IMPERIAL GABLE INQUIRY.

The Imperial Government, deeply interested in all that pertains to the defence of the Empire, as well as to the interchange of news, of thought and of the expansion of commerce, have appointed an important committee to inquire into the efficiency of the cable service. The following are the members of the committee:

Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Secretary for Scotland, Chairman;
 Lord Londonderry, Postmaster General;
 Mr. Hanbury, representing the Treasury
 Lord Hardwick, Under Secretary for India.
 Lord Onslow, Under Secretary for the Colonies.

The powers of the Committee as stated in the order of reference are as follows:

To inquire into the present system of telegraphic communication between the different parts of the Empire, and to investigate the relations between private cable companies and the Imperial and Colonial Governments (including the Government of India), the amount of control at present exercised by these Governments and the policy which should be pursued by them in future, especially when new concessions are sought; to examine existing rates, to report how far they are fair and reasonable, and if not how any reduction should be effected.

It will be seen that this important inquiry covers directly such matters as are at present in controversy between the Anglo-American Telegraph Company and the Government and people of this Island. The relations between the cable companies and the Imperial and Colonial Governments, the policy which should be pursued in telegraph matters in the future, the necessity for efficient service and reasonable rates, are here treated as matters of grave Imperial concern. And such they most undoubtedly are.

Here in our own case when a few months ago great battles were being fought in which our best and bravest were offering up their lives; in other grave crises which have touched closely the very fate of the Empire; and within the past few days when our most beloved Sovereign lay languishing to death and the hearts of her loyal subjects here were wrung with intense sorrowful suspense, a heartless monopoly shut us off from all tidings during twelve hours out of the twenty-four. When the Company's agent here was told, "The Queen may die tonight" and asked, "Will the telegraph office be kept open after eight o'clock?" The answer was in the negative.

The Imperial Committee of inquiry will begin its work on the 12th of February. It would be well if that august body could be informed that within the Dominion of Canada there is one entire Province, a Governor and Council, a Legislature which has sat for more than a century and a quarter, that are thus isolated; that an enemy's swift cruiser might lay our chief port and seat of Government in ruins in the night time and make good his escape while we were powerless to acquaint the naval or military authorities
