

THE C.P.R. WRECK NEAR OTTAWA CITY

Eight Killed, Fifty Injured. Cars Topped into Ottawa River. Injured Rushed to Ottawa Hospitals. First Reports Exaggerated.

OTTAWA, June 26.—Eight dead and over fifty injured, two probably fatally, is the toll of a railway accident three miles from Ottawa this afternoon, when the C. P. R. Winnipeg train left the track. All the dead and practically all the injured are immigrants, principally from the British Isles. The cause of the wreck is not known, but it is thought to have been either a loose rail or what is known in railway parlance as a "sun-blink."

HON. A. MEIGHER IS SWORN IN

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, June 27.—An urgent desire to arm the president with a tariff "big stick" of stronger and greater proportions than was provided in the amendment suggested by the finance committee majority developed to-day in the Democratic caucus in the Senate on the Underwood tariff bill.

RECOVER DAMAGES FOR LOSS OF SON

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 26.—The King's Bench Court, to-day, gave judgment in favor of Thomas Ryan, an Irish farmer, who brought suit against The White Star S. S. Company, to recover damages for the loss of his son in the Titanic disaster. The Judge awarded Ryan \$5,000, the sum agreed on, and costs. Similar award was made in two other cases at the same time.

EXEMPTED FROM INCOME TAX

(Canadian Press) BRANTFORD, June 26.—Dominion officers are not liable for income tax. This is the judgment handed down by Judge Hardy in an act, J. C. Montgomery, Assistant Postmaster, M. J. Sarley, Customs House Officer, M. J. Donohue, Inland Revenue Officer and Gordon Smith, Indian Superintendent against assessment for income tax on the salaries paid them by the Dominion government.

CITY SCHOOLS CLOSED YESTERDAY

The closing exercises of the three city schools were held from 9 to 12 yesterday morning and were attended by quite a large number of the parents and friends of the pupils. In Prince Street, Judge Blanchard presided and presented the diplomas after which he congratulated the children on the fine showing they made and also on the excellent work they had done during the year.

ALL THE BODIES RECOVERED

There were many pathetic scenes as the passengers included wives and children going to join their husbands and fathers, or whole families going to the west. Some members of families were killed, while others who were injured, were hurried to the hospitals so quickly that their relatives did not know where they had gone. Most of the deaths were caused by the people being hurled against the sides of the cars when they toppled over, but a couple met their deaths by drowning. One little baby was drowned, having been hurled through a window into the river. One woman and a boy, who were apparently leaning out of the window, were caught underneath and their bodies were the last to be recovered.

GERMANY PUNISHES HER TRAITORS

(Canadian Press) LEIPZIG, June 26.—The Imperial Supreme Court to-day convicted a former policeman named Jack Nicke, of Wilhelmshaven, on a charge of espionage and sentenced him to six years' imprisonment. Jack Nicke, with two other policemen, and a German Naval warrant officer, obtained possession of a navy signal book which they had sold to England or France. The policeman, it appears, had had a long career of robbery at Wilhelmshaven and made a specialty of training watchdogs which they sold to local merchants whose premises they afterwards burglarized, being able to obtain admission owing to the dogs recognizing them.

JACK JOHNSON IN MONTREAL

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, June 26.—That Jack Johnson, negro pugilist, is in this city and will make a determined effort to-night or to-morrow night to board a steamer for Europe is the statement made by persons who claim to have talked with him today. Police and immigration officials have no information of him. Johnson is out on bail for violation of the white slave law. He is sentenced to a year and a day in prison and has appealed the case.

Having recently toured the Maritime Provinces of Canada, I was greatly impressed with the possibilities that exist in these Provinces for the practical farmer, more particularly in Prince Edward Island—that beautiful Island Province situated in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, off the coast of Nova Scotia, and very appropriately named the Garden of the Gulf. In the rush to the West these fertile lands of Eastern Canada which are lavied by the waters of the Atlantic Ocean, have been overlooked by the British farmer. Yet these Provinces are most favorable to the practical farmer and market gardener with a small amount of capital, and my choice, as I have mentioned, is Prince Edward Island. The soil of this Province is generally a sandy loam, and will grow anything that is profitable to the farmer, market gardener and horticulturist.

RECOVER PAIR FOXES WITH THEIR INCREASE

(Special by The United) ALBERTON, June 26.—This morning Constables George Barbour and Charles Birch recovered from a ranch near here a pair of the foxes which were stolen from the Gordon Ranch at Montrose in September, 1911. The Constables with search warrants were admitted to the ranch and after a short conversation with the owner, which implicated at least two well-known men in the theft, secured the foxes with a litter of five young ones and returned them to Mr. Gordon. It will be remembered that four foxes were stolen from the Gordon Ranch at the time. Of the two still missing it is said that one died and the other was sold to a party in the eastern part of the province. Up to a late hour last evening no arrests had been made but it is expected that some interesting developments will follow.
