COURT OFFICERS TOOK THE FUNDS

Raised for Hope Young's New Trial, is the Charge Made by Her Attorney—She gets New Trial.

BOSTON, Jan. 1.—(Special)—Charging that the county officials at Digby, N. S., have taken without his permission all the funds raised by her relatives and friends to defray the expenses of the new trial granted Hope Young, R. G. Munro, her Attorney at Digby, has communicated with friends of the young woman in this city requesting that in future the money raised be sent to him direct and announcing his intention of taking legal action against the authorities.

She succeeded in her plea for a new trial which was granted on the ground that the confession she made and which was an important factor in her conviction was procured by fraud. It is alleged that prosecuting attorney D. Munson and Deputy Sheriff Burnham have used the money to pay off some of the expenses of the previous trial which were heavy.

BRIGHTER OUTLOOK FOR ORDER AGAIN IN RUSSIA

Cable Communication Restored and Strikes Going to Pieces—Leaders will not Fight for Minor Issues—German Foreign Secretary Gives Assurance that no Aggressive Action will be taken.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 1.—(Special)—The restoration of cable communication finds the outlook clearing and the Government breathing freer with a fighting chance that Count Witte will yet be able to steer a way through the rocks which beset his path. The threat of a general strike in the immediate future has disappeared and the telegraph strike being without support is fast going to pieces in spite of the mild appeals of the union to stand firm. The ring leaders of the working and other Proletariat organizations, realizing

the futility of their weakness and lack of preparation for a decisive struggle, carried the day over the Hotspurs and easily convinced the majority that it would be an irretrievable blunder to prostitute what they preach as being the supreme instrument for the forging of a free nation to minor issues like the redressing of the grievances of private individuals. BERLIN, Jan. 1.—(Special)—The German Foreign Office has been aware for some time that nervousness existed in France both among the Cabinet Ministers and people over the possibilities of a renewed controversy with Germany.

Baron Von Richthofen, the Foreign Secretary, was informed a fortnight ago that the French Cabinet has serious fears of Germany's intention. The Secretary replied to his informant, who was fresh from Paris that such apprehensions were wholly without cause. Inquiries were made here by French financial interests last week as to the possibilities of Germany provoking a war with France, and German bankers who are extremely well informed politically replied that there was not the slightest indication that the German Government contemplated any aggressive action.

I. C. R. CONDUCTOR IS NOW SUSPENDED

As Result of an Accident on Canada Eastern Branch—Some Other Officials of that Branch may Be Dismissed.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 1.—(Special)—Conductor Andrew Cruikshank has been suspended for two weeks by Supt. Evan Price of the I. C. R. as a result of the accident at Pennac on the Canada Eastern Branch several days ago when a locomotive, snow plough and a number of cars were derailed by running into an open switch. Cruikshank was in charge of the train

crew of which the brakeman, is alleged to have left the switch open. It is said by I. C. R. employes that Assistant Supt. Hoben and Chief of Mechanical Department P. A. Logan of the Canada Eastern Branch is to be dismissed on March 1st. Already several employes have been dropped from the pay roll for purposes of cutting down expenses.

CONTROL GOES TO DEPARTMENT

Changes Will at Once be Made in Pilotage System to Prevent Recurrence of Accidents.

OTTAWA, Jan. 1.—(Special)—The control of the Lawrence Gulf Pilots on the first of the year passes from the Quebec Pilotage Board to the Department of Marine Fisheries. It is understood that the changes will at once be made in the system for the purpose of improving the service and preventing the recurrence of the chapter of accidents which has given the St. Lawrence route a bad name among the shippers and insurance men of Great Britain.

AN ATTEMPT TO STAB A CARDINAL

Rome, Dec. 29.—The Pope expressed his deep concern over the attempt made at Barcelona to stab Cardinal Salvador Casañas Y. Pages, Bishop of Urgel, as he was leaving the cathedral. His Holiness sent a message to the Cardinal congratulating him on his escape. The Pope received in private audience Harry St. George Tucker, President of the Jamestown (Virginia) Exposition Company, who is in Rome with the object of interesting the Italian Government in expositions.

OFFICERS WILL BE PROSECUTED

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The war office, on the advice of the royal commission, headed by Justice Farwell of the high court of justice, now sitting in South Africa, has ordered the prosecution of the officers concerned in the South African war stores scandal. It is alleged that the officers of the British army during the South African war worked in collusion with contractors. The latter, it was charged, bought stores at absurdly low prices and afterwards resold them to the military authorities at the enormous profits, entailing a loss to the government of \$5,000,000. In June last these scandals were the subject of an attack by the opposition on the Balfour ministry which resulted in the appointment of a royal commission to inquire into them.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The Naval Authorities have at last recognized the universal use of the automobile. The bicycle stable has been a regular institution on board British battleships and cruisers, and now the men of war contain a motor garage. WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—A press despatch from Baker City, Oregon, published yesterday, announced that a ten cent subscription was to be started in Oregon and extend over the country for the purpose of raising a sum which probably would aggregate \$500,000, to be presented to Miss Alice Roosevelt on the occasion of her marriage to Representative Nicholas Longworth. In fact, he wished particularly that the proposed work should not be done."

A SAD DEATH FROM EXPOSURE

Aged Woman Turned From Door To Door Laid Down In Snow To Die.

The body of an aged woman named Mary McDonald, nee Mary Simmons, was found in a back field of Jas. Moore, Millburn, by his neighbor Louis Moore on the evening of the 28th, ult.

On Dr. McLaughlin, St. Peter's, Coroner being informed he decided to hold an inquest and summoned the following jury:—Albert James, Alex Cobb, Saml Rapson, John Pyke, Hy, Decourcy, Louis Moore, Saml. Rapson.

After viewing the body and examining several witnesses who stated that her daughter and son in law who live on the Marsh Road had turned her out and refused to admit her some few days before, during which time she begged from house to house and having gotten astray wandered about through the night of the 19th till exhausted, then spread her shawl on the ground and lay down to die, the jury brought in a verdict of death from exposure and strongly censured her daughter.

COSSACKS DRAW LINE AT CHILDREN

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The correspondence of the Daily Telegraph at St. Petersburg, as an instance of the ferocity of the struggle conducted at Kharkoff, relates as follows what he calls a "typical incident."

"A little boy was seen approaching Konny Square, where a detachment of Cossacks was stationed. The Cossacks, however brutal, draw the line at children, and the boy was allowed to approach unharmed. On arriving at the spot, he pushed, swung his right hand vigorously and then turned and ran. A violent explosion prevented the Cossacks noting his further movements. The boy had thrown a bomb which plowed up the ground. Fragments of horses were all around and some of the Cossacks were convulsed in the agonies of death, while streams of blood were flowing along the torn up roadway."

BROOKLYN HORSES HAVE MENINGITIS

NEW YORK, December 29.—At afflicted with azoturia or spinal meningitis more than a score of horses dropped in the streets of Brooklyn yesterday and at least half of them succumbed to the disease before a veterinarian could reach them. Every veterinary surgeon in the section was called into service and they were busy until late at night trying to check the spread of the disease. Up to six o'clock an veterinarian had been called to attend nineteen cases, nine of which were fatal. All the animal hospitals are crowded with horses which have only a chance to recover.
