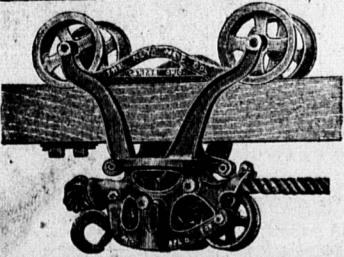

She left again at 4:55 p. m. with passengers, mail, express and freight and arrived at 8:25 p. m. She leaves to-day at 8:20 a. m. for Picton, returning at night.

The Guardian yesterday was given several stacks of timothy that showed splendid growth for this season of the year measuring two feet in length. They were taken from a nine acre field, owned by John Wedlock, Stanley Bridge, which averages about the same height all over. The field presents a fine appearance and looks as if the hay crop this year would be a record one. Next.

It is announced that a large fox ranch is to be started very shortly near Charlottetown. The persons interested in this transaction are R. M. Johnson, Charlottetown, and T. B. Woodman, Alberton. They have completed arrangements for the purchase of over eight acres of wooded land being part of the Deloitte property at Spring Park, the deed having been signed yesterday. It is their intention to build a thoroughly up-to-date ranch in every respect equipped with burglar alarms and fences specially built for protection of the foxes. A number of pure blood, black foxes will find their home inside this well-protected enclosure. Foxes owned by outside parties will also be taken on certain terms. Mr. Woodman intends to erect a commodious dwelling house on the estate. The work will be rushed to completion as quickly as possible.

The chapel at Kelly's Cross was the scene of a pretty event on Wednesday, June 11th, when Miss Regina (Jean) Hagen, daughter of Patrick and Mrs. Hagen, Westmoreland, was united in marriage to John A. Cuddy, son of Tobias and Mrs. Cuddy, Whitshire, Rev. J. Curran performing the ceremony. The bride wore a dainty gown of white, was attended by her sister Miss Adella who also looked exceedingly nice. The groomsmen were Philip Monaghan and about eighty guests were present, the young couple being extremely popular. This was again testified to in an unusually large number of beautiful wedding gifts including several cheques. After the ceremony and a pleasant dinner was served at the bride's home to the immediate relatives and Dr. Curran, and in the evening a social time was spent in which many joined. Dancing was participated in and refreshments served during the night. The young couple will have the hearty wishes of all for many years of happiness.

Irwin W. Binney, Ex-Collector of Customs, Moncton, had just started to play at the Humphrey Golf Links this (Saturday) afternoon at about 3 o'clock. He was quite near the Club House when he was observed to fall to the ground in an apparent faint. Dr. E. H. Chandler, who had entered the grounds almost at the same instant as Mr. Binney fell, quickly went to his assistance but discovered that he was dead. Mr. Binney was a grandson of the late Hon. Hibbert N. Binney, who for a period of nearly forty years, filled the office of collector of customs and excise at Halifax, and was also a member of the Legislative Council, and great-grandson of the late Hon. Jonathan Binney, one of the first residents of Halifax, who was a member of the first Legislative Assembly (1758) of the province. He and Frederick des Barras met the Indian chiefs at Aribat, Nova Scotia, in 1761, and concluded a lasting peace, and was appointed to the Legislative Council in 1768; second judge at St. John's Island (now Prince Edward Island); and also collector of customs for the Island.—Moncton Exe.

The following produce prices were secured on the Charlottetown market square yesterday and have prevailed since last Friday. White oats, 55c; black oats, 58c; potatoes, 40c; pork 9 to 10c; beef (quarter), per lb. 10 to 18c; beef (small), per lb. 12 to 17. The prices quoted by the wholesalers are: Potatoes, 40c; pressed hay \$13; white oats, 55 to 61; black oats, 58, to 63c; pork, 9 to 10c; straw, \$5.50 to \$6.50, and turnips, 23c.

The ratepayers of Spring Park School held a very harmonious meeting in their schoolhouse yesterday afternoon. Over three hundred dollars was voted for school purposes. Much satisfaction was expressed in regard to the good work done by the teachers, Miss Saunders and Miss Beers and this satisfaction was shown in a very practical way by a substantial increase in the supplement. The present high standing of Spring Park School calls for congratulations to its ratepayers and also in no small measure due to the untiring efforts of its present teaching staff.

Charged with assault and attempted highway robbery, Edward Flannigan, aged, sixty years, who says he belongs to Prince Edward Island, was arrested by Detective Handrahan on Saturday. James Bowie, an elderly cooper, of Dartmouth, reported the affair to the Chief of Police at eleven o'clock on Saturday morning. He stated while standing at the corner of George and Barrington streets that he was approached by a man who said he was Captain Smith, and that Bowie was wanted down the Market Wharf. Bowie says that he went down, and soon after reaching the wharf another man appeared on the scene, and that the two men attacked him and knocked him down one beat him while the other kicked him.
