don values have been above the corresponding parity of prices in the United States and the favorable introduction of Canadian Wool in volume to the English markets has provided a further outlet, so that we now have excellent connections in Canada, United States, England and the Continent. This makes it possible to take advantage of the best market each year, and accounts for 2,000,000 lbs. of Canadian wool being shipped to English and Continental Ports in 1927. Surely, therefore, year in and year out the shippers to this Company are assured of finding the best markets, and of netting the highest possible returns from those markets.

Briefly, the trade view of the outlook in 1928 as good. Those who have been students of the situation appear anxious to acquire wool from 1928 clip early, which undoubtedly accounts also for the desire of many at this early date to attempt to contract the next clip while it is still on the sheep's back. Wool is considerably higher to-day than it was last year. Our judgment, therefore, is that growers should not part with their wool until they "know" just as much about 1928 values, as those in the wool trade "know".

that the tax levied or collected or dogs be appropriated for that purpose. The speaker concluded by suggesting that instead of taxing a female dog \$3.00 a year, he thought it would be better to tax all dogs alike, say \$1.00 a year, and to make the tax compulsory.

After much discussion on the subject the following resolution moved by Mr. C. E. McKenzie, and seconded by Mr. Joseph Dunbar, was unanimously carried.

Resolved—That the sheep insurance against loss by dogs or other wild animals be automatically applied to all sheep of the province and that the present Sheep Breeders' Act be amended to provide for same.

And further **Resolved**. That in the opinion of the Sheep Breeders' Association here assembled, that the Secretaries for the schools be asked for an annual day census in their several districts.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS

Resolved. That in view of the sheep breeders making individual shipments to the Prince Edward Island Sheep Breeders Association, that this Association use the Secretaries of the various shipping clubs of the Province as agents for collecting of wool and the distribution of stockmen's supplies. Moved by C. B. Clay, and seconded by George Boswell.

Resolved. That the Sheep Breeders' Association of Prince Edward Island do hereby petition the Minister of Agriculture to endeavor to secure the services of Dr. Lionel Stevenson of the Ontario Department of Agriculture relative to parasites and parasite diseases for the benefit of our sheep breeding industry.

Moved by J. J. McLeod, seconded by C. B. Clay.
