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Eight Found Dead Inside Wrecked U.S. Air Liner

Lloyd Anderson, Canadian, Was Pilot Of Ill Fated Craft.
SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 25.—The bodies of seven men and a woman were found tonight in the wreckage of a United States Air Lines airplane which crashed in a forest near Salt Lake City in Utah, Utah, Feb. 24. The plane, a Douglas DC-3, was carrying 34 passengers and crew. Eight were found dead inside the wreckage.
