READ THIS WORLD'S REPORT

Miss Slack's Report at Congress in London, Eng.

"The World's W. C. T. U. has headquarters in the chief cities of the different continents. In India we have opened a fine building, which is making a real centre for our cause. This country has one-fifth of the world's population. A great change is coming over the women; they are ceasing to wear the veil, and are coming out into public life in a way never known before. In some Provinces, especially in South India, the Provincial Governments give financial help to us in recognition of the work done. Singing contests in villages are drawing numbers of young people into our ranks; those of us who have visited India know how great an attraction music is. Ninety-five per cent. of the people live in villages. Many of the women there have never attended meetings, never met people outside their own vicinity the coming of the W. C. T. U. singing groups is heralded with great joy and they eagerly join our Temperance Cause. Scotland maintains one organiser there, England one, and in addition we also have native organisers at work who are welcomed throughout the land. In Burma, our best meetings are held in Buddhist fast days, when the Buddhists flock to our Conventions and work happily with the Christian members. In China, W. C. T. U. Headquarters is a great centre. Our members are steadily promoting an age when intoxicants can be bought from 21 to 25.

In China, there is a W. C. T. U. Beggars' Home, a W. C. T. U. Home for Girls, also a W. C. T. U. Home for Women, and Headquarters in Shanghai. During the floods the W. C. T. U. was responsible for the care of 2,500 children. Three organisers have been busily working. We had the first Institution supported by Chinese women, founded by the W. C. T. U. in 1922. The best women's magazine in China is published by the W. C. T. U.

Much work is being carried on in Europe. In Belgium, successful sports W. C. T. U. parties are organised during summer and winter holidays by the President, Madame Pulemans; Temperance addresses are given at intervals with much success. A W. C. T. U. Stall is held at the International Exhibition. The Vanderveelde, part prohibition law, is actively supported.

The last time I was in Istanbul, my Turkish friends took me to see the oldest man in the world, Agra Khan. He assured me he was 160, but at his death doctors announced him to be 120. He spoke to me of being contemporary with Napoleon, and told me of his most simple diet and rigid teetotalism. Our new Union here works under the name of the Green Crescent.

While I was in Bulgaria a few months ago, I saw the announcement placarded on the buildings in Sofia, that wherever intoxicants were sold, non-intoxicating drinks must also be on sale, ordered by a recent new law. This has meant much to the Bulgarians. In Czechoslovakia, Miss Masaryk organized my meeting in Prague. Our new Union at the old city of Bratislava is working well and was represented at the World's W. C. T. U. Convention in Stockholm.

In Palestine there is a well-trained world organiser at work and a bright young Arab woman

in training to take on the work. When Mrs. Polemear was holding meetings in the British Provinces of Bechuanaaland, Chief Khama's Widow, Queen Semane and her son Tshikidi gave her valiant help. A few years ago Chief Khama came to England to beg that intoxicants should not be admitted to his country. Recently, at a W. C. T. U. meeting, many native women walked forty miles to be present; they carried their food and water with them as they had to go through a very hot, dry, bare district. These native women are most zealous to keep intoxicants away from their people.

Service at Belfast Sunday Services at St. John's Presbyterian church, Belfast on July 25 were at 11 a. m. and 3 o'clock in the afternoon and were largely attended. The speaker in the morning was Rev. Mr. Byers, Gen. Secy. of the Lords Day Alliance and his address was much enjoyed and left the feeling with everyone to try and keep the Sabbath in the way it was intended to be kept. He explained that the Alliance was formed almost fifty years ago by our fathers when the different churches across Canada seeing the danger confronting them if something was not done formed this society and though against great odds at all times still on the whole much good has been done by, as the Rev. gentleman said keeping out as it were matters of a foreign nature that if once they get a footing are very hard and at least are almost impossible to eradicate. His illustrations were of a very helpful nature and carried great lessons with them. As this was his first visit to Belfast he expressed his great pleasure at being here and remarked on the beautiful scenery in this part of our fair Island. The annual Orange Service was held in the afternoon and although the day was very hot a large congregation was present and a number of visitors. Several members from the Kings Co. lodges were present also the surrounding ones and a large number joined in the

parade from the Polly Monument to the church. The parade was headed by Bro. John L'Estrange with the Union Jack, and all through they presented a very fine appearance. Rev. Mr. Byers who is a member of one of the Maritime lodges was present and introduced by the pastor Rev. Wallace Wadland and brought greetings from his lodge and gave a short address. Mr. Wadland's address was on Freedom taking as his text "The truth shall make you free." A good choir was in attendance and the music was much enjoyed especially by the visitors. At the close of the service after the congregation were dismissed the parade was again reformed and marched to the Soldiers Monument where all joined in the National Anthem.—B.

Quebec, 27.44 cents; New Brunswick, 31.68 cents; Nova Scotia, 32.08 cents; Prince Edward Island, 35.37 cents. For a commodity which has become one of the very sinews of nearly every line of business and which is a necessity in so many lines of human activity, this is obviously a crushing tax. Over Canada it simply means that for every dollar a consumer puts in gasoline, 27.83 cents goes in taxes. Moreover these figures do not indicate the full tax content of a gallon of gasoline. They do indicate however those which can be directly charged by the retailer and marketer against an already over-taxed necessity.

Is Highest In every province of the Dominion the tax content of every dollar's worth of gasoline bought exceeds 25 cents and in three of them it is over 30 cents. By a recent computation it has been shown that in this singular tax parish of Alberta surprisingly has the lowest levy. When a purchaser spends \$1.00 for gasoline in Alberta, he may count that 25.04 cents goes toward taxes. In other provinces the corresponding figures are—Saskatchewan, 25.17 cents; Manitoba, 26.28 cents; British Columbia, 26.29 cents;
