

A DIVORCEE MARRIED TO YOUNG LORD

Bride Was Formerly a Chorus Girl. Groom Forfeits a Snug Legacy

MADNESS OF BARON SIMULATED

ROME, Mar. 5—Baron Vincenzo Paterno, who will have to stand trial for the murder of Princess Trigona Di Sant Eli, has been acting strangely for the past twenty-four hours. The attending physicians give it as their opinion, however, that he is simulating insanity. At times he appears sane enough, but when interrogated pretends unconsciousness, particularly if the question is one having any connection with the crime. Now and then he mutters as tho in delirium. Occasionally he exclaims, "The knife, the knife. I must procure it. She has taken it. She has wounded herself." This seems to be Paterno's fixed formula, varied with other exclamations, such as "Blood! Help!"

According to the physicians Paterno has had his own evidence in his mind that doubtless will declare that Princess Trigona committed suicide. The authorities consider such a statement absurd, in view of the fact that the princess, in addition to having a stab wound in the neck, received a wound in the back, which in itself would have proved fatal. The body of the murdered princess arrived at Palermo today. Great crowds lined the streets and displayed the utmost sympathy. Many of the women spectators wept. It is probable that an operation will be performed on Paterno tomorrow. His physical condition is improving steadily and he is believed now to be entirely out of danger. The people are loud in their denunciation of the man because of the martyrdom he is alleged to have made his victim suffer before the murder.

EMANCIPATION FOR PEASANTS

ST. PETERSBURG, Mar. 3—In an imperial rescript published today, Emperor Nicholas announces his intention to complete his grandfather's work for the emancipation of the serfs by transforming the peasants into not merely free but economically sound land owners. This may be achieved, the emperor says, by affording the peasants facilities to leave their communes and by improvement in agricultural science.

PRESIDENT ORDERS ARMY MANOEUVERS

To Test Readiness for War. Twenty Thousand Troops Will Be Arrayed

WASHINGTON, March 7—In answer to the charge that the United States army is not prepared for actual warfare, the General Staff, by direction of the President, has ordered a magnificent test of mobilization of the army on a scale greater than has ever been before attempted in a time of peace, in reproduction, as nearly as possible, of war conditions. The President gave the word last night, ordering the assemblage of 20,000 troops of the fourth entire army corps in Texas. A formidable fleet of armoured cruisers, supplemented by auxiliaries, will take its place off the Texas shore line.

DAVID RUSSELL ORDERED TO SHOW HIS HAND

MONTREAL, Mar. 2—Justice Guerin in the practice court today ordered David Russell, who is taking action against the Pinkerton National Detective Agency for alleged conspiracy before the defence attorneys.

The judge held that the plaintiff's objections to the motion for particulars, because it was too late, was unfounded in law. Accordingly, therefore, he ordered the plaintiff to produce within eight days either originals or copies of letters which he intends to put in evidence. He also ordered the plaintiff to declare that he does not intend to prove any facts other than those in his declaration, to particularize the special facts of the conspiracy, to produce telegrams and alleged forged signatures, and also to specify his real and special damages in the \$200,000 suit. In the \$52,000 damage action, he is ordered to name the time and place of the investigation, in which the Pinkerton's reports proved to be false, and to specify where and how many, if not more than one, heard the alleged confession on the part of John W. MacNamara. He is also ordered to specify particulars of the damages caused and particulars of the investigations made by private detectives.

INSANE MURDERER FOR LUNATIC ASYLUM

MONTREAL, Mar. 5—Incarceration in a criminal lunatic asylum is to be the fate of Thomas Waterhouse, who, having been committed to take his trial in the King's bench court, on the charge of killing his wife, was yesterday brought before a jury and adjudged unfit, on the ground of insanity, to stand for trial. The insanity was ascertained on his own confession, after having beaten his wife with a baseball bat. Four medical men gave evidence yesterday and they were unanimous that Waterhouse was suffering from senile melancholia.

CHIEF OF POLICE A MURDERER

DANVILLE, Va., Mar. 3—The man who for five years has held the position of Chief of Police of Danville, under the official name of R. B. Harnden, was shown today to be Edward Strupling, murderer and an escaped prisoner from Hardis County, Georgia, who gained his liberty while serving a life term. Last night he was taken back to Georgia to be hanged by the court fourteen years ago. He has a wife and ten children in Danville.

