TELEPHONE DEAFNESS

Telephone users—and they are all to us—will be interested in the subject of telephone deafness. George Cotti, in the Buffalo Medical Journal, calls attention to several cases in which persons, when they put the telephone receiver to the ear suddenly a loud, high pitched sound, and then could hear nothing more, the deafness persisting for a considerable length of time. His explanation of the cause of this deafness is that any interference to the line while one is listening may jar the auditory nerve suddenly and produce a high pitched sound, followed by prolonged deafness with immediate deafness, either partial or total, the symptoms ameliorating after some weeks. This accident can be avoided, because it occurs only when the listener holds the receiver in such contact with the ear that no external sound can enter, a common way to hold the receiver when there there is much noise around. If the user of the telephone applies the receiver in such a way that a space is left for free circulation of air between it and the ear, a shock cannot be transmitted to the nerve no matter how much disturbance there may be on the line.

SYMPTOMS OF CEREBRO-SPINAL MENINGITIS

Discussing cases of cerebro-spinal fever among the British troops in France, the Lancet says: "Only one sign has been of real help to us in testing for this sign it has been found of little use to raise the man's head with the hand or ask him to bend his head forward when lying on the back. A man who is feverish and feeling ill will often not make the effort. It has been found more reliable to put him on his side or to sit him up and then make him attempt to put his chin on his chest. If in this position the neck can be fully flexed without difficulty or pain we have thought we could exclude cerebro-spinal meningitis for all practical purposes. The test is almost as quick and as easy as looking, and if it were made a routine practice in every case of headache of unknown origin we believe there would be less delay in the diagnosis of many cases."

Dr. Julius Levy of Newark, representing the National Food Committee, so stated, April 26, in an address at Harvard Medical School on "Milk Conservation Through Extension of Maternal Nursing."

Dr. Levy said that conservation of milk is getting more and more necessary for children in devastated countries of Europe, and that many children in this country are getting less and less milk on account of the limit of production and increasing cost while some are getting none at all, their mothers having substituted for it tea or coffee.

Child hygienic work in Newark, N. J., justifies a reversal of the charge that "women can no longer nurse their infants" and warrants the assertion that every infant can be breast-fed. "Nursing infants should not be admitted to hospitals without their nursing mothers." "Many such babies are cured of one disease in the hospital, only to die later from having been permanently weaned. "When doctors and nurses stop advising mothers to give the baby a formula or a little condensed milk, when neighbors and relatives stop making discouraging references to the mother's ability to nurse her infant, maternal nursing will become fashionable and mothers will do it who are now said to be incapable.

BRAVE LONDON NEWSBOY WINS TWO DECORATIONS FIGHTING ON WEST FRONT

One of the familiar characters of war days in London was a street newsboy who sold papers outside one of the hotels most frequented by wealthy visitors. Delighting in the nickname "Frog-faced Tich," he won the admiration of visitors as a master of repartee, varying his nightly refrain of "All the Winners" and "Orrible Murder" with ironical

comments on the world's events and caustic replies to pedestrans who ventured to bandy words with him as they passed.

Persons who knew Tich Tapley in the old days would scarcely recognize him now in his khaki uniform with a "crowned" ribbon on his breast indicating that he has been twice awarded the prized Military Cross. His comrades of the London Regiment, moreover, declare that if he had been awarded a medal on every occasion on which he had merited it, he would be covered with ribbon from head to foot of his diminutive body.

Too small to get into the army by the regular channels, Tich after several trials was accepted as a stretcher-bearer in the London Regiment. At the front he quickly became one of the most popular men in the regiment. One of his Officers, in a report to headquarters, said of him, "cheerful, headstrong of danger are as much a part of his equipment as his haversack and his water bottle."

Tapley probably looks less like a hero than any other man in his battalion. But his caustic, good-natured humor, which was little more than an amiable diversion in civilian life, became an invaluable asset in the trenches, keeping up the morale and optimism of the whole battalion. His officers find themselves continually paying tribute to his usefulness in this respect. One of them wrote in a letter a short time ago:

"His gospel, whether consciously or not, is the gospel of cheerfulness and in practice it works out that his spirits grow lighter in proportion as dangers and discomforts grow heavier. His jests in time of stress provide just the electric sparks that turns the hearts of men from gloomy pessimism into luminous defiance." The ex-newsboy has the reputation,

from Lens to St. Quentin, of being absolutely fearless. In his work as stretcher-bearer, he goes busily about among the falling shells, always whistling a popular tune, with an ever-ready word of sympathy and encouragement for the wounded. He is generally looked upon as one who bears a charmed life, for he has never received even a scratch and his very presence is regarded as a mascot. Tapley won the second of his two decorations under heavy shell fire in the Chalk Pit north of Loos when, single-handed, he hantaged and carried to a safe part of the trench all he found of his own company and several from a neighboring battalion.

It was the youngster's first experience at Sunday school and he sat eagerly watching the superintendent illustrate the lesson on the board. The superintendent drew the path to heaven—one straight line—and started the figure of a man on it. Gradually the man became larger and larger, and finally when he arrived at the gate of heaven he could not get in. Whereupon the superintendent turned to his small audience and, in a tragic and sorrowful tone, said:—"You see he is so puffed up with sin that he cannot enter."
