Next, have the buttonholes worked to the hem. Then add decorated buttons in one of the floral or crown designs, a belt, and a colorful scarf. If you do not like the belted look, although it is popular for spring, a few darts at the waistline at side, front, and flap. Wear the flap scarf-style, tucked in at the neck. To change the trimming of your coat dress, simply change the scarf and pocket trim.

Q. How can I clean marble?
 A. Take 2 parts of common soda, 1 part of pumice stone, and 1 part of powdered chalk. Stir it through a fine sieve and mix with cold water to a paste. Rub the marble thoroughly with this mixture and all stains will quickly disappear. Then rinse and wash with hot water and soap.

Q. How can I prevent breakage of bottles when packing them?
 A. Breakage can often be prevented if a rubber band, about a quarter inch or half inch wide, is placed around each bottle near the top, another near the bottom.

Q. How can I remove fruit stains?
 A. Sprinkle some dry salt immediately on a fruit stain and it will seldom become permanent.
