GERMANS EVACUATE WERDER PENINSULA

(Canadian Press Dispatch) PETROGRAD, Oct. 29.—The Germans have evacuated the Werder Peninsula on the Gulf of Riga where they made a landing recently, the War Office announces.

RUSSIANS DETERMINED TO DEFEND PETROGRAD

(Canadian Press Dispatch) PETROGRAD, Oct. 29.—Premier Kerensky, speaking Saturday in the Preliminary Parliament, said that the government never had debated the possibility of evacuating Petrograd to the enemy as alleged by some newspapers.

NAVAL ENGAGEMENT

LONDON, Oct. 28.—A German torpedo destroyer was hit twice by shells from British and French destroyers during a fight Sunday afternoon between six Allied and three German vessels off the Belgian coast.

CONTRADICTORY ORDERS PROVE GERMAN COMMAND DEMORALIZED

(Canadian Press Dispatch) FRENCH HEADQUARTERS, Oct. 30.—Contradictory orders taken from prisoners show certain demoralization in the German command, and the question is asked whether another retreat is intended.

HINDENBURG'S MOVE SCARES PETROGRAD

LONDON, Oct. 25.—It is possible that Hindenburg is playing a sly trick in withdrawing from the advanced Riga positions. He is endeavoring to economize every soldier possibly by making the line safe with the smallest possible number of men, while others are withdrawn for operations on the West front or against the Italians.

THE WEATHER TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Increasing southerly winds, fair at first—then showery. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 47 degrees above. At 10 a. m. it was 45 above; at 9 p. m. it was 41 above. The lowest the previous night was 38 above.

MAKING PROGRESS ON BELGIAN FRONT

Enemy Trenches Successfully Raided, German Post Captured by Belgian Patrol and Prisoners Taken.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) LONDON, Oct. 29.—Many tons of bombs were dropped yesterday on German military establishments in Belgium by British aviators.

GERMANS ENTER FRENCH POSITIONS BUT ARE DRIVEN OUT.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) PARIS, Oct. 29.—An attack was made by the Germans last night on the Verdun front near Chauve Wood. The War Office reports that they gained a footing in advanced French positions but that the greater part of the ground was regained in a counter-attack.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) LONDON, Oct. 29.—"We raided the enemy's trenches last night opposite Warnefont," says today's official statement.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) LONDON, Oct. 29.—A hostile reconnoitering party was repulsed in the neighborhood of Iteul in the course of yesterday's operations north of Merckim, a Belgian Patrol captured a German post of 21 men.

13,000,000 MEN TRANSPORTED WITH BUT SMALL LOSS.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) LONDON, Oct. 29.—In the House of Commons today Premier Lloyd George said that since the beginning of the war 13,000,000 men had been transported with a loss of only 3,500 and of these only 2,700 had been lost through enemy actions.

HON. A. K. MCLEAN CHAIRMAN TREASURY BOARD

(Canadian Press Dispatch) OTTAWA, Oct. 29.—Hon. A. K. McLean has been appointed Vice-Chairman of the treasury board and will be Acting Minister of Finance whenever Sir Thomas White is absent from the capital.

DANES WANT SPIES TO SUFFER MORE

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 27.—A demand for greater punishment for the great swarm of Commercial spies infesting Denmark has been raised in the Danish Parliament. Complaint is made that despite the loss of life from submarines among Danish seamen, whose casualties during this year have been greater than those of the Danish army in important battles, the detected spies far too often have been expelled instead of being imprisoned.

WAR IS JUST BEGUN SAYS NORTHCLIFFE

KANSAS CITY, MO., Oct. 28.—Discontinuing recent reports of internal disruption in Germany as signs of the weakening of that nation in the war, Lord Northcliffe, distinguished British editor and publisher, and head of the British war mission, today told 200 editors of seven of the middle-western states at a luncheon given here in his honor that the war has just begun.

ITALIAN SITUATION IS CLEARING

Enemy Held in Check and Italian Army Faithfully Carrying Out Orders of the General Staff.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 27.—In one period of nine days in October there were 21 mutinies, sixteen outbreaks of anarchy, and 16 pogroms in various parts of Russia.

BERLIN REPORT.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) BERLIN—(Via London)—Oct. 28.—The capture of one hundred thousand Italians and more than 700 guns is reported in the official communication from Central Headquarters tonight, which declares that the Italian second and third armies are in retreat.

ITALIANS RETREATING BEFORE AUSTRO-GERMANS.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) BERLIN, Oct. 28.—Via London—The Austrians and Germans have forced the way through the mountains into the plains of Northern Italy capturing the town of Cividale. The War Office reports. The city of Gorizia on the Isonzo also has been captured.

AUSTRIAN HOPES RAISED BY SUCCESS ON ITALIAN FRONT.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) ZURICH, Oct. 29.—Austrian hopes of a speedy and honorable peace have been raised by the Austro-German successes on the Italian front, the President of the Reichstag said in an address to the Deputies, as quoted in Vienna despatches.

POSSIBILITY OF A FURTHER GERMAN RETREAT

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 28.—The possibility of a further German retreat on the Aisne front is mentioned by Lieut. General Von Ardenne, military expert of the Tagblatt, of Berlin, in discussing the French victory there. He says the attack of the French undoubtedly will be repeated, and that although the chances of ultimate success are slight it is well to remember that the German plan of defence does not forbid voluntary abandonment, under proper circumstances, of territory not essential to the great tactical plan, so that losses may be reduced.
