Decisive Battle Looms In Cuba

Revolutionary Expedition Landed At Gibrari In Upper Oriente Province, By Ship, Said To Be The Frederick II Of German Registry.

HAVANA, Aug. 20—Havana this evening believed with apparent reason on that a decisive battle looms in Cuba's eastern province.

A revolutionary expedition landed at Gibrari in Upper Oriente Province, last night, it was reported here. The ship was said to be the "Frederick II" of German registry, with 500 men and scores of machine guns aboard. The government admitted unofficially that the boat landed, and believed it had the expeditionaries bottled up.

Two hundred soldiers sent from Havana were joined in Santa Clara by 400 men stationed there, and kept on eastward. Another report

Asks Removal Of Tariff On Corn

FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 20—Removal of the tariff on corn in order to lower the overhead cost of poultry raising, will be urged upon the Dominion Government by the poultry producers of New Brunswick as the result of action taken this morning at the tenth annual field day celebration at the Dominion Experimental Station here. Members of the Association previous to the passage of a resolution in this connection, pointed out that most of the corn used in the province as poultry feed comes from the Argentine and the United States and is not obtainable in the Dominion. While deploring the action of the Government in one item of the tariff the Association commended it along another line. It went on record as heartily in accord with the provision of a prohibitive duty on dried eggs which previously had been imported in large numbers from China.

Maritime Control Of The State Is Foreseen

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 20—"In five years Maritime province people will control the state of Massachusetts, politically," stated J. Ernest Kerr, secretary of the Canadian Club of Boston in an interview. Mr. Kerr was in Halifax with Ed. McHugh, president of the Canadian Club of Boston.

"Boston, which was always known as the Irish city," has 45,000 native Maritime province men to 43,000 native-born Irish," said Mr. Kerr.

Evidence Is Concluded At Coroner's Inquest

Jury Finds Owner Of Car In Summerside Tragedy Guilty Of "Extreme Negligence."

The inquest to enquire into the death of Edward Arsenault, who met his death in the early hours of Wednesday morning in a car accident, was resumed yesterday morning in the Town Hall, Summerside, Dr. E. T. Tanton, coroner, presiding.

At the conclusion of the evidence the jury returned the following verdict:

"We the undersigned jurors empaneled at the inquest of Edward Arsenault, find that he came to his death by a fractured skull the result of the overturning of a Plymouth five passenger car, driven by himself and owned by Charlie Hum, on the St. Eleanor's Road at the top of Mitchell's Hill on the morning of August 19th between 12 and 1 o'clock.

"We find further according to evidence submitted the accident was indirectly caused by extreme negligence of the owner of the car, Charlie Hum, and hereby recommend that his license be cancelled indefinitely."

Dried - Out Country Will Be Abandoned, Minister Announces

REGINA, Aug. 2—Abandonment of considerable areas of dried-out land in Saskatchewan was fore-shadowed by Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, on his arrival here today following a tour of the southern part of the Province.

"There is no doubt that some of our lands should never be thrown open for homesteading," the Federal Minister said in an interview.

"Those areas will be abandoned, so far as farming is concerned, for better land."

Second Victim Of Auto Accident Dies Of Injuries

Robert Aitken, the second youthful victim of Wednesday morning's automobile tragedy at Summerside, died at ten minutes past two yesterday afternoon after hovering between life and death for over 36 hours.

There are left to mourn besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Aitken, three brothers, Douglas, Clifford and Alec, and four sisters Una, Pearl, Nina and Theresa, all at home, to whom sympathy is extended in their sad bereavement. The lad was only 12 years of age.

The remains were removed to Compton's undertaking parlours and later taken to his home. The funeral is arranged for 9 o'clock this morning to St. Paul's Church and cemetery.

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Montreal Gives One Name To H.E's Babe

MONTREAL, Aug. 20—It is announced that the infant son born to Their Excellencies Lord and Lady Bessborough on Friday morning last will be christened George St. Lawrence Neufville.

The first of these names was chosen because His Majesty King George has expressed a wish to be godfather; the second because the baby was born in Montreal on the shores of Canada's greatest river during Lord Bessborough's term of office as Governor-General of Canada; while the third is the name of the distinguished French family to which Lady Bessborough belongs.

The christening ceremony will take place in Ottawa about the middle of September.

Troopship May Take Scottish Children Over

LONDON, August 20—In connection with the project to send 1,000 Scottish children to Canada on a visit next year, as disclosed by Kenneth Lindsay, honorary secretary of the Anglo-Canadian Society, at the British Commonwealth Education Conference in London recently, in order to overcome the difficulty and cost of the Transatlantic journey an option on a troopship has been obtained. The ship will take the Scottish children to Canada and bring back to Scotland an equal number of Canadian children.

Will Arrive In Charlottetown, Oct- ober 14, Leaving The Following Day.

OTTAWA, Ont., August 20—The itinerary of the Governor General tour of the Maritime Province from September 27 to October 19, was announced here today. Lord Bessborough and his party will leave Ottawa September 27, arriving in Edmundston, N. B. the following morning. With the exception of Halifax, N. S.; Fredericton, N. B.; Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Saint John, N. B., only a brief stop over will be made. The itinerary includes Charlottetown, P. E. I., Oct. 14, leaving October 15.

CHICAGO IS IN BAD PREDICAMENT

Bottom of Treasury Scraped To The Bot- tom—Not Even Able To Pay Small Bills.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20—Chicago is in dire need, said Mayor Anton J. Cermak, Mayoralty successor to "Big Bill" Thompson in America's second largest city. Even if we stopped all functions of the city right now he said we would not have enough money to operate through next year.

Cermak has appealed to Governor Louis I. Emmerson to call a special session of the Illinois Legislature to frame new tax laws to enable the city to continue. Chicago must get \$27,500,000 from somewhere to carry on to the end of the present year.

Victor Peterson, deputy city controller, tersely summarizes the stringency of the situation thus: "We are through at the end of our cash. We have scraped the bottom of the treasury so thoroughly the city cannot even pay little bills of \$25 and \$50. There are judgments outstanding against Chicago of \$6,500,000, and by the end of December the City will owe \$10,000,000 to firms which furnish Chicago's supplies."

St. Lawrence Waterway

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—Acting Secretary Battle of the State Department, said today in response to questions by newspapermen, the United States might take the initiative in an effort to bring the St. Lawrence waterway under active consideration when Hon. W. D. Herridge, the Canadian Minister, returns to Washington.

The waterway project has been the subject of informal discussions between the two governments over a long period. Intimations in Washington just before the Canadian Parliament adjourned recently, were that the negotiations would become active during the summer and fall. At that time it was indicated this Government had agreed to the Canadian position that the negotiations should be carried on through diplomatic channels rather than by a commission as suggested by the United States.

Official circles described the status of the discussions today as temporarily suspended because so many interested officials, both in Washington and Ottawa were on vacation.
