**BERLIN'S VIEW OF THE KING.**

The visit of King Edward to his royal nephew, the German Emperor, was made at a time when there was some apparently adverse feeling between Britain and Germany. There is a sharp industrial and commercial rivalry between the two countries. Germany is possibly a little jealous of Britain's naval supremacy and her vast colonial empire, while the British alliance with Japan and the recent settlement with France are not altogether congenial to the German taste. It is therefore of interest to learn how German opinion as reflected in the press regards the King's visit and the King himself. Here is in part what the Tagblatt, a leading Berlin journal has to say:

"The King's visit is of a serious and far-reaching importance lent to it by the personality of the visitor and the task he has taken on himself since he ascended the throne. This task is to preserve peace in Europe at any cost, certainly first in the interest of England, but also for humanity's sake, the love for which fills the King's heart. He knows no greater ambition than to be Prince of Peace and work for peace. If one judges the King otherwise than in the light of a peacemaker, one is bound to form wrong political conclusions.

Tact and loyalty are the principal features of the King's character, and, according to people who ought to know, he would never lend himself to any political intrigue. We may rest assured on that point. No, the King comes not to remove frictions, because there are none; he comes not to compromise Germany in the eyes of Russia, nor to minimize the importance of the Anglo-French agreement; he simply comes as a messenger of peace, intending no harm to anybody, and working only towards universal tolerance. We know of no nobler or more honorable mission than his."

An influential native paper in India recently said: "Our social system is dying; caste is losing its hold on the Hindu mind." Railways, street cars, schools and courts bring all classes into close contact, and treat them as equals. Modern civilization is a great leveller in the way of levelling up from below. It has its faults and defects, no doubt, but is infinitely better than the iron bonds of caste and heathenism.

Postal improvements are being pushed forward by Sir William Mulock. The leading Canadian cities have long had free delivery by carriers, a modern convenience so far not extended to Charlottetown. Now Toronto is to have the more speedy pneumatic system, for which a vote of \$165,000 has been passed in Parliament. Tubes will be laid down under the streets and from a central station the mail matter will be shot by air pressure swiftly to other stations in various parts of the city.

**THE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**

The Baptist Association at East Point met at 2.30 Saturday afternoon. The devotional services were led by Deacon W. B. Howatt. The report on denominational literature was resumed. The report was discussed by W. B. Howatt, R. H. Jenkins, Pastors Belyea, Davidson and passed. The following resolution was moved by F. D. Davidson seconded by W. McLeod and passed.

Resolved, That this Association hereby re-affirm the belief held by Baptists from the days of the apostles until now, that the Bible is the only supernatural revelation from God and was given to the world through men elected and inspired by the Holy Spirit; and further that the Bible is the only infallible rule for Christian faith and for the conduct of all men, but especially for all believers in the Lord Jesus Christ.

This resolution was passed unanimously by a rising vote. The report on Systematic Benevolence was read by Rev F. D. Davidson and discussed by Bros A. W. Sterns, J. D. McLeod, W. McLeod, Bro Lesling, Revs H. G. Corey, J. Webb, and Dr. Keirstead. The report on Temperance written by J. K. Ross was read by R. H. Jenkins as follows:

The use of alcoholic poisons as a beverage cannot be too strongly censured in the light of God's word and the teaching of science and reason. We recognize in the liquor traffic the great enemy of the Christian Church, the home, the individual and believe in seeking by every legitimate means its overthrow. We are working in harmony with Him who was manifested to destroy the works of the evil one. We would re-affirm our antagonism to the whole liquor business including the revenue derived from it. We can never sanction the licensing or promoting of this great evil by any human legislation. Our position as Baptists is and ever has been for total prohibition for the nation and total abstinence for the individual. We rejoice today that the sale of intoxicants for beverage purposes is illegal in every part of this Province and that the law is being respected and enforced to a greater degree than any previous time. The bar rooms, where they exist, do so simply on sufferance of the community, and we look to the enlightened public conscience to demand total suppression of the saloon in the near future.

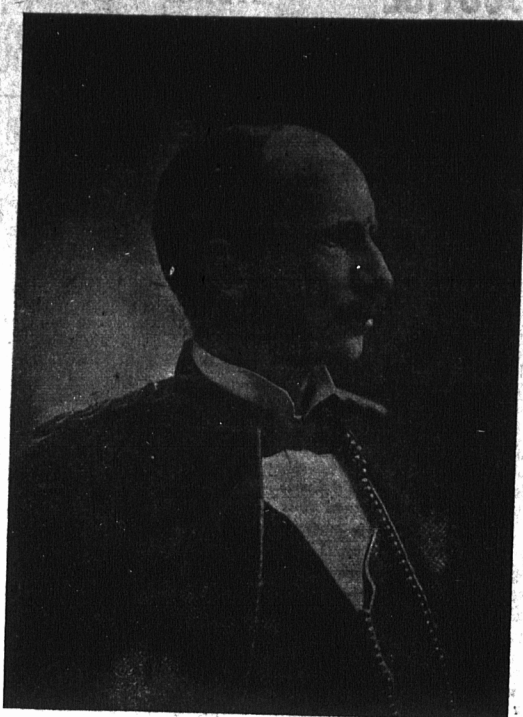
The movement to have the Provincial prohibitory law adopted all over the Island in place of the Canada Temperance Act has much to commend it, as the penalties under the Prohibitory Law are much severer, and it admits more stringent enforcement. It will moreover place the enforcement of the law in the hands of the local Government, which is more amenable to the sufferings of the people than a Dominion measure. It also admits of amendment as occasion requires and will doubtless yet become a model prohibitory law. We desire to record our appreciation of the faithful and persistent efforts of the Temperance Alliance of this Province in securing the enactment of this law and the efficient enforcement of it through competent prosecutors. We also wish to express our appreciation of the judiciary of the province in vindicating the honor of the law thus placing it above political or mercenary exigencies.
