THE ENGLISH EDUCATION BILL.
 LONDON, December 3.—The House of Commons had the education bill under debate to-day, and Premier Balfour having appealed to the public spirit of all classes to do their best to insure the working of the bill, then which he said, no better alternative measure had been proposed, the house adopted the third reading of the measure by 265 votes to 123. The bill was immediately sent to the House of Lords, where, in the presence of only three peers it was formally read for the first time.
