MR. LEFURGEY SPEAKS OUT.

Mr. Lefurgey spoke out manfully in the Commons on Jan 21 touching Island rights and wrongs. He was moving for papers relative to the proposed branch line, O'Leary to West Cape.

Of course he was told that the Island Railway does not pay. "One strong reason for that is because you have not carried out the terms of union," said Mr. Lefurgey.

"Build the Tunnel, give us rail connection and it will wipe out the deficit."

"Moreover it would increase the revenues of the Intercolonial by possibly \$150,000 a year."

"It would benefit every producer, giving us 45 to 60 cents per bushel for 2,000,000 bushels of potatoes we are now forced to sell for 25 cents."

Mr. Lefurgey also ventilated the three short haul impositions to which the Island is subjected and concluded with these firm words:

"If we cannot get satisfaction, if we cannot get reasonable answers from the Government, we are not going to sit down and be quiet!"

"The members for Prince Edward Island, on this side of the House at least, are going to keep at the Government, and if necessary hold up the situation, until we get satisfaction!"

This language and attitude will find an echo not only in Prince County but throughout the Province.

THE ISSUE IS ABOVE PARTY.

We cannot too strongly deprecate any attempt either in the press, in Parliament or on the platform to exploit our Island wrongs or to excuse them in the interest of one party or the other. Very early in the series of articles we took this ground.

We pointed out that in eighteen years of Conservative rule and fifteen years of Liberal rule "neither party has yet attempted to grapple seriously with and remove our main killing grievance."

Where has been the salaried leader of the Opposition at Ottawa, what has he said or done for our help or our comfort in this great crisis of our history? She has sat dumb as an oyster!

We say this; the relations of Prince Edward Island with Canada transcend all party issues. Party disputes and wrangles can only postpone the day of our liberation. The man who would make our wrongs the football of party is an enemy of Prince Edward Island.

We have spoken strongly, sparing no man and no party that stands in the way of our emancipation, but we have as much hope—more hope—that relief will come from Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government than from any Conservative Government or leader now in sight.

We have spoken strongly but it is solely in the interest of Prince Edward Island and not of any party, that we have called attention to conditions long existing and which have now become intolerable.

FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS.

The Canadian Courier of Toronto, edited by John A. Cooper, late editor of the Canadian Magazine, in its latest issue uses the following words:

"For forty years the Maritime Provinces have sat back and grumbled. In that period they have lost—what? About half a million of the finest young men and young women ever reared—worth at least in round figures five hundred millions of dollars."

"If you think the estimate high, work it out for yourself, my friend. A little over ten millions of dollars a year in young men and young women alone, given away, absolutely without return!"

This is the calm, deliberate statement of a strong Canadian newspaper. Ten millions of dollars worth lost yearly in our best flesh and blood. And ten millions of dollars once paid would open a great channel of trade between the three Provinces, give them a real union and staunch this wound that has already bled us white.

With a little more machinery in the new railway shops shortly to be erected it would be entirely practicable to build all the locomotives for the Island Railway here in Charlottetown. That would mean more high-priced, skilled labor employed in our midst. It would be a real service to have this brought about.

We are asked why we do not reply to the carping critics, the petty scribblers who misrepresent The Guardian. These are our reasons: These writers have not the ear of the people; besides, we are out for larger game and have no snipe-shot with us!

Why not have telegrams transmitted either by wireless service at the Capes, or sent across there by the fastest service? The subsidy hitherto paid the Anglo-American Company would well repay the cost.

"STILL AT IT"

SIR—Your effort in behalf of the long-suffering people of P. E. Island are highly appreciated. We want justice no more, no less. We want the terms of Confederation, a fair, square agreement, carried out. We have a right to expect it, a right to demand it. But the correspondent of the Patriot, Amen, says "we are divided", and of course a "house divided against itself must fall". We have that from higher authority than your ordinary correspondent. "Amen," says "That when Sir John A. MacDonald held sway at Ottawa we have it, that a delegate from P. E. Island waited upon him and after one of these delegates had laid before His Honor what he regarded as the wishes of the Province, another member of the delegation arose and said: "Your Honor these are not the wishes or needs of P. E. Island at all." Sir John said: "Gentlemen I think you had better go home and find out what you want, let me know when you have decided what you want and I will give it to you." Just so, "Twas ever thus. Who was this other member of the delegation? Was it a man that put his party before his country and his own selfish interests above both? Very likely. And that is where the trouble comes in now. We are not united. The man who is getting pap from the Dominion Government says nothing. He is willing to put up with anything they do. He probably has to pay no extra ten or twenty dollars for car freight by Stanley to Charlottetown, &c. &c. and the small matter of mails and transportation does not affect him at all. He lives in a narrow circle and is satisfied.
