A Move Made For Industrial Protection

The following is an extract from an interview with Mr. A. Young, ex-Labor member of the British House of Commons, printed in the Toronto Daily Star, July 27:

On the subject of protection and imperial preference Mr. Young holds positive views. "I am very strongly in favor of it," he said, "and I think the majority of Labor men in the British Isles are in favor of it. Of course, there are theorists like Snowden who oppose it but before long they will be over-ruled. As I see it, protection will help re-establish our industries and the working man will be given a better chance of employment."

Out here you have tariffs and the standard of living is much higher than it is at home. In the United States there are still higher tariffs and in the United States the standard of living is still higher. Of course I realize that in the United States there is free trade between the States, but the position of the Empire would not be dissimilar. There might not be free trade between the countries of the Empire, but there would be an effective preference."

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Aug. 11.—Four persons are reported to have been killed and 100 injured in the small village of Borculo in Eastern Holland near the German border, when it was struck by a typhoon which lasted several minutes, last night. The village is a mass of ruins. Both churches were demolished and not a single house escaped damage.

Troops Massacred

PARIS, Aug. 11.—Premier Paul Painleve admitted Sunday that 106 French troops were massacred by natives during the recent disturbances in Syria. Their wounded commander killed himself to escape capture.

HUGE EXPORTS OF LIQUOR TO UNITED STATES

Large Quantities of Whiskey and Beer are Being Shipped Across Border

MONTREAL, Aug. 11.—Canada is doing a big business in one line—one that will come as a surprise to most people on this side of the border—the export of whiskey and beer to the United States.

This export is all of liquor imported with the knowledge of the United States authorities, and none of the cargoes that are taken from Rum Row or are pushed across the border in the dead of night on heavy balloon tired trucks are included. That is another phase of the situation.

The fact remains that last month the Volstead country below the border took from the Dominion \$713,393 of whiskey and \$1,347,341 of beer. And it all went over in a legitimate manner.

And the United States demand seems to be increasing. In the past twelve months Canada has increased her exports of beer by approximately \$3,000,000 the figures being \$12,907,678 as compared with \$9,269,652; and nearly doubled her exports of whiskey, the figures being \$7,924,500 compared with \$4,328,652.

A Puzzling Situation

While much of this liquor is imported to Canada from Great Britain a large amount is manufactured in the country. The puzzle is how such an enormous amount comes to be imported into a country that is officially "dry."

And here is the reason as supplied by a Montreal business man: "All this liquor is exported legitimately but whether in the end it is received legitimately is another matter. The stuff goes to reliable firms on the other side of the border, and what happens to it then is only the concern of the American authorities. It must not be forgotten that liquor can still be used in the States for medicinal purposes and it looks as if a very large amount of it is from the figures. At the same time it is interesting to notice that the United States is sending us back no liquor in exchange. This is one of the commodities that is entirely on the credit side of the national ledger."

Canada is also in a better position, as shown by the last month's trade figures for this country and the United States. Not only are Canadian imports from the United States decreasing, but at the same time Canada is exporting more and more goods to that country.

In every one of the big departments of trade Canada took less goods last month than during the preceding month. The iron imports into this country fell off in the past year by \$20,000,000 the imports of non-metallic ores fell off by ten million dollars, and there was a decrease in the imports of animal produce, fibres and textiles, wood

Wave Sweeps Eighteen Kiddies To Death

BOULOGNE, Aug. 11.—The bodies of 18 little children between the ages of 9 and 14 who were amongst 18 drowned at the bathing beach at Hardelot, a few miles south of here, when a great wave washed them out to sea, have been recovered and carried to the little chapel near the beach. The heroic efforts of four priests saved the lives of 10 of the children's party on a vacation at Hardelot from Northern French towns.

Automobiles were requisitioned to take the bodies of those drowned to the chapel as soon as they were recovered by life savers. In the church the bodies were placed on a catafalque.

The life savers are continuing their efforts to find five who are still missing.

Captured Two Bank Bandits

TORONTO, Aug. 11.—Quick and daring action on the part of John Cromer, an Imperial Bank clerk, and Police Constable Blackford, today resulted in the capture of two bank bandits who had just held up the Imperial Branch Bank at Kings Road and Balsam Avenue, and got out with \$1,500. Cromer followed the bandits out of the bank and fired at their fleeing motor car. They stopped and the men took to their heels down a lane. Constable Blackford rushed to the spot and placed the men under arrest. One of the prisoners gave the name of Percy White. The identification of the other man is not definite at present.

Murchison Claims Unfair Officiating

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Emphatically denying charges that he had filled exorbitant expense accounts for races abroad, Loren Murchison, Newark, N. J., sprinter, made a counter complaint of unfair officiating in Germany upon his return today from a European tour.
