LONDON, February 28.—During the course of a statement on public business in the house of commons to-day Mr. Balfour the government leader mentioned the facts that the supplementary estimates for this year would be very heavy including over £1,000,000 for the navy and £3,000,000 for the army. In reply to a question Sir Michael Hicks-Beach chancellor of the exchequer said for the year ending March 25, 1900, direct taxation contributed 43.4 per cent and indirect taxation 51.6 per cent of public revenue.

DOCTOR ANDERSON

Resigns as Principal Of P. W. College.

PRESENTATION MADE.

And a Number of Feeling Addresses Delivered—Work Reviewed.

Yesterday morning Dr. Anderson formally severed his connection with Prince of Wales College and before doing so feelingly addressed the students referring to the ties that had been strengthened by the lapse of thirty nine years. He reviewed the advance of the institution, referring to agitation for new building. He asked the students to do all they could to assist the new staff by causing them no unnecessary anxiety. After paying a tribute to Prof. Robertson he introduced Mr. J. C. McMillan, the newly appointed professor.

Prof. Robertson thanked the students for their hearty and generous approval on behalf of Dr. Anderson and himself. To P. E. Islanders, he said, Dr. Anderson has appealed very forcibly and they had gone out and carried his name and the name of P. W. C. with them.

Mr. George McMillan, on behalf of the students, then presented Dr. Anderson with the following address and a handsome dressing case and fountain pen, to which the Doctor made a suitable reply: Alexander Anderson, L.L.D., Chief Superintendent of Education:

RESPECTED SIR,—On this occasion of your resignation of the principalship of Prince of Wales College we feel that it will not be fitting for us to allow you to depart without showing you some evidence of our appreciation of your services during the period of your long and distinguished career in connection with this institution.

We know that it is chiefly through the instrumentality of your persistent efforts that Prince of Wales College has attained to such prominence along educational lines, and the greatest proof of your success as a public instructor is the high standing which your students have always attained as they prosecuted their studies at higher seats of learning; as well as the efficiency manifested by the teaching profession of this province. We also recognize the fact that mainly through your persistent exertions we are now privileged to be situated in this splendid building surrounded by all modern conveniences, for you have always taken a hearty interest in the physical comfort as well as the intellectual welfare of your pupils. We feel assured that at the head of the educational system of our province you will continue as in the past to do your utmost for the advancement of every thing that pertains to the progress and future development of all our educational interests.

Although it is with sentiments of profound regret that we contemplate the loss of the services of our highly honored principal, yet we are firmly convinced that it will be for the welfare of our educational department to have at its head such an experienced educationalist.

Now, Sir, in conclusion, we ask you to accept this as a slight token of our sincere regard and esteem.

BRITISH FORCE CUT UP.

MOMBASA, East Coast of Africa, February 28.—A British expedition of five hundred men, after making a eight days march of 114 miles into the Somali country, to punish them for killing Sub-Commissioner Jenner, was attacked February 19, at Sandassa, 29 miles from Afmaba and lost 17 men killed, including Lieutenant Colonel Maitland. The Somalis were beaten off with the loss of 130 men killed. The cattle captured on the march stampeded and lost. The expedition had returned to Afmaba.

Maynard retired and when he awoke found his wife dead. The bed is soaked with blood from two knife wounds in the wife's neck. The prisoner is 33 years old.
