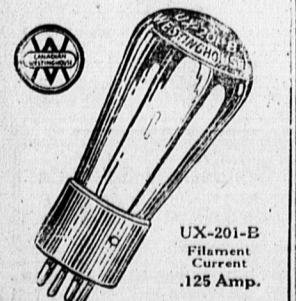

WONDERS OF THE CLOUDS

Bluebooks seldom lend themselves to the art of the illustrator, but the Air Publication (British) 1,234 contains photographs that would do credit to the exhibition of the Royal Air Force. The publication, although designed primarily for the use of officers of the Royal Air Force, will appeal to all who are interested in meteorology.

Clouds, according to the "Manual of Air Pilots," reached to immense heights. "Mares' tails," those tufted storm-signals of the sky, are found at 30,000 feet—higher than the tallest mountains of the Himalayas. Thunderstorms generally take the shape of detached cumulus clouds, about a mile above the earth, usually in the form of an anvil. The "Manual" contains beautiful cloud photographs taken from airplanes.

Modern air navigation instruments are so intricate that the pilot must be a mathematician of more than ordinary ability to make use of them. Knowledge of magnetism, wireless telegraphy, physics, air-dynamics, stresses, strains, and pressure are all required of the young flying officer.

Some modern Johnson will one day evolve a dictionary of flying jargon. Even the Air Ministry has been forced to recognize such abstract terms as "azimuth," "graticule," "hachuring," "orienting a map," and a "rumb line."

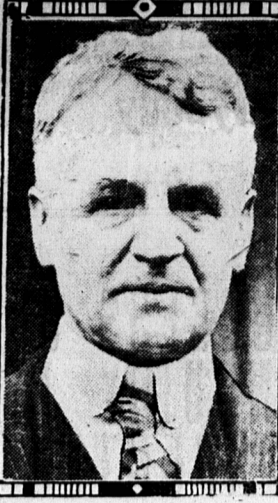

MARRIAGE LAWS IN POLAND

Some men in Warsaw are asking themselves the question, "Am I married or am I not?" And others are asking themselves, "Am I guilty of bigamy or haven't I a wife at all?"

The difficulty arises over the marriage laws of Poland, which apply to districts without having force throughout all Poland. If a resident of Warsaw, where no civil marriage exists, goes to Posen and marries a Posen girl by civil marriage the wedding is valid only in that province.

If he returns to Warsaw and asks for a divorce, the judge tells him that he has no wife, since Warsaw recognizes only marriages celebrated by the church. If the man marries again, this time in Warsaw, his first wife goes to court and charges her husband with bigamy.

There are a number of such cases now in the Polish courts. Because of the slowness of appeal, the Supreme Court of Poland has not considered the matter. A move toward unification of the law was made by equalizing the rights of daughters and sons to their father's inheritance. Formerly, in provinces observing the Russian law, the sons were privileged.

The penal law is little better off than the domestic relations law. Crimes are punished in one province which go unmarked in other provinces. There also is a difference in the degrees of punishment. Galicia is the only part of Poland with juries.

In Posen, bankruptcy is treated severely. All insolvent persons are liable before the penal court, in Warsaw, only merchants go to prison for bankruptcy. People, therefore, prefer to lend money in Posen, where their interests are better protected.

BIRDS AS TRADESMEN.

Birds the most perfect builders, and—strange as it may sound—they are scarcely a trade that you will not find represented among these feathered craftsmen.

Many of the nests of birds are marvels of ingenuity, but their greatest efforts pale beside the wonders of the tropics. Weavers, carpenters, tailors, plasterers, tanners—these are but a few of the nesters—these are but a few of the many trades that we find practiced when the nesting season arrives.

The sand-martin and the king-fisher, both belong to the guild of tunnelers, and are content with a burrowed hole. Ducks, gulls, water-hens, and coracles are all primitive builders with no ideas beyond a rough and scanty collection of materials loosely thrown together on the ground.

The house swallow is a plasterer, employing as his building material nothing more than mud, but out of this he contrives to erect a nest that is wonderfully strong, and put together with neatness and care.

The singing thrush uses more varied materials, a mixture of clay, cow manure, and moss, but well and truly laid and forming a splendid home for the young birds.

The commonest form of nest—that built by crows, mussel-thrushes, and so on—is rather like a basket. Not content with a felt basket or cradle to contain the eggs and young, the wren, water-wagtail, and tit place a roof overhead, and construct a door at the side through which entrance is obtained. One of the most curious examples of this type of nest is that of the titmouse, which is strangely like a bottle in shape.

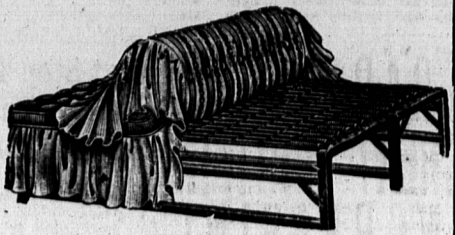
