PRINCE WILL BE READY TO SERVE 900 GUESTS

LONDON, March 11.—The fitting of the battle cruiser Repulse to the Prince of Wales' trip to South Africa and South America is proving a difficult problem.

In addition to the usual complement of 1,250 men, room has to be found for the Prince's staff and servants, numbering more than 90 and the fact that so many occasions, climates and conditions must be provided for necessitates space for an immense amount of baggage, totalling about 200 trunks, 200 chests and other cases.

One difficulty is, the paper says, that the Repulse is not equipped with a laundry and that, therefore, a great stock of laundered things must be taken, as none can be freshened until Cape Town is reached.

Some of the preparations have to do with the entertainments at which the Prince will be accompanied on his arrival at various ports. Twenty-one cooks, stewards and waiters will accompany the party, and sufficient tableware will be taken to serve 300 guests.

BILLION DOLLAR FISH CATCH According to the most authoritative estimate the total fish catch of the world is valued at over \$2,000,000,000 a year.

That represents the price the consumer pays, and includes charges for cold storage, dealers' profits, and so on.

Japan leads the world as a fishing nation, her catch totalling for the year about \$18,000,000. The United States comes next, with just over \$17,000,000; France third, with rather less than \$17,000,000; and Spain fourth, with \$14,000,000. Britain comes next, with about the same value.

The value of fish per hundred weight has fallen greatly in recent years. A year or two ago Britain's catch was valued at \$18,000,000. During recent years there has been a big increase in the amount of capital invested in the industry, America alone having added nearly \$7,000,000 to the value of her fishing boats, nets, and so on.

Most of the world's fish supply comes from the shallow banks near the shores of the continents. It is here that the fish live; and it is well that they do so, for fishing on a large scale is much easier in such places than it would be in the deep seas.—Tit-Bits.
