Last to start and finish, Hogan hit the California Club Course for a one-under-par 71 on the final round to win top money of \$1,000 and his second tournament in this State within three weeks.

It was good enough to give him a three-shot bulge over his closest rival, Sam Snead, holder of the Canadian Open title, who roared home with two par-savings in four rounds today for a total of 282.

Snead, after a 74 for the first round was counted out of the running but he followed that score with a 71 and then carded 69-68 for his final efforts to take second place money of \$750.

New Champions In Ice Figure Skating Will Be Named Late This Month

WINNIPEG, Jan. 26—(CP)—Graceful skaters from East and West converge here late this month for the 31st annual Canadian Figure Skating Championships at the Winnipeg Winter Club where 19-year-old Mary Rose Thacker of Winnipeg, Canada's No. 1 woman athlete, will defend her women's singles crown for the third time.

At the end of the two-day blade show Jan. 30-31, a new men's singles champion will be named to succeed Ralph McCreath of the Toronto Skating Club who, since winning in the 1941 tournament at Montreal, has enlisted in Canada's active army.

New champions will also be named in the seniors. In 1938 McCreath and Veronica Clarke won the pairs and in 1939 and 1940 McCreath teamed with Norah McCarthy of Toronto to win. Last year he triumphed with Eleanor O'Meara of Toronto as his partner.

Winter Club officials expect at least 20 visitors to compete in their own entries will be named after an elimination contest. The entry deadline was Jan. 23.

Champ Contenders
 Mary Rose Thacker, winner of the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada Rose Bowl trophy as the outstanding woman athlete in the Dominion in 1941, and also named in The Canadian Press poll of sport writers for the same honor, has been training under Dr. Otto Giedl, Ottawa.

Miss Thacker, who has been "skating" on the steel blades since she was four years old, sprang into prominence six years ago by winning the junior singles championship at Toronto. She repeated in 1938 and then in '39 and '41 won both the North American and Canadian women's singles titles.

Neither Miss O'Meara nor the McCarthy sisters, Therese and Norah, will skate singles this year at the Winnipeg championship, they have an easier time defending her

 During morning and afternoon the compulsory figures competition will be held for both juniors and seniors. Night performances are all "free skating" including four minutes to music in the ladies' singles, five minutes for men's singles and five minutes each for pairs and fours. Junior pairs skates to music for three and a half minutes. Other competitions are the waltzing and 10-stepping.

Three of the five judges, Arthur L. Dunsart, of Winnipeg, George Peterson of Montreal and Fred Smith of Winnipeg, have been named. The others will be selected soon.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26—(AP)—Mel Ott, new manager of the New York Giants, conferred with President Horace Stoneham today and settled the tangle over whether the Giants would go to Cuba for two exhibition games they have scheduled with Brooklyn Dodgers.

"If we can make arrangements to go by plane, we'll make the trip," said Ott. "But, I wouldn't like to go on a boat."

Canadians Rush To Purchase Sugar Stocks

Buying splurge follows Government order restricting each person to 12 ounces each week.

Provision stores throughout Canada, with scarcely an exception, reported a heavy run on sugar Monday and expressed fear that existing stocks might not outlive the buying splurge. The run followed a federal government order Sunday restricting consumption to 12 ounces a person each week.

Generally, retailers felt the onus was on the customer to abide by the regulations but at the same time most stores restricted purchases to from three-quarters of a pound to 10 pounds, although in exceptional cases amounts up to 40 pounds of granulated sugar were sold.

(Under the order, failure to observe the regulations on the part of the consumer provides a penalty up to \$5,000 or two years' imprisonment. The order applies only to household purchases and supplies, although restaurant patrons were asked to cut down their consumption also. Industrial users will be advised later how restrictions will affect them.)

A Quebec City storekeeper said that "we can't recognize everybody that buys sugar and under the present regulations there is no way of stopping a person from hoarding as much as 200 pounds a week."

A Halifax chain store inaugurated a system of limiting unknown customers to two pounds and allowing customers with large families to buy from five to 10 pounds. Saint John, N.B., reported that

one of the largest stores restricted sugar purchases to 10 pounds for each customer, but that other establishments left the rationing up to the customers.

Some restaurant owners in Toronto, Halifax and Winnipeg favored replacing granulated sugar in the bowls with the lump variety and limiting the amount of lump issued each customer.

Others said they might issue individual 1-2-ounce bags to customers at each meal or just leave granulated sugar on the table and rely on the customers' patriotism to cut down the consumption.

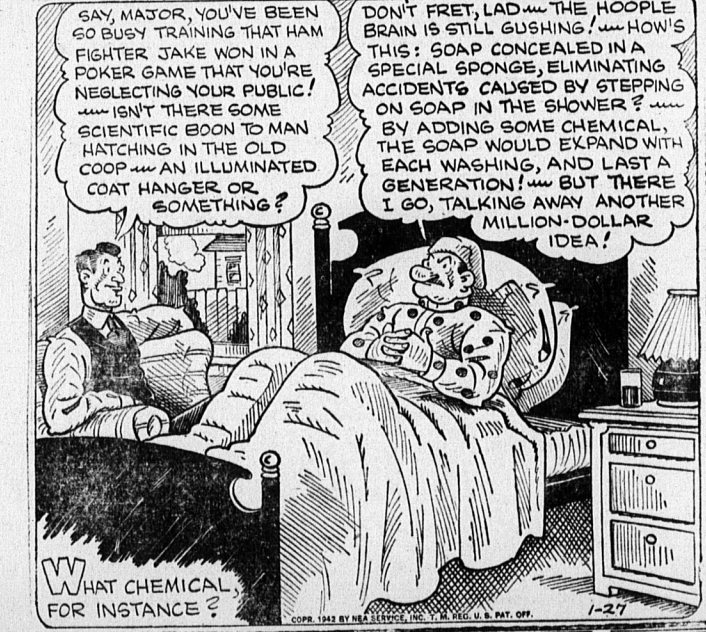
