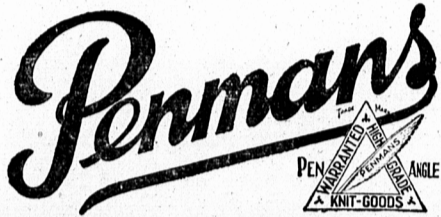

Unemployed To Be Safely Housed

OTTAWA, Sept. 10-(CP)-Farmers and those engaged in other primary industries may be in the position next winter of being provided with labor at the cost of board and lodgings alone, or possibly without even that expense. This was made known in the government's announcement last night of plans to care for single, homeless unemployed adults.

In co-operation with the provinces the government proposes to pay half the cost of such plans as can be worked out in conjunction with the provinces for the purpose of absorbing in primary product industries all physically fit, single homeless adults.

The proposal, as explained by Labor Minister Norman Rogers and A. B. Purvis, chairman of the National Commission on Employment and Relief, involves placement of such men on farms, forestry projects and other industries with the Dominion and the province concerned sharing equally in assuring the man a wage reasonably approaching that paid ordinarily for the same class of labor in the same area. As from July 1 last camps maintained for several years as shelters for single unemployed men were abolished and the men were absorbed in railway maintenance projects assisted by loans from the federal treasury.

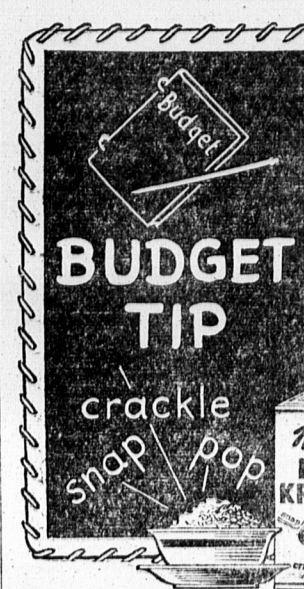

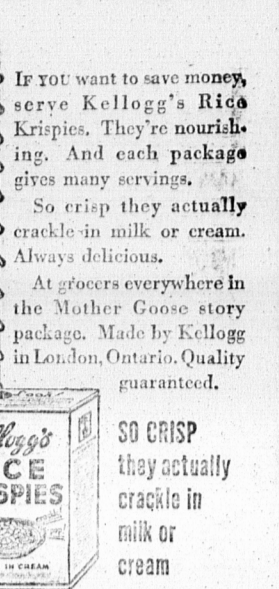

"Speedometer" to Solve Riddle of Growth

BLAKESLEE Associated Press Science Editor CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 10-(AP)-Hydrocarbons are the "speedometers" that time and regulate the formation of brains, eyes and all the other parts in the prenatal development that begins with conception. This much of the riddle of growth was reported as solved at the Harvard Tercentenary Conference of Arts and Sciences yesterday.

They were identified by Hans Spemann, Nobel prize winner and Zoology Professor of the University of Freiburg, who spoke on the "mode of operation of the organizer." What the "organizer" causes to grow depends, Dr. Spemann said, on the time and pace. When developing tissues arrive at the normal stage of producing a brain, the organizer touches off the development and rushes it to completion. At the wrong time and wrong place the same organizer might cause some different organ to develop.
