A meeting of the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association was held in the office of W. K. Rogers yesterday afternoon. This organization it will be remembered, was established some three years ago by a number of leading ranchers to combat the fox stealing which was prevalent at that time.

The Association had a membership of twelve ranches, these comprising some of the most enterprising and largest breeders in the vicinity of Charlottetown. They employed legal counsel, retained the services of the best detective firm in Montreal and purchased one of the best man tracking bloodhounds from the southern states.

"Gyp the Blood", as he is familiarly known, is famous in Louisiana for his wonderful intelligence in tracking criminals. Previous to his purchase by the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association he had been employed for two years on several man trackings and gave a wonderful account of himself. Since coming to this province "Gyp" has had few opportunities to display his prowess, but on the occasions in which his services were utilized he showed the most astounding intelligence and acuteness of scent. Both these occasions were, however, for other purposes than fox stealing, and "Gyp" has never yet been called upon to track a fox thief. However, he is kept in condition for this purpose, being regularly run and fed according to the schedule furnished by his breeders. Full instructions have been given to his keeper, who follows them most rigidly. He has a large wired pen with a comfortable den for his habitat and is kept just a little on the lean side so that he is always muscular and fit for a long run if necessary.

Remarkable tales, are told of the distances these animals can travel in pursuit of their quarry, and not two years ago when a dog from the same establishment was used for tracking a criminal in Maine, it was stated that he covered 300 miles in two and a half days. His blood curdling bayings struck terror into the people and it was not difficult for people to keep track of his whereabouts. When he finally got his man the poor creature was terror stricken, the bloodhound standing over him and glaring at him ferociously, but intensely pleased to deliver him over to the officers of the law.

The record of the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association so far has been an absolutely clean one, and the President received the congratulations of the members yesterday on the good work accomplished. So far fox thieves have given up the ranches included in this membership, a wide berth, and well they might, for with the legal machinery, high class detectives, man tracking bloodhound and the large cash resources behind this organization, they are not likely to be successful.

Seaman, to be given annually to the pupil making the highest marks in the Matriculation Examination in English. During the past year there were two who equally merited this prize—Keir Duggan, Kensington High School and Earl Ebers, West Kent School, Charlottetown, both of these young men having made 89 percent in this subject. Your Executive accordingly decided to divide the prize (\$10) equally between these two scholars.

### Salary Question

It was felt that since the revenue of the Province had been materially increased by a further grant from the Dominion Government at least a portion of the amount should be devoted to increasing the salaries of Teachers. Your Executive took the matter up and in a series of letters published in the daily newspapers endeavored to secure the sympathetic co-operation of the general public. Committees were appointed to prepare a brief and to present the matter to the members of the Provincial Government. As you no doubt are aware your committee waited on the Executive of the P. E. Island Government. We were very cordially received but I am sorry to relate obtained very little encouragement from the Premier and members of the Executive. "Gyp the Blood", as he is familiarly known, is famous in Louisiana for his wonderful intelligence in tracking criminals. Previous to his purchase by the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association he had been employed for two years on several man trackings and gave a wonderful account of himself. Since coming to this province "Gyp" has had few opportunities to display his prowess, but on the occasions in which his services were utilized he showed the most astounding intelligence and acuteness of scent. Both these occasions were, however, for other purposes than fox stealing, and "Gyp" has never yet been called upon to track a fox thief. However, he is kept in condition for this purpose, being regularly run and fed according to the schedule furnished by his breeders. Full instructions have been given to his keeper, who follows them most rigidly. He has a large wired pen with a comfortable den for his habitat and is kept just a little on the lean side so that he is always muscular and fit for a long run if necessary.

Remarkable tales, are told of the distances these animals can travel in pursuit of their quarry, and not two years ago when a dog from the same establishment was used for tracking a criminal in Maine, it was stated that he covered 300 miles in two and a half days. His blood curdling bayings struck terror into the people and it was not difficult for people to keep track of his whereabouts. When he finally got his man the poor creature was terror stricken, the bloodhound standing over him and glaring at him ferociously, but intensely pleased to deliver him over to the officers of the law.

The record of the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association so far has been an absolutely clean one, and the President received the congratulations of the members yesterday on the good work accomplished. So far fox thieves have given up the ranches included in this membership, a wide berth, and well they might, for with the legal machinery, high class detectives, man tracking bloodhound and the large cash resources behind this organization, they are not likely to be successful.

### Seaman Memorial Prize

In December 1924, the executive of the P. E. I. T. F. decided to establish a prize, in memory of the late Mr. J. D. Seaman, to be given annually to the pupil making the highest marks in the Matriculation Examination in English. During the past year there were two who equally merited this prize—Keir Duggan, Kensington High School and Earl Ebers, West Kent School, Charlottetown, both of these young men having made 89 percent in this subject. Your Executive accordingly decided to divide the prize (\$10) equally between these two scholars.

### Salary Question

At our last Annual Convention a resolution was passed dealing with the matter of Teachers' salaries. It was felt that since the revenue of the Province had been materially increased by a further grant from the Dominion Government at least a portion of the amount should be devoted to increasing the salaries of Teachers. Your Executive took the matter up and in a series of letters published in the daily newspapers endeavored to secure the sympathetic co-operation of the general public. Committees were appointed to prepare a brief and to present the matter to the members of the Provincial Government. As you no doubt are aware your committee waited on the Executive of the P. E. Island Government. We were very cordially received but I am sorry to relate obtained very little encouragement from the Premier and members of the Executive. I shall not go into the matter further now as a complete report will be given you during tomorrow morning's session.

### Reduction in Salaries

It was learned during the year that owing to lack of attendance on the part of the pupils, quite a number of teachers had not received their full salaries for 1926-27. These teachers were communicated with and further information showed that most of them had since obtained the deductions, that had been made from their allowances either from the school districts or from the Department of Education. One teacher however has not as yet had a satisfactory settlement of the matter and your Executive have been in correspondence with the School District concerned at the time of the meeting. It was the intention to place the matter in the hands of an attorney but the teacher has requested us to forego further action. I would suggest, that in the future, teachers, from whose salaries deductions are made, should give the Federation full authority to carry through to a successful issue such matters as here referred to.
