HOG MARKETING CONTROL IS FORECAST

CANADA TO GIVE BRITAIN WEEKLY QUOTA

Agreement Between Dominion and England Plans For Continuous Supply Of Bacon and Ham

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—(CP)—Control of hog marketing in Canada is anticipated in official circles here as a result of an agreement announced today between the Canadian and United Kingdom governments whereby Canada undertakes to supply Britain with 4,480,000 pounds of bacon and ham weekly until the expiration of the agreement on Oct. 31, 1940.

The agreed price is F. O. B. Canadian seaboard so it will not be affected by changes in ocean freight rates or insurance. The British government will look after the ocean charges and also agrees to take up

Anti Soviet Feeling In Italy Mounts

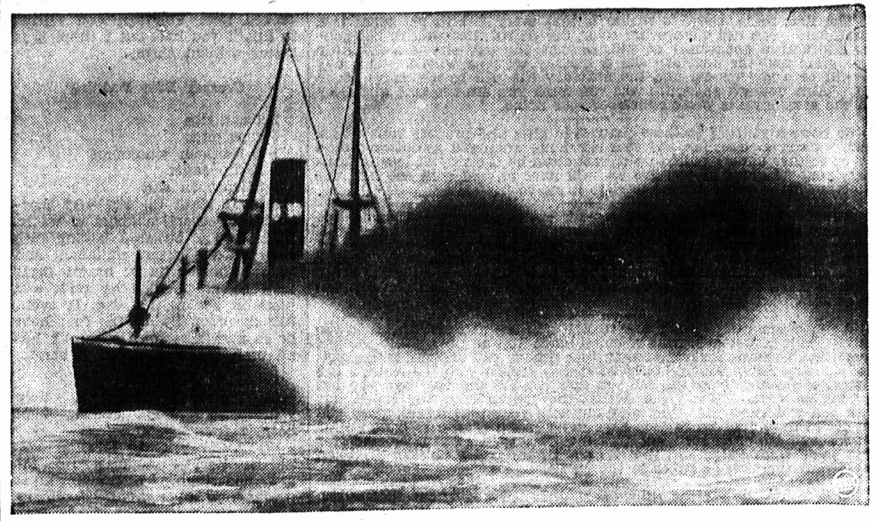

The Rome demonstration by more than 1,000 students was the second anti-Soviet demonstration here within three days.

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SWEDEN TO SPEED WORK ON DEFENCES

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Concerned over the situation in north Europe, Sweden accelerated defence preparations today and started a movement for formation of a national government.

A government spokesman branded the "ridiculous" recent German press attacks which alleged Sweden had encouraged Finnish resistance to Russia. Other officials were of the opinion that the impasse in German-Swedish trade negotiations had led to the attack on Sander.

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Secret Plane Motor Said High Speed

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 4.—Secret development of a new liquid-cooled, 42-cylinder motor for that may propel one of the world's fastest planes was disclosed tonight at the annual convention of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

Dr. Alexander Klemin, professor of aeronautics at New York University, said in a preliminary report the motor is being built by "one of the major engine manufacturers" but because of government secrecy no details were available.

See Move To Put Germany 'On The Spot'

BERLIN, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Summation of the League of Nations Council and Assembly in response to Finland's appeal against Russia was interpreted tonight by the newspaper Fremdenblatt of Hamburg as an attempt to put Germany "on the carpet" before a world forum.

Finland's appeal was directed against Soviet Russia for her invasion but Great Britain and France would not have accepted it the newspaper said, unless they wished to try placing Germany "on the spot."

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Many Russian Prisoners Taken; Expect Raids

Soviet Bombers Crash In Snowstorm—Capital Being Prepared For Bombardment.

(By Lynn Heinzerling, Associated Press Staff Writer) HELSINGFORS, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Fighting Finland tonight claimed new successes against Soviet Russian invaders and steeled herself for new and more vigorous assaults expected by land, sea and air.

This ghost-like capital, deserted except for defenders and those necessary for vital services, was grateful for lowering clouds and snowfall which kept Russian bombers away and gave time to strengthen defences and clear away the debris of last week's air bombardment.

As night fell without further air raids on Helsingfors a Government spokesman announced that in the eastern sector north of Lake Ladoga the Finns had captured 1,300 Russian troops. He said no further details of the capture were available.

Recount In N. B. Slow

BURTON, N. B., Dec. 4.—(CP)—Conservative candidates who contested Sunbury county unsuccessfully in the provincial election of Nov. 30 today gained two votes in the recount of one-third of the ballots cast in that constituency. The smallest Liberal majority in Sunbury was 41.

The recount started at 9 a. m. Argument of six lawyers took up so much time that by evening the contents of only nine ballot boxes, representing about a third of the county vote, had been counted. The recount will continue tomorrow, with the result not expected to be known before night.

In Albert, the other county where a recount was demanded, the proceedings also were slowed by argument. It was said the recount will require three or four more days.

History Repeats:—Soldiers Cheered By Visit Of King

(By Bernard Locoste) (Havas Staff Writer) WITH THE BRITISH FORCES SOMEWHERE IN FRANCE, Dec. 4.—(CP-Havas)—As unobtrusively as if he were one of the tens of thousands of British soldiers now stationed on French soil, King George arrived today to visit his men on war duty. It was as if history were repeating itself. A quarter of a century has elapsed since King George V, his father, came on a similar mission to this country.

Lashed by a driving rain with bitter winds racing across the stormy channel, the destroyer bearing His Majesty arrived at its unnamed destination at 4 p. m. today (12 noon AST).

The King arrived almost as a simple soldier, without official fanfare, unheralded, and with but one thing in his mind—to see as many of his soldiers as possible, and to bring to them words of encouragement and comfort in the yuletide season.

As soon as the warship escorted from half-way across the channel by Royal naval units, came into view in the mists, a squadron of French planes roared overhead to meet it.

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Fears Mount For Safety Of Vessel.

ROCKLAND, Me., Dec. 4.—Fears increased tonight for the safety of nine men aboard the Rockland scallop dragger Madeline and Flora, five days overdue, as the coast guard cutter General Greene searched fruitlessly 100 miles southeast of here.

While the Rookport, Mass., mackerel netter 4P153, overdue since yesterday with its crew of three, was towed into Kennebecport by coast guard patrol boats. The fishing boat, a 36-footer, was blown off its course by a heavy southeaster.

Lobstermen In N. S. Lose Gear

SHELBURNE, N. S., Dec. 4.—Lobster fishermen in some sections of southwestern Nova Scotia suffered serious losses in a week-end storm, a survey showed today.

With the lobster season just two days old, a gale lashed the coast Sunday and hundreds of pots were washed ashore. Around Lockeport, about 2,000 traps were believed lost.

Fisheries officer Harold C. Locke of Lockeport said he believed 25 per cent of the traps set there had been destroyed.

Near Wedgeport, hundreds more were tossed up by the storm.
