had lost his employment, and, being unable to keep up the instalments, had requested the firm to take back the piano. His request had been refused. He was now \$230 in arrears. His counsel asked that respite should be given under the Moratorium Act. Counsel for the plaintiffs asked his Honor to grant them a verdict for the amount claimed.

His Honor: "No fear I won't. I will give a moratorium. I have no sympathy with your people at all. I wish the Legislature would pass an act to stop the sale of goods on time payment unless plaintiff in an action can show they were necessary for the defendant. I think a very great deal of good would be done if no one was allowed to recover on a time-payment agreement unless it was shown that it was necessary for the person buying. That would allow a person to sell a piano to a musician or a motor car to a commercial traveller. It would stop a lot of the selling of jewellery to women, who cannot afford it, and I have always held the opinion I have just expressed. I have seen a fearful lot of misery caused by these time-payment agreements. I would not allow time payments agreements at all if I had my own way unless they were for necessities."

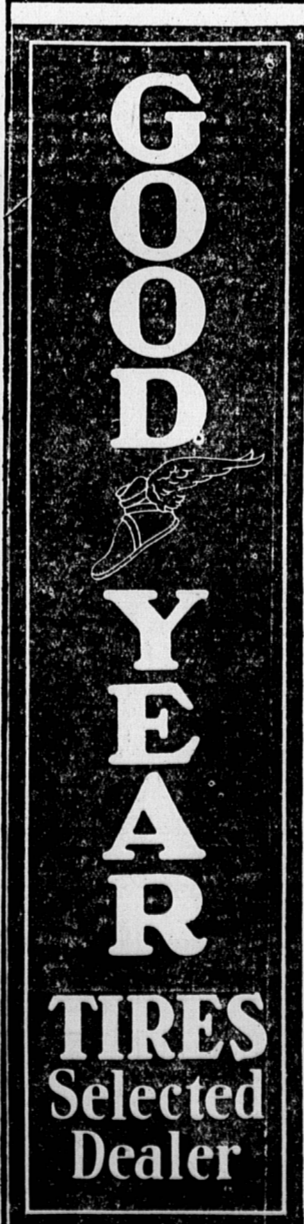

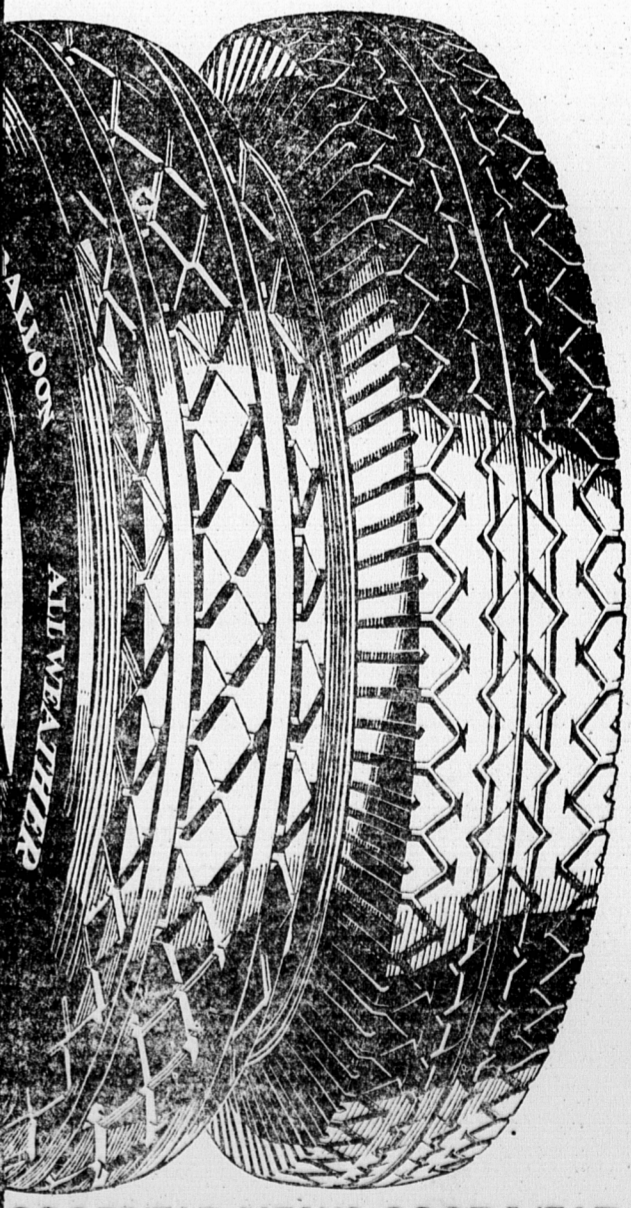
