SITUATION IN RUMANIA IS CRITICAL

A Severe Censorship Over all News has Been Established at Bucharest — Public Buildings, Ministries and Railroad Stations Closely Guarded.

VIENNA, Oct. 27.—Reports from Belgrade say that a severe censorship has been established at Bucharest for all news. Telephone communication between Belgrade and Bucharest has been cut off and only occasional telegrams are arriving at Belgrade from the Rumanian capital. The Carlist movement, however, is known to be assuming a most serious character and disappointment with the Government is declared to be increasing. Many of the Carlist supporters have been arrested. Another despatch says that "violence has broken out in Bucharest."

Public buildings, ministries and railroad stations are heavily guarded by troops and gendarmes. It was said. All gatherings of more than four persons in the city streets are immediately dispersed. It was reported that the Carlists had been called in from the province and practically surround the capital and occupy strategic points throughout the city.

Bucharest was said to be seething when the report circulated that the Bratianu Government intended to arrest Julius Manu, leader of the National Peasant party. BUCHAREST, Rumania, Oct. 27.—General Averescu, former premier, has taken a strong stand in the political turmoil. He has recently discovered a plot to bring former Crown Prince Carol back to Rumania and place him on the throne. General Averescu, who is to defend M. Manolescu before a military court on the charge of being a principal in the conspiracy, today issued a statement asking whether the regency constituted a check on the abuses of the government in office and whether the people didn't believe that "today's usurpers" meaning the Bratianu Government, should be driven from power.

There has been no Canadian Cardinal since the death of Cardinal Beign in Quebec several years ago.

AIRSHIPS TO FOUR HUNDRED PASSENGERS BELIEVED TO HAVE PERISHED

Conflicting Reports Received Regarding Loss of Life On Italian Liner Princessa Mafalda—Captain Of French Rescue Ship Gives His Version Of The Disaster—Tales Of Horror Told By First Survivors Reaching Port Of Bahia.

(Canadian Press) BAHIA, Brazil, Oct. 27.—Belief that the captain and at least 400 of the passengers and crew of the sunken Italian liner Princessa Mafalda went down with the vessel, was expressed by survivors who reached here today, despite reports from other sources that only a handful of the more than 1,200 aboard were lost.

Tales of a horror filled night were told by the first of the victims to reach this port today aboard the French steamer Mosella, one of the handful of ships that answered the Mafalda's distress signals. The Mosella saved 52 persons from the sinking. The Mosella had no information as to the number rescued by other vessels but is understood to include all but 68 of those who were aboard the ill-fated liner.

Another Dory From Columbia Was Picked Up

(Special to the Guardian) BOSTON, Oct. 27.—A dory, covered with barnacles and identified as belonging to the ill-fated Gloucester schooner Columbia, was picked up Monday, sixty-five miles south-east of Liverpool, N. S., by the east of Liverpool, N. S., by the schooner Mary F. Sears, Captain Gonsales, and brought today to the South Boston pier. The Columbia, of twenty, is believed to have foundered August 24th in a hurricane that took toll of more than 100 lives along the coast of Nova Scotia, with the destruction of at least five large vessels.
