**SHOULD PUSH SALE OF CANADIAN GOODS**

TORONTO, Ont., June 7.—Does any single manufacturer in Canada pay a man or woman to visit every shop in the Dominion where his goods are sold to see that they are pushed and boosted ahead of the imported article?

A woman writes to a local paper: "In all shops I was not offered Canadian goods first, nor were they marked. I had to ask for them. Let us take cheese. I went to a large store and asked for a particular brand and was shown a piece. 'Is this Canadian?' I asked. 'Oh, no, it is imported.' Have you any Canadian like it?" "Yes, Madam," and he picked up one of several chunks, with no cards on to say what they were, and offered it. It was good, and I bought some. I had occasion to buy some rugs. I was shown some from England, and very nice. But, resolved to do my bit, I asked, 'Doesn't Canada make rugs?' 'Yes, madam,' and from another pile he brought out Canadian rugs. There was no placard over them to show that they were Canadian. It was the same with towels, and some other things. I went to a stationer's for some paper, and the same thing happened. At a grocer's I wanted some tomato sauce. I was shown one

made in the United States. "Don't over them to draw attention of the you make any in Canada?" "This is made in Canada," he replied. "Then why have an American label?" "I could tell the same story in nearly every shop I visited. Canadian produce is not pushed and not proclaimed by Canadians as American goods are pushed and boosted by Americans. It is not much use to scold people for buying American and other foreign goods, reading American literature, and patronizing American movies, so long as they appear to like them, and have been allowed to form a taste for American stuff, through the business fever of the American, why should not Canada give her people what they like, but out of Canadian factories? Make the same kind of films, only better; drum your produce from door to door; placard them in the shops, and make so easy to get that we will save time buying them.
