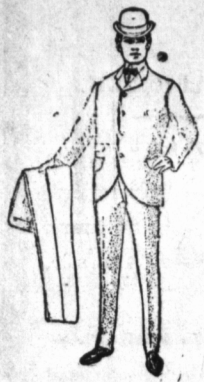

**FRANCIS FOOLS POSSE NOW NEAR BANGOR**

THOMASTON, Me., Nov. 21.—The scene of the search for Misto St. Clair Francis, the colored convict who escaped from the Maine state prison here on Nov. 24, shifted today to the eastern side of the Penobscot river and the region about Bangor. It has become apparent that once more the fugitive had succeeded in breaking through the circle and had made his way through the woods in Waldo county to the Penobscot river and crossing it.

Wearv from his twelve days of continuous searching Warden Norton returned to Thomaston tonight. The warden says he did not despair of recapturing the negro, but that he had left his deputy to continue the search which he would himself direct by telephone from the state prison.

The exact manner of the negro's escape from the woods in Waldo county where he was supposed to have been concealed yesterday and Thursday had not been determined by his pursuers but information which Warden Norton received today from Orrington convinced him that the convict had once more slipped away from the net spread for him. It is believed that on Thursday, while he was being sought for in Monro, Francis made his way to West Winterport, five miles distant, and then keeping under cover of the woods, reached the Penobscot shore at Winterport, and crossed the river in a stolen boat. At E. at Orrington, on the eastern shore of the Penobscot, eight miles south of Bangor, a horse was stolen from the stable of a farmer last night and this morning the animal, riderless, found its way back to its owner. The horse had apparently been ridden a long distance during the night judging from its condition. A blanket had been used for a saddle and a halter for a bridle.

In the belief that the fugitive would endeavor to use the railroad as his means of travel from the vicinity of Bangor, Warden Norton has sent word to the authorities in many towns along the different lines and has asked that search be made of all freights.

Since leaving Thomaston on Nov. 12th, Francis has covered about fifty miles as the crow flies, supposing that he is now in the neighborhood of Bangor; but his many doublings over his tracks to throw his pursuers off the scent, have made him cover probably twice that number of miles.

**CANADA TAKES OVER DOCKYARD**

OTTAWA, Nov. 21.—The Canadian Government will take over the Halifax Dockyards on January 1. They will be under the care of the agent of the Marine Department. The conditions in connection with the transfer of them to Canada are:

1.—Canada undertakes to keep up the buildings, machinery and plant, and the yards be at the disposition of the man-of-war for repairs.

2.—The Dockyards will be open to inspection by the Commander-in-chief of the North American and West Indies and local services squadron.

3.—The yards will be available to permit His Majesty's ships at any time to use them so far as their facilities will permit.

4.—To allow the Navy to keep for coaling purposes such coal in stock as they may require from time to time and also the use of the wharf for coaling His Majesty's ships.

5.—The Admiralty in the event of war or any other emergency can take over the docks.

6.—The right to enter into possession on the part of the Admiralty when it is considered necessary and advisable will not incur any liability on the part of the Dominion.

7.—Canada to pay all liabilities for such time as the docks may be in possession of the Dominion.

The Dockyards property include several wharves, a number of fine buildings, several yards, grounds, etc., in all covering about 70 acres.

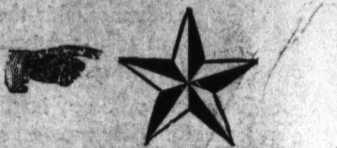

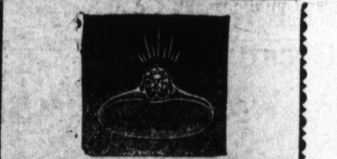
