THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

SOUTHERN SEED FAIR

The Southern Seed Fair held at Murray River on Wednesday, April 10th was pronounced by those in attendance to be a distinct success. The condition of the road and the fact that the Fair had been postponed from the date first set militated against a large attendance and a heavy exhibit. The classes however were fairly well filled and the quality of the exhibits were according to the judges of a very high order. The various classes of wheat oats and barley, were remarkably free from other varieties of grain and weed seeds and reflected the care which is being taken in this portion of the province in the matter of cleaning, grading and selection of seed. The grain was all well-matured and well-filled and did not show to such an extent the ravages of insect and fungus diseases as was noticeable at some of the other fairs. The potato classes were large and the exhibits were also of good quality. The judges were W. R. Shaw Dept. of Agriculture and J. B. Andrews Royalty. The following is the prize list:

There are but forty thousand members in the two countries and no millionaires are connected with it and yet the association seems to have thousands upon thousands of dollars to spend on free literature, advertising, etc.

An inquiry into the association is being made at the present time by the secret service. In Brooklyn at the headquarters of the association the American authorities found a wireless apparatus which was seized.

March 16, 1918
Seaford Camp, Sussex, England.

Dear Grandma—Just a few lines to let you know we are all well and getting along fine. I am not in the 105th Battalion now as you know the 11th Canadian Reserve has been broken up, and I am now in a New Brunswick Battalion. We are stationed at Seaford Camp. And when we go to France we reinforce a New Brunswick Battalion called the 11th Battalion in France. There has been no more medals won in it than in any other Battalion in the British Army. I suppose Carl is home by this time it is just as well as he is too young. If he had remained here he would be very liable to mix up with bad company, as there are lots of bad company in the army.

I got a good conduct stripe the other day so you see by that I'm taking good care of myself. Adoniam Judson got one also, we chum together. I have grown quite fleshy and weigh one hundred and eighty eight pounds. We get lots to eat and not much exercise, as we are trained and waiting for our turn to go to the firing line. Chester Robertson has gone to France.

I have not heard from Howard yet but I guess he's getting along all right. Well, I think I will bring my letter to a close. Hoping to hear from you soon.

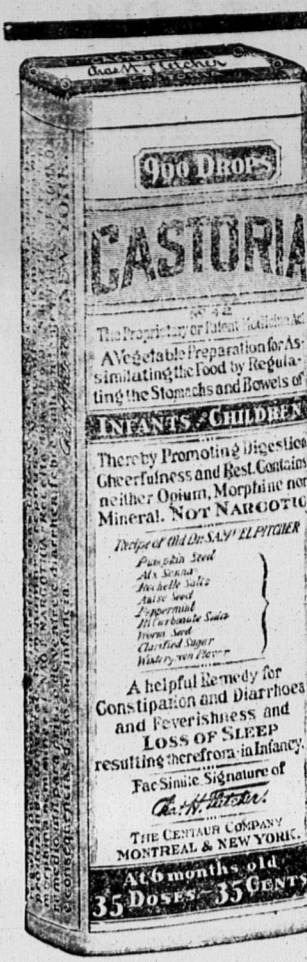

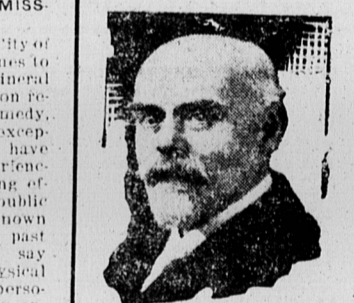
