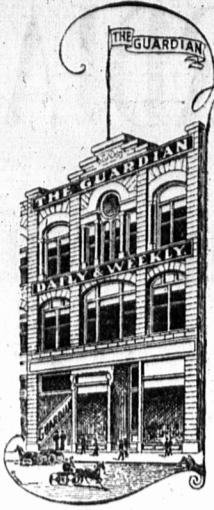

GEN KUROKI PROBABLY DEAD.

A Russian report, very circumstantially stated, relates the death of General Baron Kuroki, which is said to have occurred during the battle of Liao Yang some weeks ago. The report states that he was wounded by a bursting shell and after ward died. It is noteworthy that while in the earlier part of the war and down to the time of the battle of Liao Yang many reports emanating directly from General Kuroki were given out, nothing has been heard directly from him since the famous ten day's fight in which he was so conspicuous. The Japanese methods are so secretive that they are now known to have concealed for months the loss of one of their best battleships, and even denied the loss. A similar motive would prompt concealment in case of the death of one of their most eminent commanders.

We therefore greatly fear that General Kuroki is dead. So far there has been no denial of the early rumor to that effect, nor of the more recent circumstantial statement. It is a great loss to Japan if the report is true. Kuroki came of a fighting family and won distinction in the war with China ten years ago. To him belongs the honor of the first considerable victory on land during the present war. Down to the date of the famous battle of Yalu River it was doubted whether the Japanese soldiers could hold their own, man for man against the Russian forces. Kuroki crossed the river under fire of the enemy's forts, captured their strong position, defeated and routed their army and captured many guns. By this battle the prestige of Japan as a fighting nation was raised higher than ever before. His subsequent battles at Feng Wang Cheng, in the Motien Pass and his successful flanking movements at Liao Yang and other places, made him greatly feared by his Russian foes.

Kuroki was after all the product of the nation and its military system. We now realize how steadfast is the courage, how great the endurance, how admirable the system and methods of the Japanese army. If a general falls there is always another to take his place, equally well trained and perhaps equally capable. Oyama, Nodzu, Oku and Nogi still remain conspicuous in the world's eye and with



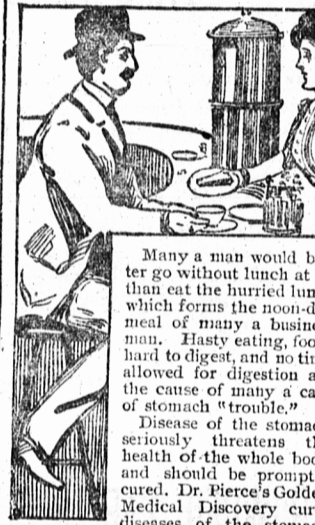

great achievements to their credit. There are doubtless others of almost equal courage and ability of whom the world knows little as yet, but may learn hereafter. So far no man placed in high command on sea or land by the Japanese Government has proved weak or incapable. We can readily believe that even so great a loss as the death of General Kuroki must be admitted to be will have no great effect upon the ultimate issue of the war.

A VERY GRAVE CHARGE.

The signs multiply that the late Dominion election was the most corrupt that this country has yet known. We hear from various parts of our own Island of wholesale distribution of liquor, not on polling day merely, but for weeks previous around the committee rooms and otherwise for corrupt purposes. A still graver and more specific charge comes from Manitoba, of which more will be heard if the first statements made by the Winnipeg Tribune are hereafter confirmed. The charge is boldly made "that in every constituency carried by the Liberals in Manitoba, electors by the score were refused the right to vote. The returning officer had run his pen through their names, and the deputy returning officers refused to give them ballots." So grave a charge if true will doubtless be proven in due time by incontrovertible evidence. If not true, as we would gladly believe, it must recoil upon the heads of whoever concocted the slander.

The charge is one which fortunately is capable of proof or disproof as the case may be, as the poll books and records will be returned to Ottawa and there investigated. If the names of electors were struck off as alleged, and if the original books are returned to Ottawa the proof of the crime will appear. Hon R. W. Scott, Secretary of State in whose department the matter will rest has given his assurance that if any such transaction as the alleged erasure of names has occurred, the guilty officials will be condignly punished, and we know of no member of the Cabinet whose pledged word may be more safely relied upon than his.

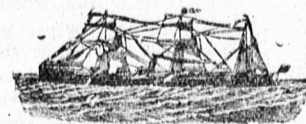
