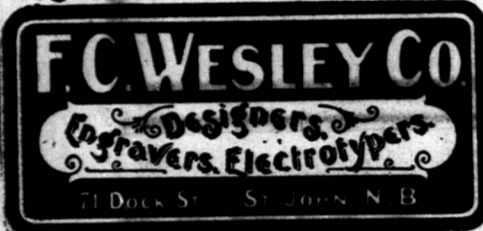

**AUSTRALIAN WEALTH.**

Australia, the The New Holland of our grandfather's days, the penal settlement of fifty years ago, the land of gold a little later, and the great Commonwealth of today, is also conspicuously the land of the Golden Fleece. Not that the fabled ram of Greek mythology, equipped with wings and clad with threaded gold, has found exact reproduction in the far south seas, but that the multiplied flocks of the Commonwealth now furnish one fourth part of the world's wool and one third of its value, spread the sails of a vast commerce, and bring home to their shepherd's the revenues of a Kingdom. Forty years ago her yearly output of wool was eight million pounds and now it is 700 million pounds.

It is told by a magazine writer that in the early days the Australian colonists killed their sheep simply for the fleece and the tallow, leaving the meat for the dogs. Later on they began to export canned mutton, and more recently the shipment of frozen mutton was undertaken until in 1900 these exports amounted to 225 million pounds. Also the tinned meats, sent mainly to the British market, last year totalled 45 million pounds. And Australia is still a land of gold, her product of \$60,000,000 last year leading all other countries. Two thirds of the Australian continent are a desert and yet her four million people have the highest average of wealth and the largest commerce proportionally of any single community on earth.

Twenty million tons of shipping visit Australian ports in a year, the equivalent of the entire Empire's tonnage. The first railway, only 15 miles in length was opened in 1855. To-day Australia owns 15,000 miles of railways. The land contains 100 million sheep and nearly 35 million cattle and horses. Two of her gold districts, Ballarat and Bendigo, have produced 500 millions of dollars in gold alone. In gold, copper, coal and tin Australia has already given to the commerce of the world over two billions of dollars. These splendid achievements may serve to give some impression of the noble possibilities which lie in the pathway of the new Commonwealth of Britons under the Southern Cross.

A St. John's N. F. newspaper tells that on 22nd, April "the mercury went up to 70 in the shade and we were all reminded of the good old days gone by when the Mayflowers made their bow to the butterflies in April." Which is all very pretty, and quite as charming as the weather it describes. But what of the shrouding fogs and chill winds of May and June, and the drifting bergs which even in July come down from the north, mountains of floating ice that carry the winter with them even in midsummer—

Whose green roots sleep In the icy deep  
A hundred fathoms low.  
Whoever hath had his marrow chilled with these things will not be deluded with pretty tales of Mayflowers genuflecting to butterflies and mercury in the seventies.

The St. John's, N. F. Not infrequently the name of some reputable person is forged to one or more of these libellous news items. In such cases the law, if set in force, would send the writers to the penitentiary rather than the jail and for a term of years instead of months. THE GUARDIAN is on the track of one or two of these miscreants and some day an example will be made when it is perhaps least expected. The cowardly creatures deserve no mercy.

Our costly street roller is being run up and down at a cost of something like three dollars a day to little or no purpose. One man engaged in gathering the loose stones off the street would render much more valuable service. These loose stones lame and cripple horses, knock carriages to pieces, puncture bicycle tyres and annoy everybody. And instead of removing them the street repair men are constantly adding to their number by their method of filling holes. Every little depression is heaped with hard broken stones with nothing to hold them in place and they are speedily scattered by horses' hoofs and carriage wheels. If a little earth or clay were mixed with the stone and the roller then passed over it to fix the stone firmly in place, both the roller and the stone might be of some use.

**NO INTENTION OF DROPPING THE COAL TAX.**

LONDON, April 25.—Replying to a numerous and influential deputation representing coal owners, miners, shippers and merchants today, assembled to protest against the export duty on coal, chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, declared he had no intention of dropping the coal tax. He had already admitted that there ought to be some exemption in the cases of existing contracts and thought that on the second reading of the budget bill he ought to be in a position to announce the terms upon which exemptions would be given.