INTERNATIONAL MOTOR JOURNEY

Run Will Be 1200 Miles From Washington to Ottawa and Return

MONCTON FIRE DEPARTMENT BUSY

MONCTON, Mar. 5—The fire department was called out three times Saturday between 10.30 in the morning and 10.30 at night. The first was a chimney fire on Highfield street, which did not require the services of the firemen. The second alarm at 5.30 was for a blaze around a chimney in the house of Highfield street occupied by G. Woriman. About 9.30 the department was called out for a fire in Geo. Prince's house near the new I. C. R. shops. As the building is situated west of the I. C. R. and there is no crossing the department was unable to reach the scene and the building was totally destroyed. The loss to Mr. Prince is about \$500.

COMMUNICATION THROUGH PROVINCE AND WITH MAINLAND

The Earl Grey, which had been stuck in the heavy ice on Monday three miles off the east end of Pictou Island, yesterday at daylight worked herself free and proceeded to Georgetown, docking at 11.20 a. m. She brought over one hundred and seventeen cattle, twelve passengers and all Saturday's mail, which consisted of one hundred and twenty bags. The mail and passengers were brought to land by special train, which arrived at 2.30 p. m. The Earl Grey will leave today at 7.00 a. m. for Pictou, taking passengers and four cars oats, seven cars mixed freight and ten horses, but no mails. The Minto, which became stuck in the ice on Monday morning while en route to Pictou from Georgetown, left her old position at 7.00 a. m. yesterday, proceeded about five miles further on and again became stuck in the ice, remaining there over night. She will attempt to proceed this morning. Six iceboats left Cape Tormentine at 7.20 a. m. yesterday with a full day's mail (85 bags) and two passengers, and arrived in Cape Traverse at 11.50 a. m. The mail was brought to this city by special train, arriving at 1.55 p. m. Five iceboats left Cape Traverse yesterday at 7.15 a. m. with thirty bags of mail and six passengers arriving at Cape Tormentine at 11.30 a. m. The special train to Cape Traverse left this city yesterday at 9.00 p. m. taking a few passengers for local points and thirty-one bags mail. Yesterday the express train was one hour late, the western express twenty minutes late, and the Summerside accommodation ten minutes late. The Southern express train arrived here on time.

By Lieut. Governor Rogers. Speech from the Throne. New Members Introduced. Members Take Oath of Allegiance. The Address.

Yesterday afternoon, bright sunshine without, and with the usual military display and boom of guns His Honor Lieutenant Governor Rogers opened the Provincial Legislature. A large crowd outside the building, and a full house and galleries within attested that popular interest still attaches to the chief provincial state ceremonial. A goodly number of ladies were seated within the bar which separates the members from the ranks of citizenship at ordinary meetings of the Legislature. This being the first sitting of the House since the death of King Edward VII of illustrious memory and the accession of King George V, the members in attendance at the clerk's table formally took the oath of allegiance to the new Sovereign. Prompt to the minute Lieutenant Governor Rogers entered the Chamber and being seated read the following speech: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:— It is my great pleasure to welcome you on assembling to assume your Legislative duties on this the first occasion since my appointment as Lieutenant Governor of this Province, and to congratulate you upon the unprecedented prosperity of our people. Our thanks are again due to Almighty God for a bountiful harvest and the many blessings which we as a Province enjoy. The death of our beloved Sovereign King Edward VII, deeply lamented the wide world over, has been a great loss not only to the vast Empire over which he reigned so acceptably, but to all other nations as well. His efforts in the cause of Peace gave to him the well earned name of "Edward the Peacemaker." We believe that his son and worthy successor, King George V, will be found to possess the gifts and qualities of his illustrious father and to persevere in the same course, so conducive to the welfare and prosperity of the Empire. The representatives of the several Provincial Governments met in Ottawa during the month of December last, to consider the question of the representation of the Provinces in the Dominion House of Commons, and although no decision was reached, I still have confidence that the sense of justice which I believe pervades the minds of the members of the Dominion Parliament will be the means of restoring to the Maritime Provinces (Continued on page 6)

POLICY OF NEW FRENCH CABINET

PARIS, March 5—The new cabinet met tonight and drew up the declaration which will be delivered in the chamber of deputies tomorrow. This declaration says that in the interests of social peace, the railroad employees of the state who were dismissed at the time of the recent strike, will be taken back into service, with the exception of those who were guilty of gross insubordination and destruction of property. The railroads not under state supervision will be requested to act similarly with regard to their employees. The declaration outlines the government's policy in respect to the laws, the liquidation of the schools, social reforms and foreign affairs. It affirms the government's determination to pursue a policy of pacification, based on the one hand on a system of ententes and alliance and on the other of a strong army.

