OUR OTTAWA LETTER

permitting Canada to enlist in her forces resident Americans of military age and giving like authority to the American Government regarding Canadians across the border. In this way a great many may be got at by both countries. The Military Service Act authorizes the enlistment of a number not exceeding one hundred thousand men. The maximum may be obtained, or it may not, but making allowance for exemptions of agriculturists and others it is still believed that the full quota desired can be secured without recourse to the second class.

How is the weather down there? Here the mercury is acting abominably. It has not been above zero for three weeks or more, and on at least one occasion it dropped to 31 degrees below. And when this temperature is accompanied by a stiff wind which rams the frost home unmercifully it takes more than an extra pair of braces to maintain sufficient heat to keep one from freezing. The situation is made much worse by a scarcity of coal. Several schools and churches have had to close on this account. The poor people of the city are of course the greatest sufferers. But they are not the only ones. Dwellers in some of the highly-priced apartment houses complain bitterly of the brand of heat being served up by their landlords. The latter say it is all the fault of the coal and the coal barons. In the meantime the tenant suffers. The policy of buying coal in small lots throughout the fall and winter instead of stocking up during the summer when coal is comparatively easy of access is apparently at the bottom of the trouble so far as apartment dwellers are concerned. In the case of the poor who cannot afford to stock up in the summer it's different. A civic coal-yard seems to be crying necessity here.

Following the arrival of Sir Robert Borden this week an important series of cabinet meetings will be held to deal with matters of pressing urgency and to outline legislation to be dealt with at the Parliamentary session which will commence about the middle of March. This being a new Parliament the House will reassemble on a Wednesday instead of the customary Thursday to elect a speaker Wednesday, March 13th or Wednesday, March 20th, are regarded as the most likely dates, although it is quite possible that arrangements might be made in time for the opening on March 6th.

Mrs. John Bambrick has returned from New York where she visited her daughter, Miss Winnifred, who is a popular harpist and recently had a month's engagement in Philadelphia. Miss Bambrick is on an extensive tour through the Eastern States with a company of artists, and is at present in Boston—Ottawa Citizen.

With a view to preventing any possible difficulties in connection with the counting of soldiers' ballots here and overseas several Orders-in-Council have been passed by the Government. One order provides that where there is a dispute as to whether a ballot is spoiled or not, or as to how it is to be counted the final decision in Canada rests with Mr. J. P. Foley, Clerk of the Crown Chancery, and in England with Captain Purney, Assistant Clerk of the Crown in Chancery. Another order provides that ballots over which there is a dispute as to allocation shall be forwarded to Canada and if they are enough to affect any riding will have to be settled later.
