AUSTRIA AGREES TO EVACUATE ITALY

She has Notified Poland That Civil and Military Authority will be Handed Over to Polish Government. Turkey has Surrendered Unconditionally.

(Special to The Guardian) MILAN, Oct. 31.—Austria has notified the Polish Government at Warsaw that the military and civil authority of occupied Polish territory will be handed over to them and that Austrian troops will evacuate immediately a Vienna dispatch reported today.

PARIS, Oct. 31.—French troops late yesterday repulsed a strong German

counter attack northwest of Chateau Procin, according to the official statement today from the war office. On the last two days the number of prisoners taken by the French Fifth Army has reached 1,458, including a Colonel of Cavalry and three chiefs of battalions.

ROME, Oct. 31.—Allied troops advancing east of the Piave River, have taken Serravalle, according to the official statement issued at the war office tonight.

Superior enemy forces attacked our positions at Asolone and Mont Peticia, fruitlessly, on the Venetian Plain. The British and Italians advanced extending appreciably their break through north and south of Montello. In Serbia we have completed crossing to the northern bank of the Danube. Rear ward march to the Save and Drina continues, the enemy not following. In Albania our rear guards repulsed isolated attacks.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The Turks were heavily engaged by the British Tuesday north of Kalesh Shergat. The official report of the Mesopotamia operation says the British captured 1000 Turks.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The official statement on the operations of the Independent Air Force issued tonight says Tuesday night we attacked the airplane works at Mannheim, the furnaces at Burbach, the railways at Thionville and Offenburg and the air-drome at Hagenau.

—BUY VICTORY BONDS— SERBIAN CAVALRY REACH THE DANUBE

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 31.—Serbian cavalry have reached the Danube east of Semendria, 24 miles southeast of Belgrade, and occupied Pehzarevalz. Headquarters announces today the enemy beat a precipitate retreat before the Serbian armies which reached the front of Genoilano, Valz, Topola and Palanka, capturing additional prisoners and war material.

DOUBLE UP IS NEW VICTORY LOAN SLOGAN

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Oct. 31.—Dominion headquarters of the Victory Loan announce "Double Up" as the new slogan which the record of the campaign to date has given to the drive that must carry the loan over the top.

For the first two days of the campaign reports from the province of Ontario brought applications of \$34,000,000 as compared with \$17,000,000 for the first two days last year. So far Ontario is doubling up.

The Steel Co. of Canada one of Canada's large corporations has doubled up. Last year it took \$1,500,000 this year it takes \$3,000,000.

The Imperial Oil Company last year took \$1,500,000 this year \$3,000,000. The North American Insurance Company took \$500,000 last year, this year \$1,000,000.

Doubling up falls to describe the action of the Singer Company which last year took \$50,000 and this year takes ten times that amount or an even half million.

The Fairbanks Morse Co. has doubled from \$50,000 last year to \$100,000 this year. So has the Cowan Company with \$200,000 this year as compared with \$100,000 last year.

The Dunlop Tire Company has more than trebled up with \$1,000,000 this year, compared to \$308,000 last year. The Russel Motor Willys Overland Companies make a joint application for \$5,000,000 this year as compared with \$500,000 last year.

These are some of the big applications. Canvassers report that a similar attitude is found among large sections of all classes of the community and before the campaign is over it may prove to be as infectious as the Spanish Influenza.

OTTAWA, Oct. 31.—The Government will grant a war bonus this year to civil service employees in the lower grades of the inside service in recognition of the fact that salaries have not advanced commensurately with the increase in the cost of living. The decision was reached by the cabinet council today to grant some relief to the Government's employees who are trying to make both ends meet on salaries which average for all grades of the service only about \$1100 per year.

VICTORY BONDS SUBSCRIPTIONS TO DATE

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Oct. 31.—Over \$18,000,000 of Bonds were subscribed in Toronto in three days. Ontario subscribed \$45,614,000. The grand total for the Dominion in the campaign to date is \$63,490,350.

BOARD OF HEALTH HAS LIFTED THE BAN

A meeting of the City Board of Health was held last night Mayor Wright presiding.

There were also present Mr. K. J. Martin, Stipendiary Magistrate, Water Commissioners Jas. McDonald and John McKenna, Councillors Riley, Yeo, Smith, Connors, Rattray and McKenna and also Dr. McGrath.

A general discussion on the "flu" situation was taken part in by most of those present.

Acting Health Officer, Dr. Yeo, reported that conditions have improved very materially since last meeting and gave as his opinion that the epidemic is almost at an end, though no doubt there are still some isolated cases.

As the result of the Health Officer's report a resolution was moved by Coun. Riley, seconded by Coun. McKinnon directing that "city churches, theatres and other places of amusement be permitted to reopen, but that exception should be made in the case of the Prince of Wales College and this institution should remain closed at least two weeks further and that the public schools should be permitted to re-open when and under such conditions as the School Board may adopt," and it was "further resolved that business colleges shall be re-opened only to city students after a period of two weeks."

Another resolution passed was that from this date all new cases of influenza be placarded.

The efforts of the nurses and V. A. D.'s came in for much commendation and it was agreed that they be liberally compensated for their work.

THE AUSTRINIANS ARE ABOUT ALL IN

33,000 Austrian Prisoners, Hundreds of Guns and Thousands of Machine Guns Taken in one Week and the Italians are Still Adding New Territory to Their Conquests.

(Special to The Guardian) ROME, Oct. 31.—Since October 24 the Allies have captured 33,000 Austrians, including 802 officers. In the great offensive on the Italian front hundreds of guns and thousands of machine guns have been captured. In spite of desperate resistance by the forces the 332nd American Infantry Regiment is also in action in Albania. The Italians have occupied San Giovanni Di Medua and are advancing on Scutar. At some points the advance exceeds twelve miles and continues in spite of desperate resistance by the Austrians who are hurling new divisions into the fray. More than one hundred towns and villages have been liberated. The position of the sixth Austrian army is declared to be critical.

PARIS, Oct. 31.—A despatch from Athens to the Matin says the sole remaining Turkish army has been concentrated at Bulair, a town at the neck of the Gallipoli Peninsula. The Tchatalja positions are being prepared as the second defence.

Notice to Soldiers on Harvest Leave. Attention is directed to a recent announcement published in the Press by the Military Service Branch, Department of Justice, regarding extensions to be granted to men EXEMPTED AS FARMERS. It is pointed out that this DOES NOT IN ANY WAY AFFECT MEN WHO HAVE BEEN ORDERED BY THE REGISTRAR TO REPORT to Depot Battalions and who have thereafter leave of absence from the Military Authorities. Once a man has been ordered to report for duty by the Registrar he leaves the jurisdiction of the Registrar and comes under that of the Department of Militia and Defence, and is to be considered as a soldier. This applies to men of the 20 to 22 Class who have been ordered to report by the Registrar in virtue of the cancellation of exemptions by Order-in-Council of the 20th April last, as well as to those ordered to report in the usual way on refusal of claim for exemption, or on expiration of exemption granted. All men, accordingly, who have been ordered to report, and are therefore SOLDIERS, and who have subsequently been granted harvest leave by the military authorities MUST, NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOTICE ABOVE REFERRED TO, REPORT ON THE EXPIRATION OF THAT LEAVE, unless they are notified to the contrary by their Commanding Officer or by general notice published by the Department of Militia and Defence.
