SHIPPING COMES HIGH.—An illustration of the effect of the war, up on shipping values is afforded by the sale of the steamer City of Ghent, which took place in England recently. This steamer was brought over from England thirty years ago and since that time has been engaged in coastwise trade and whatever work presented itself for her to do. For some time she had been lying idle in Halifax harbor. Not long ago Captain Beattie took her over to England and sold her for \$3,500 more than her original cost. Her cargo on the trip to England yielded about \$11,000 in freight.

THE MARKETS IN ST. JOHN, N. B.

ST. JOHN, N. B., August 12.—Enquiries made of wholesale merchants in all branches of trade bring the unanimous reply that business is active and the general outlook satisfactory. The lumber markets are extremely dull, and the labor problem is growing more difficult; but general trade is active and money plentiful.
 The farmers have had rather more wet weather than they relished, but the crops are flourishing. The hay crop is the heaviest for years. In some places there is complaint of rust in the potatoes, but as yet no serious effect on the crop is apparent. The fruit crop is good, and grain and roots are very promising.
 With regard to the market, sugar has declined, but flour has sharply advanced and meat pork is higher. Cheese is also a little higher. Beans have a very wide range as to quality.
 Flour and Meal.—Flour has sharply advanced. There is no other change. Hard wheat patents, \$8.10; choice patents, \$7.30; oatmeal, \$6.25; cornmeal, bags, \$1.90 to \$1.95.
 Provisions.—Mess pork has again advanced. American clear pork, \$31.00; mess pork, \$35; mess backs \$36; pure lard, 18c; compound, 14 1/2c.
 Fish.—There is no change in this list. Dry fish continues scarce. Dry cod, \$6.50 to \$6.75; small cod, \$5.25; pollock \$4.25; pickled herring, \$8 half bbls., \$3 to \$3.25; smoked herring, 15c.
 Molasses.—Quotations are unchanged at 60c to 65c.
 Beans.—There is a wider range as to quality and quotations are \$5.40 to \$6.25, with still a shortage in supply.
 Produce.—All kinds of meats and poultry are very high. Butter is steady at 22c to 24c, but cheese has advanced to 18c. Eggs are 28c to 29c, and scarce.

CANADA'S ATLANTIC COAST IS WELL PROTECTED.

Johnson, deputy minister of marine, who has just returned from a two weeks' inspection trip. In company with Colonel W. P. Anderson, chief engineer of the department, Mr. Johnson paid his first visit to all the more important light stations on the Bay of Fundy, and the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick coasts. As a result of their visit, certain improvements will be recommended in reports to be made to Hon. J. D. Hazen. However, Mr. Johnson's conclusion, as stated, is that no country in the world can boast of a similar stretch of coast so well protected.

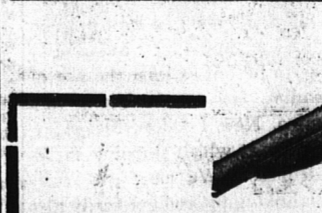
