FALSE ALARM - Summerside citizens who are light sleepers heard the Summerside fire siren give two blasts about 3:45 yesterday morning. The question of whether Benjamin Richards, an ex-serviceman, should be permitted to erect a meat market on Convent Street, which is in the residential area, was again before the Summerside Town Council at its regular meeting last night and after much discussion and argument was left over for one week when a special meeting will be called to settle the matter.

The Worshipful Mayor J.F. Arnett presided and councillors R.L. Molison, J.L. Gorrill, T.D. Morrison and Henry Wedge were present. Councillor W.E. Smallman is out of the province.

Clerk J.H. Strong, read letters which had been received from Messrs. Daniel J. MacLeod and John O. Cobb protesting against a permit being granted to erect a meat market on Convent Street.

The matter of an application from Benjamin Richards to erect a meat market on Convent Street and of Henry Martin to erect a work shop on Ottawa Street had been before the town council at its regular meeting on Oct. 15th.

The Town Planning Committee had decided to have advertisements in the local papers announcing that these applications had been received and inviting ratepayers, who objected to the permits being granted, to place their objections in writing before a certain date. This date has now expired and the above letters were the only two received.

Mr. Cobb stated as his objection that the meat market would attract flies and cause bad odors and Mr. MacLeod objected on the grounds that there was no need for it as there is meat at the shops and that rats which are carriers of disease. Mayor Arnett, advised the meeting that Henry Martin was building in the west ward and it was only applied for before the meeting was the one by Richards.

Councillor Morrison said that although only two letters had been received, all the people in that area with the exception of one or two were opposed. Councillor Wedge said that the two parties now objecting had previously signed a petition with seven citizens stating they had no objections. Councillor Morrison said that a great many others who signed the original petition were now objecting.

Should Be In Writing Mayor Arnett said that if others had objections he could not see why they did not put them in writing. He said that the by-law to one or two. Councillor Wedge said in his opinion the Council could not consider complaints that were not in writing. He said that he had published and only two letters were received.

Councillor Molison said that the only things the Council can do is to consider the citizens in writing. Nine signed the favourable petition and only two object. The majority appear to be in favor of the project.

Councillor Molison asked what the feeling of the planning board is on the matter and Mayor Arnett said that the consensus was in favor of the project. Councillor Gorrill expressed his opinion that the citizens in that district did not know how to go about objecting. The ladies up there felt that they should be protected by the Council. There is a zoning law and that is all there should be about it.

The clerk said that some of the women had protested by telephone. Councillor Gorrill prevented returned soldiers from getting re-established but he represented the people of the centre ward and meant to carry out their wishes and he knew they did not want a meat market there.

Mayor Arnett said that in future cases of this kind if people do not write in their protest will not be given consideration. In this case, there is a signed petition in favor of the matter and now two of those persons oppose it.

Motion and Amendment Councillor Molison, at this point moved a motion that the application be granted. This motion was seconded by Councillor Wedge.

Councillor Gorrill then moved an amendment to the effect that the matter be referred back to the Town Planning Committee. Councillor Morrison then asked Councillor Molison to withdraw his motion and have the matter laid over till the next meeting and if by that time the citizens don't register their protest by letter, he would take it to be granted.

Councillor Molison said that those people have already had a chance to write and he did not see why he should withdraw his motion.

Councillor Wedge pointed out that this matter had already been waiting two months for a reply "and now we are going to encourage people to put in complaints." Councillor Gorrill's amendment that the matter be again referred to the Town Planning Commission.

Mayor Arnett said he could see no value in this amendment as the matter had already been before the Town Planning Board and the Council has carried out their requests in the matter.

Councillor Morrison said he would be getting his neck in a noose if this matter passed without a Councillor being present. Councillor Smallman, who also represents the centre ward is absent.

Mayor Arnett expressed his opinion that the matter was before the Council and that the absence of one councillor does not matter. Councillor Molison said it was not fair to this returned man to ask him to wait longer. "Place yourselves in his position," he said, "we are moving very slowly, gentlemen."

Councillor Gorrill then withdrew his amendment and moved another

Bishop Boyle Appeals For Greater Christian Unity

"Strange as it may seem, there is greater unity between the forces of evil than between the forces of good. The great need today is for more unity between all men of good will, whether Catholic, Protestant or Jewish," said His Excellency Bishop James Boyle of Charlottetown, in addressing the members of the Summerside Council, Knights of Columbus and their ladies on Tuesday evening.

The occasion was the annual dinner in honor of the patron of the society, Christopher Columbus, which was held in Leo O'Leary's restaurant at 6:30.

Mr. W. Henry Noonan was toastmaster for the occasion, and after the formal toast to The King had been honored, the following other toasts were proposed. The Church, responded to by Rev. John Kelly, Micoche; Our Country, responded to by Mr. John McNeill, Summerside; The Order, by Mr. John Cameron, Tignish; and the ladies by Dr. J. A. MacMillan, Charlottetown.

His Excellency the Bishop was guest speaker and in his opening remarks expressed appreciation for the effect that it had laid over for one week and a special meeting be called to decide the matter.

Councillor Morrison seconded this amendment, which was carried on the casting vote of Mayor Arnett, with councillors Wedge and Molison dissenting.

Councillor Gorrill reporting for the street department said the houses have all been re-numbered on a system recommended by the Board of Fire Underwriters and he hoped the people would be careful of them.

Councillor Wedge brought up a request from the residents of Hawthorne Avenue that a wooden sidewalk be laid. After some discussion of the costs involved, it was decided to put some gravel on the street and have it properly gravelled and graded next summer and possibly a cement sidewalk laid.

Councillor Morrison said that some of the secondary roads near town were in poor shape and he suggested that the Council ask the Government to have them graded and gravelled. Councillor Wedge suggested that Northumberland Street which goes up along the rotating park should be extended to the old civic airport. Councillor Gorrill said he would see that this was done.

Resolutions of condolence to the families of the late ex-mayor W.J. Lidstone and the late councillor D.F. MacNeill were unanimously passed. Mayor Arnett said that the town had lost two valued citizens. Ex-mayor Lidstone gave of his ability and energy in the interests of the town and was one of Summerside's most successful business men. Councillor McNeill, he said, was held in high regard and was always fair and had good judgment.
