The latest news, first of all.

At a joint meeting of Lodges Eton and Prince Edward of the Sons of England held in their hall last evening, a committee was appointed to arrange for a church parade of the order on May 29th when they will attend the funeral services on the day of King Edward's burial in First Methodist Church in a body. It is their intention to extend an invitation to the other national societies in this city and the Masonic Fraternity to attend the service with the Sons of England.

Rev T. J. Binstadt of St. John, well known in this province, has appealed from the decision of the N.B. and P.E.I. Conference and of Rev D. Carman, general superintendent, as to the change made by the conference stationing committee assigning Rev Mr. Binstadt to the Springfield circuit after he had been appointed by the same body to the pastorate of Zion Church, St. John. Dr J. R. Ingh, Fredericton, who, as a member of the appeals committee, will participate in the settlement of the question, said last evening that he thought Rev Mr. Binstadt would have a legal right to the amount of one year's salary as paid by Zion church, and also a case for damages against the congregation of the church or against the N.B. and P.E.I. conference. After Rev Mr. Binstadt had been finally assigned to Zion church, the Zion assembly local made strenuous representations to the stationing committee and said they would not abide by the ruling of the conference body. Whatever form the objections took, the conference, perhaps mindful of previous stirring passages in the history of Zion church, refrained from any action to withdraw Rev Mr. Binstadt's appointment to the city church and to assign him to the Springfield circuit, a much less desirable position, particularly for a clergyman of Rev Mr. Binstadt's advanced years. So deeply did he feel the action of the stationing committee that he refused positively to accept the reversed decision, and he retired from active work under the supervision of the conference and has not been in charge of any circuit during the past year, although he has been engaged in special work, organizing a congregation at McAdam and, since the death of Rev W. W. Lodge, sharing the pastoral duties of Kenmouth street church with Rev Mr. Brewer. Rev Mr. Binstadt has done everything in his power since conference time to obtain a reversing of the committee's decision. He appealed to Rev Dr Carman, general superintendent, but the latter would not interfere with the action of the conference committee, and the aggrieved clergyman is now at the bar of the final court of appeal. The controversy has assumed such importance, both as a matter of ecclesiastical law and as a personal affair, that the contending parties will be personally represented at the sitting of the court, Rev S. Howard, of St. Stephen, formerly of this province, left St. John on Monday evening to argue on behalf of Rev Mr. Binstadt and the stationing committee will also be represented.

M. P. Hogan, City, returned last night from Richibucto, N. B., where he had been in connection with the stranding of his schooner the Sweet Marie which went ashore at Kouchibouguac N. B., about twenty-five miles from Richibucto in last week's severe storm. Mr. Hogan reports that the schooner is abandoned and that the expense of having her floated would be so great as to equal if not exceed her value. The schooner went ashore in the storm, which was accompanied by a blinding snowstorm, and by the assistance of lobster fishermen the crew were safely landed. They were cared for at the lobster factory and Mr. Hogan's arrival he provided for their transportation to their homes and settled with the proprietors of the factory for their timely assistance. There were several other vessels driven ashore during the same storm in the vicinity of the scene of the Sweet Marie disaster, one of which may be successfully floated.
