U. S. COUNSELLOR AT BERLIN REMOVED FROM OFFICE

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Reuters Amsterdam correspondent says: A telegram received from Berlin says that Delaval, counsellor of the American legation at Brussels, who made the report to Brand Whitlock, the American minister concerning the efforts that were made to save Miss Edith Cavell from execution by Germans in Brussels, has been removed from his office.

Sir Charles Tupper's Funeral will Likely Be on Nov. 16th

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—All the members of the Government and all the members of the Privy Council (which includes ex-ministers, members of former governments), have been formally invited to be present at the funeral of Sir Charles Tupper. A large number of them, in addition to a large gathering of parliamentarians and other public men, are expected to attend. The funeral will take place probably on the 16th and a special train will leave Ottawa at the end of this week, carrying ministers, ex-ministers and others to Halifax. The exact day and hour of the funeral will be announced later when arrangements have been completed.

Wounded Canadian Soldiers Return One a P. E. Islander

QUEBEC, Nov. 8.—One hundred and forty-five wounded soldiers returned from France yesterday on the C.P.R. steamer Missanable. Among those destined for the Maritime Provinces are: Private McBride, St. John, N.B.; Private Buchanan, Milton, P.E.I.; Private Nickerson, Shelburne, N.S.; and Private Webb, Anover, N.B.

GERMAN STEAMER CAPTURED IN THE BALTIC

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 8.—The Telegram's Dellyl correspondent reports that the steamer Frascati, of Hamburg, has been captured in the Baltic Sea and taken to Raumo, Finland.

SERBIANS CONFIDENT OF ULTIMATE SUCCESS

PARIS, Nov. 9.—In a statement yesterday to a correspondent of the Temps at the small Serbian town of Rachka, in which the Serbian government is lodged temporarily, Premier Pachitch said:

"The hopes and moral forces of the entire Serbian people and army remain undisturbed, notwithstanding the present aspect as a result of the Austro-German and Bulgarian invasions. Our troops, fighting against forces greatly superior numerically, are retiring in perfect order.

"Although they have been fighting for a month, our enemies have not attained the purpose they are seeking. German success has not yet been marked. The junction with the Bulgarians is not really effective, and the contact established has no practical utility, since the Germans thus far can send neither cannon nor munitions to the Bulgarians or the Turks. This is why they are making such desperate efforts at this time to capture all of the railroads from Belgrade to Nish and Sofia.

"Army Headquarters, the Government and the people are persuaded that as soon as the Allied troops arrive in sufficient numbers and begin action, success will be rapid and constant. However, we are convinced that this success will mark the beginning of the end of the general war."

GREEK KING CONSTANTLY WATCHED BY GERMANS

ROME, Nov. 9.—According to the wireless, uncensored news from Athens, King Constantine is furious at the resignation of the Cabinet and perplexed to find a solution.

Sensational developments, not even excluding revolution, are likely to occur momentarily.

The German Minister and Prince Von Buelow's son, who is attached to the German legation, practically reside at the Palace and are in constant communication with the King, who is in direct wireless communication with the Kaiser.

Zaimis spent yesterday at the Palace, where the pro-German politicians were summoned to confer with the King.

Venizelos' life is considered in danger. Germans are intriguing against him and it is feared that they would not hesitate to bring about his suppression.

BRITISH COMMENT ON LATEST AMERICAN NOTE

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Commenting on the American note the Westminster Gazette contends that behind the uncertain law of former times the British considerations of equity. It is confident, it says, that the United States will consider the contrast between the German and the British practice, and whether Great Britain has made excessive use of her sea power.

"President Wilson," says the Gazette, "has expressed himself with great cogency at the action of German submarines. He is still demanding reparation for American citizens done to death in the Lusitania and other ships. That is all to the good, but the ultimate lies in the proof we alone can give that these practices are disastrous."

The note, the Gazette concludes, should remind home critics of the pitfalls between which the Foreign Office and the Admiralty must pick their way to assert the rights of the country, without offending neutrals, and of the danger of presuming on unqualified friendship in any quarter.

The Evening Standard says that the United States has been at variance with both sides of the belligerents and accepted from Germany a sort of apology which bore "far less similarity to the real article than our blockade bears to a blockade which would satisfy even American diplomats."

"When she disagrees with us in purely technical matters," adds the Standard, "are we likely to be confronted with the mailed fist? America is making her fortune out of the Allies. Remembering this, and America's treatment of Germany, we have no fear of an acute crisis, or of retaliatory measures in the form of an embargo on American exports."

FRENCH LINER ON FIRE RACING FOR HALIFAX

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The French Line steamer Rochambeau, two days out of New York, for Bordeaux, reported by wireless to-day with fire in her coal bunkers, was presumably steaming to-night for Halifax, the nearest port. Her exact position was not given in the single wireless message that brought news of her plight to land, but it was estimated that she would make Halifax some time late to-night or early to-morrow.

Aboard the burning steamer are approximately 650 persons—21 passengers and a crew of about 230—and a large cargo of war supplies, including 2,601 cases of cartridges and 136 bales of cotton. No danger is anticipated.

Hundreds of Deaths From Cholera

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Cholera has added its terrors to the burdens of Armenian refugees who fled the Tigris and Euphrates valleys to Tabriz, according to meagre advices received here by the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions and made public to-day. One mortality a day is now the average mortality from the scourge, in Tabriz alone, these advices state.

Urumiah, too, the recent fighting ground of Kurds and native Christians is afflicted by cholera, the Board announced. Forty deaths have already occurred there from the disease. All the deaths, both in Tabriz and Urumiah, it is said, have occurred among the natives. The missionaries stationed at both places are relieving the sick as best they can, with inadequate facilities.

Tiflis, Russia, which lies south of the Caucasus Mountains, not a great distance from Tabriz and Urumiah, is similarly in the grip of an epidemic, which has already caused 700 deaths.

A Protest From Washington

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Ambassador Gerard at Berlin has been instructed to protest to the German government against detention of the American sailing ship, Pass of Baltimore, which after being seized by a British warship, was captured with the prize crew aboard by a German submarine.

Germany recently ordered the vessel held for prize court proceedings at Hamburg, on the ground that her transfer from Canadian to American registry after the war began, was illegal.

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

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
