THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching yesterday morning on "The Doctrine of the Two Kingdoms," the Minister, the Rev. H. B. Somers, said: This doctrine, therefore, of being a saving grace is not cheap and superficial. It goes deep. Indeed, in the Bible there are two kinds of religious minorities: first, St. Paul's "holiness of heaven" as he calls it, thrown out as pioneers in an unchristian world, and, second, Isaiah's "remnant," the little group of the true Israel which, in a time that is surrendering old sanctities, clings to them and despite the pressure of an alien generation preserves them for the children yet unborn. How much we do need both minorities that keep the high values of the faith amid a time that popularly surrenders them!

You who know me best, know how very jealous I am for the honour of Christ's Holy Church. So much of our Christianity is dough; I want the Church to be the leaven.

Our truth applies also to social problems. Men today, making their characteristic reactions to the domestic, social, economic and political difficulties which beset us, fall into three classes: first, those below the average—lawless, criminal, anti-social; second, those on the average, who play the game according to the rules with a fine sense of honour for observing them; and, third, those above the average, who question the rules. Are the rules themselves fair? Is the game itself equitable? Does it minister to the advantage of the few against the many, and cannot the rules be altered so that the game itself will be more just? The hope of the world depends upon that third class.

Often in these trying days, as your minister, I think of you business men. You face heavy burdens, practically complicated and ethically difficult. The more I know of you the better I appreciate the fine code of honour with which you handle your responsibilities. Yet, after all, with you as with me, the final test of a social attitude is at this point to which your thought has brought us. Not for all the world would you run your business in lawless disregard of the rules. You have a careful sense of honour about observing them. But are you dedicating your brains—and some of the best brains of Canada are in the business world—to this third matter: Cannot the rules be improved? Cannot the whole game be made more just?

That same test applies to all of us. Wanted in homes, in professional life, in business practice, in public service, in all human relationships men and women who are not simply playing the game according to the rules but who are trying to better the rules and make the game more just!

As for being Christian, I suppose that, reduced to simple terms, it means answering Christ's two-worded appeal, "Follow Me." Where do we think it takes a man when he does follow Him? Never into a majority. I wonder where you and I are this morning—with the two per cent, or with the ninety-eight?

In closing let me express once again my deep appreciation to each member of our Chapter for their fine spirit of loyalty and co-operation without which our work would be in vain. I have enjoyed

Phillips for her capable assistance in the handling of working materials for the past year. The meeting then closed with the King, following which a dainty lunch was served by the hostess.

REGENT'S REPORT — 1947 Fellow Members of the Hillsborough Chapter of the I.O.D.E. As I give my report of the year which has just passed and gone, it is with deep and mixed emotions. When the second world war ended we all breathed a great sigh of relief—and felt we could relax a bit and life would be a better and easier experience. But how rudely we are constantly being awakened to the fact that the peace and goodwill for which we so longed and waited has turned out to be a mirage and never has there been so little of the feeling of goodwill toward men, as it is shown by the unsuccessful effort of conferences and understanding between the heads of the nations. Our work, instead of lessening is as great as ever—and daily we read reports of poverty, cold and hunger in devastated countries, little children homeless and destitute—and so many thousands and thousands needing our help and support. Oh no—we cannot relax our efforts, but must carry on with all our strength and talents to help in every way possible those who are so much less fortunate than we.

In regard to our work during the past year, our Chapter had 28 members, and it is with a feeling of great pride that I report we had an average attendance at every meeting of over 80 per cent. This with the spirit of great co-operation which all of our members have shown, shows that though the numbers are small, yet we are conscious of the fact that ours is a worthwhile organization and one well worth working for. Our greater efforts comprised our annual tea held once again in the home of Mrs. Elmer MacDonald. At this tea we sell the work which has been done through the summer months, consisting of lovely knitted clothes for children—also home made sandy, jellies, pickles, etc. Our annual Tag Day proved a great success also. This was organized and carried out by our vice regent, Mrs. Walter Pickard, during the regent's absence from the city. In November we shipped seven boxes of clothing and food to three needy families in Europe, and in this month five more have gone to the same families. The letters of appreciation from these folk

make us sure that our efforts were worthwhile. At the present time we are making afghans, and babies layettes which will be sent before spring for distribution through I.O.D.E. headquarters. Our Christmas efforts this year were once again directed to the needy of our City, the sum of \$5.00 being sent to each of the ten Church parishes for help in preparing boxes for the poor. Our National Headquarters has allotted \$500.00 to be divided between the Royal Edward and the Hillsborough Chapters to be used for books to set up libraries in the Hospital and Sanatorium for veterans and their dependents. Our Chapter has taken over the work at the Sanatorium and books are being catalogued and made ready for distribution among the patients. We were very delighted and privileged to have a visit in March from our National President, Mrs. Ryland New. In conjunction with the Royal Edward Chapter we had a luncheon and meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel, Mrs. New spoke to us of the work of the I.O.D.E. generally, and we all came away inspired to do better, and better for so very great an organization. The Hillsborough Chapter will long remember the Sunday afternoon spent with Mrs. New when she talked with us so informally and helped us all to a better understanding of our privileges as I.O.D.E. members. Of course the highlight of my year was my trip to Toronto where I attended the 47th annual meeting of the National Chapter of Canada. This was an experience which I shall long remember and cherish. Through unforeseen circumstances your Regent had the honor of representing Prince Edward Island, and I cannot speak too highly of the many kindnesses shown our Province through me. There were 232 delegates in attendance and to sit in on those smoothly run and orderly meetings was an education in itself. If one ever doubts the importance or tremendous work which the I.O.D.E. is doing across Canada, they have only to attend such a convention to be assured that we are part of a great and mighty organization.
