Mme. Litvinoff Packs the Punch Into Soviet Envoy's Speeches

No time-fritterer is frank, informal, energetic Mme. Litvinoff. "I may as well get a real letter out of the war."

WASHINGTON—The Soviet Embassy's new First Lady, Madame Maxim Litvinoff, is frank, informal, and chockful of interests. An Englishwoman, the former Ivy Low, she's the one who's responsible for her ambassador's un-English phrases and idioms that have caused bewilderment to many only in her casual conversation full of crisp, humorous phrases which she picks up—but she is chief translator of his important English speeches.

Why I married him—a sort of instant sympathy? She never expected to be able to live in Russia, and was "tremendously excited" when, after the Revolution, her husband was called back to his country—the new U. S. S. R.—and she went with him. She then started to learn Russian—and one can imagine she learned it in record time to judge by the dispatch with which she does everything else. She's not content to pose as a little tartlet girl who happens to be lying around, for instance. "It might just as well be one I like," she says, and goes energetically into her bedroom to find one.
