# PRESTON AND THE BOERS.

Mr. W. T. R. Preston, Travelling Immigration Agent for the Dominion at a good round salary and expenses, was recently in Belgium and there publicly propounded the notion that "we want the Boers" as immigrants to Canada. Now, the people of Canada have no liking for the Boers, who are at present at war with us and engaged in killing as many British subjects as they can find within range of their rifles. And the Conservatives of Canada have quite as little liking for Mr. Preston, who has been a Liberal organizer and election manager in Ontario, has been a Liberal candidate at sundry elections, and on one occasion in which some rather disreputable "machine" work was done, and a Liberal elected as the result, it is affirmed that Mr. Preston telegraphed to somebody, "Hug the machine for me."

For these diverse reasons it may be observed that Mr. Preston's proposition to stock the Dominion with Boer immigrants grates rather harshly upon the minds of Canadian people and especially that worthy half of our population who are of Conservative leanings. But this fact need not prevent the intelligent readers of THE GUARDIAN from considering the proposal on its merits. And first, be it observed, that Mr. Preston being in Belgium, where sympathy with the Boers is pretty strong, and being also a politician, knew that if he was to succeed in procuring Belgian immigrants he must fall somewhat in line with the popular opinions there. Hence he put forward the notion that we have no real antipathy to the Boers; that we send our boys to Africa to show the Boers how to fight and would be delighted, when the war is over to have the Boers come over here that we might teach them how to farm.

And we think that is about all that can be said for Mr. Preston's proposition. It is otherwise ill-timed, unfeasible, undesirable and utterly impossible of being carried into effect. The proposition is ill-timed because the two countries are at war. It is unfeasible, undesirable and impossible of being carried into effect because in no case would the Boers want to come to Canada; because they are not farmers at all in the Canadian sense, and it is farmers we want; because our cold winters and modes of life would be insufferable to people who live as they do and are accustomed to a hot climate. We have strong prejudices against them, and they have stronger prejudices against the Canadians—stronger even than against the

English because they think, we ought not to have meddled in the struggle. It is very doubtful whether the Boers brought here would value at any worth the privileges which we consider most priceless—our civil and religious rights and privileges, our free schools, the equality of all subjects before the law. Why should we cast these pearls before the Boers?

As for Mr. Preston, if he can find no more useful and fruitful fields for his immigration efforts than in promoting a Boer trek to Canada it will be hardly worth while to employ him longer in his present official capacity.

We have received the Descriptive Atlas of Western Canada, and the Canadian Atlas for the Use of Schools issued by direction of Hon Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior. These atlases are designed to extend the knowledge of all matters pertaining to the Dominion and in addition to well-engraved colored maps, are adorned with illustrations and contain a great variety of statistical and other information about Canada. Each map margin is filled with the names of the territorial divisions, counties and principal cities and their population according to the latest census. For purposes of reference in the counting room, the editorial sanctum or the home these maps will be found as convenient as they will be useful in the school-room.

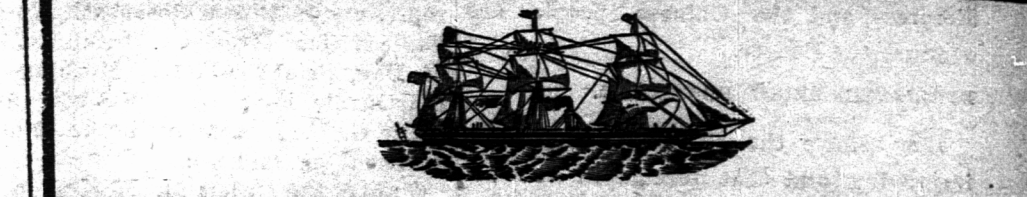