CUT WAGES AND CURTAIL EMPLOYEES

TOLEDO, Ohio, Mar. 3—A reduction of two per cent. in wages, curtailment of the number of employees, and the working hours from ten to eight has been ordered for the locomotive department of the Lake Shore Railroad in Toledo to take effect tomorrow. Instructions are to lay off men wherever it is possible to do so. The places of the boiler makers who struck here nearly two weeks ago have been filled.

KING GEORGE WILL ENTERTAIN 100,000

LONDON, March 5—King George will entertain 100,000 children of London, according to an announcement. A Coronation fete to be held in Crystal Palace June 30.

FAIR AND COLD

SIFTON TO RESIGN SEAT AND ENTER BRITISH POLITICS?

BRANDON, Man., Mar. 2—It is reported here Hon. Clifford Sifton will resign his seat and enter politics in England. OTTAWA, Mar. 2—Hon. Clifford Sifton, interviewed tonight, said there was no truth in the report that he would resign his seat in the federal house and enter politics in Great Britain. He said: "I do not intend to resign my seat. There is no truth in the report at all." Asked if he thought it true the West was a solid unit for reciprocity he said: "I don't think any one man can speak with assurance as to what the voice of the West is on that or any other question."

LORD DENMAN FOR AUSTRALIA

MELBOURNE, March 3—It is officially announced that the governor-general will retire in July. Various rumors have been afloat for considerable time that Lord Dudley would relinquish his office, but whenever such appeared prompt denials were forthcoming. Lord Dudley will be succeeded by Lord Denman, a prominent liberal peer.

ASQUITH MAKES A NEW PEER

LONDON, March 3—Premier Asquith has started in to even up the political complexion of the upper house and the first new peer to be created in his brother-in-law, Sir Edward Priaul Tennant, whose elevation was announced this evening. As a liberal he represents Salisbury in parliament from 1906 to 1910, being defeated in the latter year.

FATHER OBJECTED TO HER CHINESE LOVER

MONTREAL, Mar. 5—Because he would not permit her to marry the man of her choice, Charlie Golan, a Chinaman, Heloise Aubin had her father arrested for non-support, and he appeared yesterday before Recorder Dupuis, and was remanded eight days for medical examination. The case presents many peculiar features. The father, Almes Aubin, some eighteen years ago left his wife and family and disappeared completely. He wasn't seen or heard of until his re-appearance about a year ago. During his absence his eldest daughter had married, and he hastened to hunt her up, and paid her frequent visits, but took no measures to find or see the rest of the family. Another daughter became acquainted with a Chinaman, and in the course of their acquaintance she says she grew to love him very much. She is only seventeen, and her father swore she shouldn't marry until she was twenty-one.

ONTARIO ON RECIPROCITY

Of Using Public Material and Men in Building Himself A Dwelling

INSURGENT MEXICANS IN BIG BATTLE

SENSATIONAL SUIT IS ON IN PARIS

NEW YORK, N. Y., Mar. 4—Mrs. Cornelia Baxter McKee Tevis, divorced wife of Hart McKee of Pittsburgh, has filed a sensational suit in Paris against Nedjib Melham Pasha, formerly one of the favorite ministers of the Sultan Abdul Hamid. After having found him a sympathizing friend the despatch says, Mrs. Tevis placed jewels and stocks and bonds in his care, she avers and now files suit to regain them. The Turk in his defence says the valuables in question were given to him by Mrs. Tevis to raise money for her and he made her an advance payment of \$60,000 to meet her obligations.

TYPHOID'S RAVAGES AROUSES OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Mar. 5—Dr. Hodgetta, chief health officer of the conservation commission, acting in co-operation with the provincial and the local boards of health, is to conduct an inquiry with the object of ascertaining the source of the typhoid fever outbreak in Ottawa. His plan is for a collective investigation which will start with an inquiry into every case, beginning with more recent ones, and working back to try and trace their history to a common source. As it is now so certain that the Ottawa water supply is to blame for the thousand or more typhoid cases and twenty-five deaths, the milk supply will also be investigated. Dr. Hodgetta will be assisted by Dr. Bell, chief inspector for the Provincial Board of Health; Major Drum, of the Army Medical Service, and as many men are required from the conservation commission. On Saturday afternoon the medical health department was scored for its inactivity at a mass meeting addressed by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Prof. Adam Shortt, Dr. Montanbert and other prominent citizens. In the evening a citizens' league was formed for the purpose of drilling the civic officials and aldermen into their duties and responsibilities in the matter of the people's health.
