Works On Oil Air Engines

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Steadily research in British laboratories is leading to an event which will revolutionize aviation—the production of a successful "compression-ignition" engine running on heavy oil instead of on volatile and inflammable spirit.

The explosive mixture in the cylinders is fired simply by high compression without the intervention of spark plugs connected to a magneto or accumulator.

Power units of this type possess great advantages in aircraft operation, apart from the vastly diminished risk of fire.

Within the last few days details have been revealed of work done under Air Ministry instructions in the conversion of certain types of Rolls-Royce aero engines to "compression-ignition" working.

Shipments Of Australian Eggs

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Regular shipments of Australian eggs have been arriving in ports of Great Britain since the season opened in October, 1930, says Sir Granville Ryrie, high commissioner for Australia in London.

The Australian high commissioner adds that this is the sort of encouragement the Dominion producers require, and the Australian poultry farmers, heartened by the success of this year's shipments, will confidently continue to develop the trade with Great Britain.

GUAYQUIL, Ecuador, Jan. 13.—Railroad emergency crews worked feverishly today to extricate the bodies of 170 track laborers who were engulfed by a landslide along the Guayaquil-Quito railroad yesterday.

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FINISHED BOOK

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Winnipeg Doctor Held As Spy, Tells His Story

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Paid \$2.20 In Dimes To Have His Wife Killed

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 13.—Emory Ellis, who paid \$2.20 in dimes to have his divorced wife, Mrs. Merle Ellis, 22, slain in her sleep in order to obtain the custody of their 18 months old son, expressed relief today as the spectre of the gallows faded and he faced imprisonment for life.

Ellis, 26 year old dishwasher, was convicted of first degree murder last night by a jury that recommended life imprisonment. He had confessed having given the dimes to Benjamin Franklin Brown, itinerant, as "part payment" for the shooting to death of Mrs. Ellis by Brown, November 2.

Brown will be tried Monday. He repudiated a document police presented as a confession.

As friends searched the city, the physician was held prisoner, and for nearly 24 hours was under examination by political police authorities, who attempted to wrest a confession from him that he was an agent for the Ukrainian revolutionary party.

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The Irish playwright and the Indian poet met at a reception this afternoon at which Tagore spoke. He regretted that nations had to be represented by politicians. This he said, was "almost as bad as allowing a band of robbers to organize the police force."

"You know," Shaw said to Tagore, "I've always been telling my people not to listen to politicians. I have tried to do this in my own writings, but you know what uphill work it is to convince people against their own will."

The pair met after Tagore's philosophical dissertation on peace and a plea for better understanding between the peoples of the east and the west. He addressed the All Peoples' Association at the Hyde Park Hotel.

Shaw and Tagore later posed for the photographers, the flowing beard of the Indian dwarfing the white whiskers of the Irishman.

Asked later to comment on Tagore's contention that nations should not be represented by politicians, Shaw commented: "Oh, that's as old as the hills."

He laughed when asked if it should be represented by poets and authors instead.

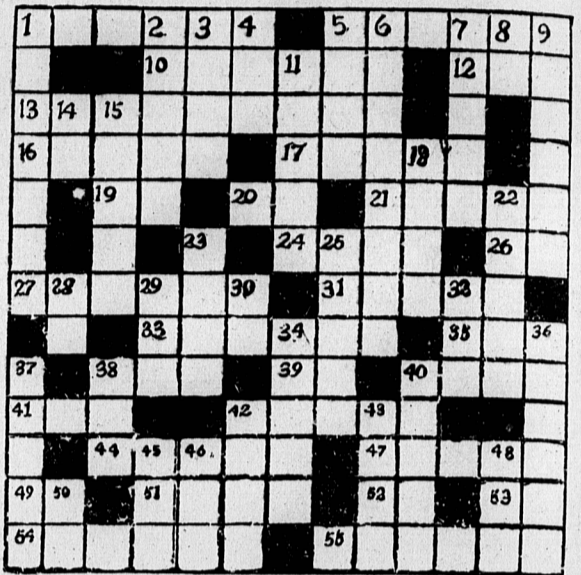
