CADET RATTENBURY HOME ON VISIT.—Cadet Nelson Rattenbury of the Canadian Merchant Marine has arrived home on a short visit to his parents Mr. and Mrs. J. Rattenbury, city. He has made two return trips across the Atlantic since joining the Canadian Miner, about six months ago. His ship took the first consignment of Canadian cattle from Montreal to Dundee after the embargo was lifted. On one trip from this side a bad storm was encountered in which Cadet Rattenbury received a painful cut when thrown by a heavy sea against the steam winch. He spent fourteen days on the ship with this injury before being enabled to enter hospital five weeks. He was in the British channel ports at the time of the general strike when 151 German ships were tied up, the crews being supported by the British Sailors and Firemen's Union. When later a general dock strike was called the Canadian Mariner, including the Canadian Mariner, was tied up. He left Swansea, Wales, for St. John on route home on the Canadian Victor, on which Cadet Rattenbury is an officer. 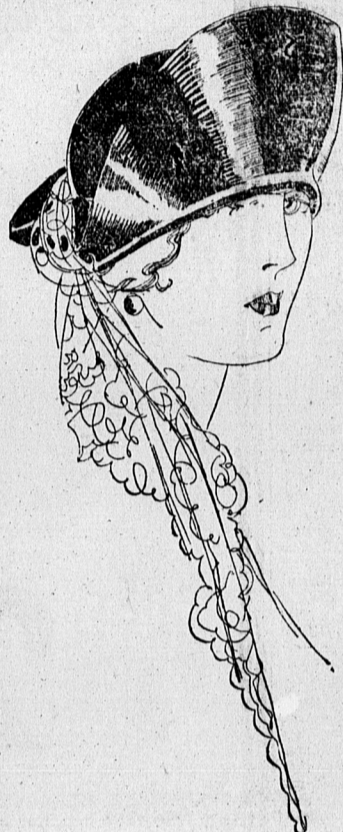
