PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) — MONTREAL, Aug 18—Eggs continued to feature an otherwise dull market on the Montreal dairy and produce market today, with extra holding an advance of another cent a dozen and other grades of half a cent. Graded shipments in cartons of less than 21 to 22 cents for extra 18 to 14 cents for first and 13 to 14 cents for second. Extra have advanced two to three cents a dozen since the beginning of the week, with other grades up about a cent. Egg receipts totalled 364 cases. Shipments of eggs have decreased of late due in part to the transformation from egg collecting to harvesting, dealers declare.

Butter prices continued unchanged at 18 to 18 1/2 cents a pound for no 1 grade in cartons or less. Arrivals amounted to 2,400 boxes.

On the cheese market prices held unchanged at 10 to 10 1/2 cents a pound for Ontario white and colored and with Quebec white and colored at a half a cent less than Ontario. A total of 58,220 boxes of cheese was offered for sale on the market today.

New Quebec potatoes brought 80 to 90 cents per 50 pound bag. Old Marie time potatoes have now completely disappeared from the market.

Horse racing is drawing immense crowds in Ontario, according to the papers it has never been more popular than this year. For instance at Goderich, August 7th, over 4,000 people passed through the turnstiles to witness the annual civic holiday horse meet. People motored from distances of over 200 miles and were rewarded with a good afternoon's sport. The only unfortunate part of the meeting was a bad spill in one of the races when a horse stepped into a sulky wheel and spilled Harry Fields, who suffered a badly broken leg.

The 2.18 Trot and Pace at Northam Thursday night saw two pacers enter the charmed 2.10 list. King Spruce when he paced the second heat in 2.10 flat after winning the first heat in 2.10 1/2 and Patrick Direct, when he won the third heat in 2.10 flat. This makes three horses to enter the 2.10 list on Prince Edward Island this year, which is a record showing for P. E. I.

In the first heat of the above class the finish was very close between Star G. and King Spruce. Cummings, driver of Star G., thought he had won, but the judges saw King Spruce first. Anyhow, it was a wonderful heat.

Patrick Direct reduced his record at Northam when he won that third heat in 2.10. His former record was 2.11 was taken at Toronto in December of 1931. He did not pace in 1932. He is a big, free-legged pacer, has a tendency to make jumps at critical times, hence his summary, 5-3-1.

Winnie Winkle in winning the 2.22 Trot and Pace at Northam Thursday night incidentally showed two or three flashes of speed, which good judges said they never saw anything like, unless it was the theme Dick C. was pulled out on College Swift in the deciding heat of the left-over race.

Winnie Winkle takes hold of the iron something desperate, so the O'Brien family, which lack nothing in inventiveness when it comes to subduing and controlling horses, have jointly and severally invented a contraption that makes Winnie as docile as a cat. It consists of two poles one on each side of the neck and fastened to the furlers of the saddle then passing through rings on a halter in the front of Winnie's nose. A cord or strap is fastened around under the lip over the teeth, comes back up over the forehead and is fastened on to the reins. Such is the description we have received. Anyhow it is wonderfully effective and is purely an O'Brien idea.

A lot of speed showed up at Northam Thursday night. Some of the boys came home particularly struck with Trilix Volo. She became a new performer pacing when she won the third heat in 2.18 1/2 and that is not all. In the second heat going away not too good she paced a good second to Calumet City in 2.14%. It was the first time ever started in a race and it was Trilix's first appearance. Between them they got along very creditably and we predict a good deal more will be heard from Trilix at the Exhibition races next week.

By the way, Brenton Ramsey has license to be a good horseman. His father Bertram Ramsey is an old hand at the game, having in his day handled such horses as Montrose 2.19%, Rosemont 2.19% and many others. Trilix Volo is a daughter of Roy Volo 2.08%. This makes two by that sire that have stepped into the list on Prince Edward Island this year, the other being Mac Volo 2.13%.
