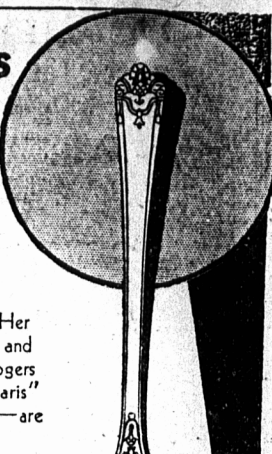

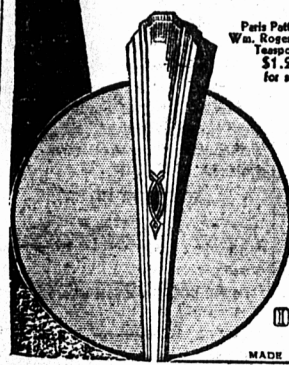

MAYONNAISE Quickly Made

Salad time has arrived so completely, that we must look well to our dressings. Every kind is in demand. We need to have a number of basic dressings, so that when we are each in a reasonable number of ways we have a broad choice from which to draw the special dressing of the moment.

Some people do not make mayonnaise because of an idea that it requires too much time. There are two cures for that. One is to make a good supply at a time; the other to make a quick mayonnaise like this one.

Condensed Milk Mayonnaise 1 egg yolk. 2-3 cup sweetened condensed milk.

1/2 teaspoon dry mustard. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 cup vinegar. 1/2 cup salad oil. Few grains cayenne.

Beat egg. Add other ingredients in order listed, mixing thoroughly with fork or egg beater.

Foolish Grandma Who Let Her First Grandchild Alienate Her Husband—How Much Should a Man Forgive His Wife?—Married Secretary Feels Her Kind

Dear Miss Dix—Among my acquaintances is a couple whose history is that of the usual well-to-do American family. The husband is a fine man, devoted to his family, a good provider, fond of his wife. He would go every day from his business to his home where his wife had always arranged something pleasant to do for the evenings.



When grandma finds out about this she will blow up and wreck the home. But who is to blame? A DISTRESSED FRIEND.

Answer: Grandma, of course. I have said over and over again in this column that the wrecking of a home is always an inside job. It is the husband or the wife or both who put the TNT under the doorstep and leave it handy for a careless or a malicious outsider to explode.

No woman would fall out of love with her husband and in love with some long-haired poet or drug-store shelm if her husband would take the trouble to feed her on a little romance and pay her a compliment every day. No woman would lose her husband to another woman if she would try as hard to hold him as she did to catch him.

But they don't, and when they have lost the thing dearest to them in the world and their marriage brings them misery and disillusion instead of happiness, they blame it on fate instead of on their own stupidity.

Statistics show that women are the petitioners in divorce cases far oftener than men are. Also that the charge that wives make against their husbands is, as a general thing, unfaithfulness. Now, of course, there are men who are born philanderers and who could not be true to any one woman, no matter if she were a compendium of all the charms and virtues of her sex.

But this is not true of the great majority of men. They are not women-chasers by instinct. They love their wives when they marry them and would be true to them if their wives did not drive them from them by neglect or nagging or ceasing to make themselves attractive or by their failure to play up to them.

There is no woman in the world so stupid that she does not know that her husband wants to be first with her, that he likes for her to make the gesture of considering him before any one else. It makes him feel big and important for her to cater to him, yet thousands of women never even see their husbands again after their first baby is born. Junior puts his nose so out of joint that it never gets in place again. His pleasure, his comfort, his desires don't weigh for an instant against a squalling infant. Henceforth he is nothing but a slave to toil for the children.

And every woman knows that her husband wants to be amused and talked to and to have somebody to step out with him and he gay, but after the baby comes only too often the wife is too busy and too absorbed in the youngster to do it. And that is why so many married men get into affairs with the girls in their offices. It is because their wives have turned into mothers and not remained sweeties.

With many women motherhood is an obsession, but with men fatherhood is merely a pleasing incident. A woman can do without her husband if she has children, but a man wants his wife as well as his children, and if women could only be wise enough to be more wife than they are mother me wouldn't hear so much of roving husbands.

Answer: Yes. I think for a husband to forgive a disloyal wife is the hardest thing in the world for him to do, and it is an added turn of the knife in the wound for him to have to meet daily the men with whom she has betrayed him.

And I want to express to you my admiration of your forbearance and wisdom in not taking any vengeance upon them, as husbands did in a less civilized and sane age. For the married woman who goes astray does it of her own volition. She is no ignorant, unsophisticated girl. She is as much to blame as the man, and her husband only shows his intelligence when he refuses to wreck his life for the sake of a worthless wife.

As to the qualities that it takes to forgive an unfaithful wife they must be, I think, an almost divine pity for her weakness, an understanding of a nature that is avid for thrills and romance and change, and that is perhaps constitutionally emotionally unstable.

And perhaps the husband would have to understand also that there are women, just as there are men, who are sensualists and philanderers and who have not in them the ability to be faithful to any man. But in order to forgive the husband would have to have most of all such a great and overwhelming love for his wife that he could throw it as a cloak over her weaknesses and hide them even from his own eyes.

And, fortunately, the woman who has this attraction for other men nearly always does have it for her own husband so that he can forgive her.
